They set up camp about 18 miles out of Eureka and after hunting for a day were unable to get their swamp buggy started to make the return trip. Stewart and Abernathy hiked the 18 miles through drifted snow sometimes waist deep, back to Eureka Lodge where an appeal was sent to the 71st Air Rescue to go in and pick up the other two men. The party returned Tuesday night.

## BOARD ASKS SUPPORT OF FIREMEN!!

### FIRE COMMISSION URGES UNDERSTANDING OF VALUES AND COSTS OF OPERATING FIRE COMPANY

At the regular meeting of the Fire Prevention Board last Monday evening, those present realized the need to acquaint the general public of the Chugiak area with the facts concerning the operation and value of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company. A report of plans and progress will be made regularly.

At this time it was decided that a sum of \$1500.00 must be raised in order to put the trucks back in operation and a reasonable amount more should be pledged in order to provide a proper and adequate budget for an entire year's operation. The commission wished to make clear that the \$25.00 which was requested in a recent appeal could be pledged in installments but that the sum of \$1500.00 cash must be raised before any money would be spent. This amount would be spent in approximately the following manner: Heat for apparatus building, \$100.00; Safe heating unit \$100.00; Old electric bill \$100.00; Old phone bill \$200.00; Repairs for trucks \$1000.00.

## V.F.W TO GIVE PARTY

Chugiak Post #9735 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will give a "Get Acquainted" party at the Chugiak Community Hall on Friday, Oct. 24th beginning at 7:30 p.m.

There will be refreshments, "Alaskas Favorite Game", prizes, and dancing to begin at 10:00 p.m. and last until ?. The party is open to members, prospective members, their ladies and guests.

The total amount collected to date is \$132.50, just \$1,367.50 short of the goal. It was pointed out that insurance should be provided for firemen in line of duty and this would be contracted for when funds were assured.

The Fire Chief explained that most of the equipment which firemen have put in shape and which they have been operating has been entrusted to them from Civilian Defense on a "Loan for Use" basis, that is, only so long as it is kept in operation and used can it be held by the company. Firemen asked the Commission to set a policy regarding the fighting of fires on property where the assessment had not been paid or pledged. They asked if it would be considered fair to use funds collected to fight a fire on property where no funds had been received. The Commission would like to hear some public opinions on this question. All members of the community are invited to come to monthly Board meetings which are held on the 3rd Monday of each month at Moose Horn at 7:30 p.m. sharp. Members of the duly elected Commission are: Mrs. Ali B. Jarnan, Mrs. Russell Oberg, Mr. Jim Polyefko, Mr. George M. Allen, Mr. H.G. Reid and Mr. Leroy Hayden.

#### AN OPEN LETTER TO CITIZENS OF THIS COMMUNITY

For 4 years I have donated my services to this community as a volunteer fireman, attending many fires and accidents. Neither I nor my wife begrudge the time spent in this type of service for we both feel that since we pay NO TAXES which could be used in community betterment, this is the next best way to carry our fair share of that every person living out here owes to his neighbor. This is not an unusual custom here in Alaska where the latch string was always out so a stranger either in distress or just passing through could use anything you had just so long as he replaced it for the next needy traveler.


Now, after 4 years of the "desperados and the spoilers" passing through, the cupboard is depleted and the woodbox bare. Now you, expecting the usual Alaskan hospitality stop at my hogan to find no food and no fuel, but still you beg me for assistance. What happens now, Cheechako, when weary, cold and hungry, I must send you on your way unaided? How am I going to sleep nights when it was not within me to have had to do so? Why should the ignorance and stupidity of others weigh heavily on my conscience?

As you must know, replenishment of our Fire Company "wood box and cupboard" has been meager in the past few years. To relieve my conscience of the inability to aid my neighbors on the trail must I too follow the current example and pull in the latch string and replace it with a padlock ??? Think neighbor, and think

Everyone welcomes a new way to prepare round steak, especially those sometimes tough cuts of moose and caribou. Helva Pippel says that savory little rolls of meat cooked in their own gravy are both tasty and tender.

## LITTLE PIGS IN BLANKETS

Take a slice of round steak (cut thin) and cut into pieces about 4" square. Put a small piece of bacon on each slice of beef, roll up and fasten together with toothpicks. Roll in flour and brown in hot fat. Season with salt, pepper, and small onion. Put pigs in roaster and make a brown gravy to pour over them. Cook slowly for several hours in a slow oven.

### MILK PRICE INCREASES

The Chugiak School Lunch program announces an increase in the price for single servings of milk, bought separate from, or in addition to, the regular lunch. This increase is due to the increased cost of the milk because it is served in half-pint cartons. The Health Department has asked that it be served in this manner. The milk is served on a cost basis. In fact, the lunch program will still absorb a slight loss at the new price. From October 22nd single servings of milk will cost 10 cents and the monthly milk tickets will cost \$1.40.

To those who may be concerned about these small boys giving up their Halloween fun, they will be rewarded the following night by a costume party, complete with games, prizes and all the goodies they might miss by not trick-or-treating.

### SHOPPING in Chugiak

The residents of this community as a whole seem to be unusually fond of pets, at least one to a household being the average. However, these pets often impose a serious problem if one wishes to take a trip but does not or can not take the pet along. This problem can be happily solved by driving down the Birchwood road to the sign that reads "Burgs Birchwood Kennels". Here, pets, both cats and dogs, may be boarded for a mere 50¢ per day in clean well built kennels. Mrs. Richard (Christa) Burg cares for the pets and she is thoroughly experienced in both the care and breeding of animals. In addition to caring for others' pets Mrs. Burg raises and sells a fine breed of German Shepherds. Christa is also responsible for making available to the community the services of a veterinarian on a bi-weekly basis. so that we may have happier and healthier pets. continued - page 6




