COOK FOR MAY
 LORENE TOFSON

Many of us have often wished for a way to liven up the bland and often characterless flavor of fish. Lorene Tofson has found that this smooth savory sauce served over broiled Halibut gives it a piquant flavor that is quite distinctive.

Cook minced onion and green pepper in tomatoes with Bay leaf and Whole Clove gently for five minutes. Make a paste of the flour, cornstarch and cold water. Add to the tomato mixture and cook five minutes longer.

BROILED HALIBUT STEAK

- One slice Halibut, 1" thick
- Melted Butter
- Lemon Juice
- Salt

Set heat control at 425°. Brush fish with melted butter and sprinkle with salt and lemon juice. Broil 10 minutes on each side. Serve with the following sauce.

SPANISH SAUCE

- 4 Tbs. minced onion
- 4 Tbs. Chopped green pepper
- 1 Cup canned tomatoes
- small piece bay leaf
- 1 whole clove
- 1/2 Tbs. flour
- 1 Tbs. Cornstarch
- 2 Tbs. Water

Plain *DIRT* Gardening



Here in Chugiak the tulips are just pushing through the newly thawed ground. The Robins arrived about ten days ago and the swallows flew in Thursday P.M. so —Spring is here! Breathes there a man with soul so dead who never to himself hath said "this year I'll raise a bumper garden". We all say it and although we realize we may not be successful in achieving our starting goal — what the heck. Another spring will be coming next year and whether we realize it or not we will have learned a lot and kept ourselves out of a lot of trouble. There is no place like a garden to get over a "mad" and diggin' in the dirt always makes a fellow feel that this old world isn't such a bad place after all.

Now is the time to set out that new bed of strawberries. Everyone knows that this is "real gone" strawberry country and there is no reason why everyone should not have a good producing bed. Strawberries should have good drainage and should never be flooded. They will definitely not survive with "wet feet". Set plants about 20 inches apart in rows 3 feet apart. After each plant has put forth enough runners to form a new plant spaced every 10

inches, nip off any new runners. Do not expect many berries the first summer but next year, Oh Boy!

So many things need doing right now one hardly knows where to begin. It is so tempting to get going and put seeds in the ground, especially here where our season is so short, but watch it Brother, watch it. Seeds will not germinate in cold ground so hold off as long as you can. Wait until the nights are frost free before planting tender annual seeds. Sweet peas and hardy annuals are an exception and can be planted as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

A sure bet if you would like a splash of color in your garden is to plant nasturtiums. "Go ape" with those nasturtium seeds and man, you can't go wrong. They're pretty and they will almost (nothing will) outdo those damnable chickweeds. More next week if spring fever or someone doesn't get me.

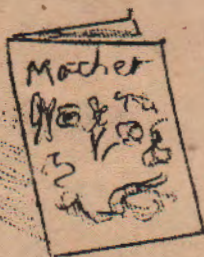

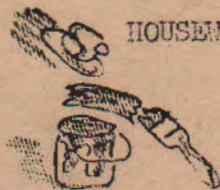
