# The Cook of The Month

COOK FOR APRIL PEN LEE

It would seem only fitting to wind up Pen's month at COOK with a recipe that is truly her own. This novel dessert was concocted by necessity and the story of it should be told in her own words.

### BANGOR CREEK ICE CREAM

"At the mining camp north of Nome the icy waters of the creek was our refrigerator, hence the name for this dessert which we had in lieu of ice-cream along with the men's birthday cakes. First I put a can of canned milk (unopened) into a pan and covered it with cold water and then heated it to boiling. After holding it just at boiling temperature for five minutes it was taken to the creek and tossed in to stay until icy cold. (For those of us who are unfortunate not to have a creek running through our yard, the freezing compartment of the refrigerator makes a good substitute.) Dissolve one package of raspberry or strawberry jello in a cup of boiling

water and add one cup of cold water. When jello is cooled to the congealing stage beat it until light and fluffy. Also whip the canned milk that was heated then cooled to very cold. You will find that both the flavor and texture are improved by the heating treatment. When the milk is whipped add about 6 tablespoons of sugar one by one stirring each in lightly. Then fold the Jello and whipped milk together and return to the refrigerator to cool and set firmly. You may like to put it into individual molds or a large mold. Also, some fresh strawberries or raspberries can be added when the two whips are blended together and that adds to it in both color and flavor."

We know that each of them has knowledge on many subjects and each one has much knowledge on special subjects in which he is particularly interested. One may have a thorough knowledge of the fishing industry, thereby making his living, or he may have a complete understanding of the problems of teaching and adequate school buildings or perhaps he is familiar with problems of labor or business, with social security or with unions, or with financial laws or insurance legislation or possibly one is concerned with promotion of mining syndicates or other groups

We also know that many men seeking election have a desire only for publicity, they are opportunists looking for one more title to add to their list. These men, of course, we must steer clear of when casting our ballot. We also know that in meetings of groups such as the legislature, that many minds cannot entirely agree that there must be compromise and changes of mind. So, it is our privilege to vote on Tuesday, but it is also our duty. It is our duty to be informed, to honestly consider each candidate, to know what he stands for, and to listen with your whole mind and heart in order to know.


