There at this farm is the home of our cook for October, Mrs. Melva Pippel. Melva and her husband Walter, are long time residents of Alaska, having come to Palmer in 1935 with the Matanuska Colonists. After living in the Valley for four years they returned to Wisconsin to farm for one year. However, as it does to most of us, the call of the Northland was too strong to be ignored so they returned to Alaska. The Pippels farmed around the Anchorage and Spenard areas before they purchased the 160 acre farm tract which they now live on. They first raised hogs as well as farmed this land but eventually decided to concentrate on the 35 acres of vegetables which they now tend. Melva has six children of whom four have left home and married. Daughter Gayle lives in Daytona, Florida, son Robert lives in Palmer, while Jim and Jack still reside in this community. 19 year old David lives at home and helps his father with the farm as does 15 year old Kayle, a sophomore at Anchorage High School.

FOOD FOR THE GODS

Separate 3 eggs.

Combine yolks with;

1 cup sugar

4 heaping tablespoons

graham cracker crumbs

1 cup dates

1 cup chopped walnuts

pinch salt

Flavor with vanilla

Fold in stiffly beaten eggs whites. Bake 25 minutes in a slow oven.
