LOCAL CLUB TO SPONSOR CHRISTMAS LIGHTING CONTEST

An exterior Christmas lighting and decorating contest will be sponsored in the greater Chugiak area this year by the Friendly Neighbor Club. The sole purpose of this contest is to encourage the members of this community to put forth a special effort to make Chugiak glow with holiday cheer, and to let travelers along the highway know that they have passed through our community.

The ladies plan to have three categories in which to enter: private dwellings, business establishments, and civic organizations, this to include club entries and churches. There will be entry fees in each category for the express purpose of providing prizes for the winners. The Friendly Neighbors desire no profit from this project and all of the entry fees will be turned back into prizes. It was decided that the prizes would be gift certificates which would be redeemable in any place of business in Chugiak (Eagle River through Peters Creek and Birchwood areas inclusive.). The amount of the gift certificates will depend entirely on the number of entries in each category. A prize will be offered in each class.

Initially there are provisions made only for first place prizes but if the entries should be numerous enough, there is a possibility of second or even third prizes being offered. Entries will be judged on three counts: effective lighting, originality, and interpretation of the Christmas theme. Applications will be available at most business

HOMESTEAD DWELLING DESTROYED BY FIRE


Last Thursday morning at just past midnight the trailer home of the Worth Butner family in the Eagle River Valley was totally lost in a fire probably caused by a propane leak. Mrs. Butner and their four children, Mike, David, Molly and Robin, were living in the trailer on the homestead. Mike awoke about midnight to find the house full of smoke and quickly wakened the rest of the family. They escaped unharmed from the burning building and were able to save some warm clothing and a very few belongings. In the dark they managed to find their way to the road and to the nearest neighbors place which, on foot, was several hours distant. The homestead is far up Eagle River Valley and the road is only a cat trail. The Butners are back at their place at 18 mile only until they can make new arrangements to return to the Homestead.

As we mentioned once before the family of our cook for November, Ruth Hartman, all possess a sweet tooth. To satisfy this craving Ruth often resorts to sweet or fruit type salads rather than the more common vegetable variety. Here she offers two simple salads, that, though easy to make, are pretty and good enough for a party.

PINE-CARROT JELLO SALAD

2 pkgs. Lemon Jello
1 Cup grated raw carrot
1 small can drained
crushed pineapple.
Let jello set until partially firm. Add carrots and Pineapple and chill until firm. Top with mayonnaise.

Dear Reader:

We started this year with four busses and routes. Each bus was carrying far more students than the law allowed. Thus, as a temporary measure, one bus is making a double run. The Eklutna bus brings the students on its run to school 50 minutes early, then leaves to pick up the Eagle River students. At night we have a similar situation. The maximum number of students riding on each bus and the total seats is as follows:

Riding	Seats
Eklutna	66

	Riding	Seats
Railroad	49	40
Birchwood	72	60
Eagle River	79	60
Homestead	77	60

The law allows one student to stand for every five seated or twelve for a sixty passenger bus. Therefore, with the present double run the load limits are within limits in most cases. But why do we have to continue a double run? Until the past legislature met, there was an oral agreement between the Dept. of Education and the bus contractors that the bus contractor would have the assurance of having his contract renewed either by bid or negotiation every two years provided he gave adequate service and kept his equipment in good condition. This agreement assured the contractor that he would be able to pay for new equipment. At the last legislature this law was

changed to require the Dept. of Education to let the contract to the lowest bidder regardless! Now, we have a situation where Mrs. Ising is operating the second bus run at a loss and she does not have the assurance of her contract being assured for next year; therefore can not afford to purchase a new bus. It would be possible for her to operate a second hand bus; however she can not find one for sale or lease that is in sufficiently good mechanical condition to carry school children.

The double bus shift not only works an inconvenience on the children and parents but disrupts the school program for those students and limits the preparation time of the teachers. This schedule is particularly hard on the first, second and third graders who are required by the Dept. of Education to be in school - turn to page 7


