PHONE NUMBERS CHANGE

NOVEMBER 29

Reprint from Valley Cooperator, November 1958

By the end of November, subscribers to MTA's telephone service will have their new numbers assigned, their new directories, and operator toll-dialing will go into effect on the MTA system.

What does this mean to you? Nothing, until November 29, when the outover to the new numbers will be done. Until an exact hour on that date (it will be published in local papers) your number will remain as it now stands, and all the numbers you call on M.T.A. will be the same. After that time, each number will have an additional number at its beginning. Pioneer will become Pioneer 5, Alpine will be Alpine 6, Frontier adds 6, and Honestead becomes Honestead 2.

In other words, if your number is now dialed PI-1234, after November 29 it will be PI-5-1234 and so forth. This operation has been made necessary so that MTA phones

It rained like a son of a gun that summer and it was still raining along in August or September when Milt decided to start a cabin at 19 mile. Ronnie wasn't a very big boy then but he wasn't afraid to tackle his weight and more - he never was. Sharon was just a toddler, and Geneva was carrying Danny Cole in her arms - he was a mere babe. Milt and Ronnie and Naomi and Geneva just worked out in that rain and misery and gritted their teeth and put up that cabin. It has since been added to and improved but it was after the first fire that the ceiling was made high enough for Moose Horn to stand up under. That time the O'Harra Bus stopped and all of George Clawson's passengers relayed buckets of water from the spring to put out the fire. Then there was the time Milt had the blowtorch and the can of Blaze, but that is a LONG story (not TALL). Altogether there have been about 6 fires, none quite so destructive as this one, and so far all of them stopped in time before all was lost. Each time Jin Moose Horn thinks, "This must be it" And in reality it should be because there was so little to do with - this time worst of all.

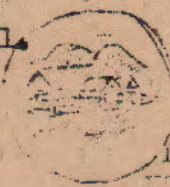

The Cook of The Month

Ruth Hartman has found that a popular way to satisfy male appetites is with this hearty veal stew topped with light fluffy dumplings. This dish is tasty as well as economical and Ruth says it is as good with moose or caribou if one has these game meats on hand.

VEAL STEW WITH DUMPLINGS

- 1 lb. veal cut in 1" cubes
- 2 cups hot water
- 1/2 cup diced carrots
- 1/2 cup diced potatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup green lima beans or peas
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- Dash pepper
- 1 3/4 oz. can tomato sauce

Roll meat in flour, brown in hot fat. Add hot water and cook slowly for 1 hour. Add vegetables, bay leaf, Worcestershire sauce and seasonings. Continue cooking for 30 minutes. Add tomato sauce, bring to a boil. Drop dumplings from

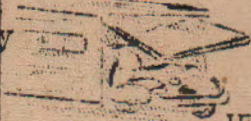
No name has as yet been selected for the School News. The offer has been made by The Courier of a prize for the best name submitted by a school youngster.

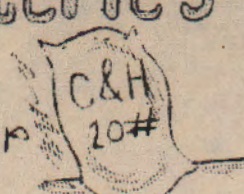

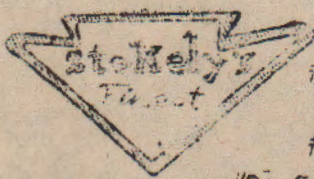

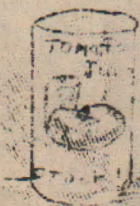
