# The Cook of The Month

With the appearance of the first article about Lorene Tofson we were besieged with requests for the recipe for bread which Lorene is so famous for. So now, ladies, we are very happy to print the recipe for that wonderful tender moist bread that Lorene has already shared with so many of her friends and now wishes to share with the rest of the community.

## TENDER-CRUST LIGHT BREAD

Combine: #4 cups potato water  
5 Tbs. sugar  
2 Tbs. salt  
2 cakes yeast in  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup lukewarm potato water

Add: 4 cups sifted flour.  
Beat vigorously for 2 minutes.  
Add: 5 Tbs. melted shortening  
Beat for 2 minutes or until dough "sheets" from spoon. Gradually add more flour, blending thoroughly after each addition, to make a stiff dough.  
LET SET for 20 minutes then knead dough until it "snaps" for a fine grained bread.

**COOK FOR MAY-LORENE TOFSON**  
Let Rise: In warm place (85° to 90°) until doubled in bulk, about 2 hours. Knead down and let rise again until doubled in bulk. Divide into 4 equal portions. Mold into loaves. Let rise to top of bread pans. (To make fine grained bread, divide each loaf portion into 3 equal parts and bake 3 small loaves in one loaf pan.) Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

\* Potato Water  
Cook four medium sized potatoes and mash. To one cup of mashed potatoes add 3 cups warm water.

# Plain DIRT Gardening

The rainy weather we've been having has put rather a wet blanket on the gardener as well as the garden. But while it may have dampened the gardener's enthusiasm it has done wonders for the garden. Watch that ol' dun pops out one of these days watch those green things just shoot out of the ground. There is indeed great magic in the spring rains. Each spring these questions are asked - What shall I plant? - What will do well in these parts? The extension service puts out a pamphlet listing varieties of flowers and vegetables which have been tested and proven to do well in this area. out of doors or raise asparagus doesn't mean you can't.

Trying to raise unproven varieties is part of the joy of gardening.

If you are short on good top soil or space, don't be afraid to plant a few vegetables here and there, whenever there is room. One generally thinks of a vegetable garden apart from flower gardening, but it is surprising how many vegetables can be grown in a flower bed, or edging, without detracting from the beauty of the flowers. Conversely, a few flowers make any vegetable garden more attractive.


