on this 15 or 20 years of
ironing right about now. If
we can't have Statehood
lets have Independence.

ROB MERRILL Writes -

It is a consoling thought to
know that in the event of
a fire or personal injury
there is a group of men who
have volunteered to protect
us.
I wish more of you could or
would take the time to inves-
tigate the Chugiak Volunteer
Fire Company as I did and I
am positive that you would
be both interested and asto-
unded at what you would find.
The cost of any single oper-
ation expressed in terms of
dollars and cents is almost
beyond belief. You have all
read about the recent rescue
of the boy in Eagle River.
But you have not read that
the rescue cost a total of
\$1,300.00.!

It is true that much of this
figure was borne by the
Federal Government. They
supplied the "chopper", the
Territory supplied the
Trouper but Chugiak Volun-
teer Fire Company supplied
the men, the equipment and
the know-how that achieved
the final result. That "know-
how" didn't just grow over-
night but is the product of
practice, discussion and
training that results in a
group of men who can work
together, follow orders and
think clearly under pressure.
This is also why many times
when we, you and I, try to
help at a fire we find that
we end up being more in the
way than helpful as we
don't know what to do, how
to do it or how to follow
directions and orders.

Therefore we should remember
that if we go to a fire the
biggest help we can offer
is to stay out of the way.

If we are needed we will be
asked and then we should
listen closely and follow
instructions to the letter.

But there is a way we can
help the Fire Company. Not
only have these men been
donating their time and ris-
king their lives for us but
they have been shouldering
the greatest part of the
financial obligation! This,
I feel, is a condition that
must be corrected. They not
only dig the potatoes, but
they also hold the bag!
When I found this condition
existed I could hardly believe
it. We can and must do our
part. It is OUR homes and
lives that are being prote-
cted and the Least we can do
is assume the obligation of
support which is our rightful
obligation to begin with.

Take stock of yourself.
What do you have invested
in your home and furnishings?
What have you done to protect
them? Do YOU think it fair
to let a few people carry
your share of the burden.

The Cook of The Month

by Rusty Bellringer

Jello desserts are ever a favorite among folk of all ages. This last recipe of Joyce Willis' is a light fluffy confection, good for either family dessert or a party.

LEMON FLUFF

One 1 1/2 oz. Can Evaporated Milk (1 3/4 cups)
 1 (4 oz.) pkg. Lemon Jello
 1 & 3/4 cups hot water
 1 Cup Sugar
 2 1/2 Cups Vanilla Wafer Crumbs
 1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
 Chill unopened can of milk in refrigerator until icy cold (overnight if possible)

Dissolve jello in hot water, chill until partially set. Whip until light and fluffy. Add lemon juice and sugar. Whip chilled milk and fold into gelatin mixture. Line bottom of 9 x13 inch pan with crumbs. Pour gelatin mix over, top with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut into squares. Serves 12. (For variations - follow same as above except use Strawberry jello. Fold in 1 pkg. frozen strawberries and omit lemon juice. Use cocoa grahan cracker crumbs)

Plain DIRT Gardening



The other morning while weeding my wildflower bed I got to thinking, "Why all this blasted chickweed?" "What is it?" So I looked it up in the book and I'll be darned if the book didn't say that there are about 100 species of Chickweed, and - of all things - Just Last Week I Planted Some! After fighting the stuff year after year I should plant it? What I planted was "snow in summer", but the books say that is one species of chickweed. So this morning during my daily battle with the stuff, it didn't seem quite so noxious as it usually does - in fact, I began to feel quite friendly toward it, thinking how, after all, it is rather pretty and will grow anywhere, even in gravel and on nearly vertical banks. I waxed real philosophical and thought how chickweed is like some people we meet. We think Joe Blow isn't of much account, then one day we meet some of his family and find that he comes from

a real distinguished family and we take a second look at Joe and by golly we find that he is a pretty good Joe, after all. Of course, if you want anything else to grow in your garden, don't get too friendly with Mr. Chickweed, just because he has some fine relatives. My advice is "kill the so and so". All garden supply stores have sprays that will kill chickweed. Here's a tip - if you plan on buying some from the Co-Op in Palmer be sure to bring a container. I had to come home without any because the day I was there they had it only in 50 gallon drums and I only wanted a quart as you mix the stuff with water about 1 part in 20. It was heartening to learn, however, that Alaskan's are waging an all out war on that pesky weed.


