BANGOR CREEK ICE CREAM "At the mining camp north of None the icy waters of the creek was our refrigerator, hence the name for this dessert which we had in lieu dual molds or a large mold. of ice-cream along with the men's birthday cakes. First I put a can of canned milk (unopened) into a pan and covered it with cold water and then heated it to boiling. After holding it just at boiling temperature for five minutes it was taken to the creek and tossed in to stay until icy cold. (For those of us who are unfortunate not to have a creek running through our yard, the freezing compartment of the refrigerator makes a good substitute.) Dissolve one package of rasplerry or strawberry jello in a cup of boiling

water and add one cup of cold water. When jello is cooled to the congealing stage beat it until light and fluffy. Also whip the canned milk that was heated then cooled to very cold. You will find that both the flavor and texture are improved by the heating treat ment. When the milk is whiing each in lightly. Then fold the Jello and whipped milk together and return to the refrigerator to cool and set firmly. You may like to put it into indivi-Also, some fresh strawberries or raspberries can be added when the two whips are blended together and that adds to it in both color and flavor."


