ART WALLACE IS HERO IN NEAR TRAGEDY.

CHUGIAK VOLUNTEER

FIRE COMPANY MAKES HAZARDOUS RESCUE AT EAGLE RIVER

The Territorial Police called the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company early Sunday morning, at 12:25 a.m., to rescue Michael Hugh Dougherty, a 19 year old youth who had made a bet that he could wade the Eagle River but who got cold and panicky when half way across the icy waters. People in the Camp Ground had heard his cries for help at about 10:00 p.m. and had made a valiant effort to get a line to Dougherty and had labored in vain for over an hour and a half before the Territorial Police were notified.

The rescue crew had a difficult time finding the boy as no one was at the bridge who knew where to send them. Travelling over a rough road with the rescue wagon which had ladder and line, they just followed their instinct and took off through the camp ground, finally locating the guides who were to direct them to the scene.

Somewhere along the way the spare tire was torn from under the rescue wagon by the rough terrain - it was later found and returned by R. Anderson.

About a mile upstream from the old Eagle River Bridge the Firemen found Dougherty perched on a rock 100 feet out in the river with water up around his waist. He was numb with cold but took heart when told the Firemen were at hand. A rope was secured around Art Wallace's waist and four stout firemen held the other end while Wallace waded out into the stream and secured the end of the line to Dougherty.

Wallace proceeded to bring the boy back and both were swept off their feet by the current and had to be hauled to shore by the men on the other end of the rope. Dougherty was taken to Providence Hospital by the rescue wagon. Arthur was taken to Fire Lake Lodge in his Roman Toga for a double shot.

ROB MERRILL Writes -

Fire is the only thing I know of that can be so terrifying and at the same time so fascinating. I have always been interested in the men who devote their time to saving the lives and property of others by fighting fires and have felt that the volunteer fireman was the most intriguing of all as it seemed to me his activity was more of a hobby and permitted him to be in on all of the excitement that so entranced me. The other day I had the opportunity to go over the record of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and I was astounded at what I found hidden in the facts and figures. In one month 5 calls were answered, of which 3 were in the early a.m. and of these 3 two were on consecutive days. This meant that the men not only had to be routed out of bed at the time most of us are doing our best sleeping, and two nights in a row, but by the time they were able to return home had just enough time to eat and get ready to go to their regular jobs. My ideas of another man's hobby began to be drastically revised. Fighting fires is but part of the duty of the Volunteer Fireman for bad weather is conducive to accidents. 70% of rescue calls are made in weather conditions that are "not fit for man nor beast".

FRIENDLY NEIGHBORS

A new bread recipe is always welcome. The unusual one offered this week by Joyce Willis is especially desirable in that it provides a number of variations that can be used for any occasion.

RICH EGG BREAD

Yellow, rich and tender - a good basic dough for Swedish tea ring, dinner rolls, Cinnamon rolls, small loaves of bread or Hungarian Coffee cake.

Measure into (electric) mixing bowl:

- 1/2 cup warm water
- Add, stirring to dissolve 2 pkg. active dry yeast
- Stir in: 1 1/2 C. lukewarm milk
- 1/2 Cup sugar
- 2 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 Cup soft butter or 1/2 pf a stick of oleo and half of 7 1/4 to 7 1/2 cups sifted flour. Mix in electric mixer until smooth like cake batter, then mix enough remaining flour with spoon to handle easily. Turn onto floured board, knead, let rise and shape into loaves or rolls as desired. Bake. This keeps several days in the refrigerator.

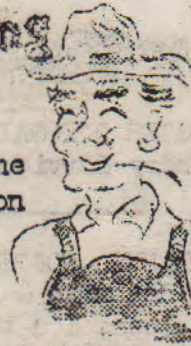

Plain DIRT Gardening



ATTENTION !!! ON CUTWORMS

The Extension Service and gardeners in both the Palmer and Anchorage area have issued warnings that the cutworms are unusually bad this summer. Cutworms are most injurious to cabbage, brussel sprouts, broccoli, and cauliflower, though they will attack other plants as well. If you find plants with stocks cut at ground level you can be fairly certain that there are cutworms in your soil. Like most criminals, they work at night, and it doesn't take them many nights to wipe out a well started garden. As always the case, prevention is better than cure, and a sure-fire prevention is to

use Chlordane or Lindane on the soil one week BEFORE PLANTING. This is also effective to a degree after the plants are up. However, if plants are up a poison bait as follows is better.

Poison Bait Formula
 One pound of wheat bran mixed dry with $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon Paris Green or White Arsenic. Wet with mixture of $\frac{1}{2}$ cup honey, cane syrup or molasses in $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of water. Scatter in flakes in the evening and rake it into the soil in the morning -- Goodbye cutworms.
