## LAKE GEORGE BREAKS UP \*\*\*

The Break Up of Lake George this year was the focal point of more attention than ever in the past. The fact that a "pool" had been formed to guess the time of break-up combined with the water reaching an all-time high and doing a record amount of damage, kept this local phenomena in the headlines for several days.

Large sections of the Glenn Highway and the Alaska Railroad were washed away, leaving people stranded in both Anchorage and Palmer. Air traffic over Chugiak was quite heavy for two days as planes of all sizes ferried people between the two cities and over the lake.

Sightseers took advantage of the clearing weather to fly over the glacier and view this awe-inspiring sight. It is possible to land a light plane on the gravel bar at the foot of Knik Glacier and hike over to the channel or "chute" which the out-rushing water of the lake cuts between the glacier and the mountain. This year further evidence of the greater amount of water and force of the break-up could be seen in that the channel

## GROUP MEETS TO STUDY YOUTH PROBLEM

Two meeting to study the problems of juvenile laws and youth activities were held in Chugiak this past week. On Friday, July 18th a group of parents met at the home of Mrs. Bruce Robinson to hear a report from a group who had attended a Youth Action Committee meeting in Anchorage. The decision of the local group was that the problem was of such grave importance that the entire community should meet and discuss it. This meeting took place on July 21st at the Carnival hall and while it was not too well attended it was able to agree on the nature of the problem and to chart a course of action. A report on the weaknesses of the current juvenile laws was made by Mrs. E. Sanders, who had attended the Anchorage meeting. The Anchorage group is working to obtain proper detention facilities for juveniles as opposed to placing them in Federal Jail. The possibility of obtaining a site at Curry for a detention and correction farm was mentioned.

# Plain DIRT Gardening

Our plain dirt Gardener is on vacation this week so we will have to substitute for him. Lacking his knowledge and experience it will be a difficult job, but perhaps inexperience will in this case enable some of you to profit by our mistakes. How many have become discouraged because your garden never looks as good as your neighbors even though you care for it as well and use the same varieties of seed and fertilizers? The answer may be in that last item, fertilizer. Here in Alaska we encounter a variety of types of soil within a relatively small area. The land, particularly in this community, is a result of deposits of glacial-til of centuries ago, and seldom seems to follow any rhyme or reason. Therefore, while one combination of fertilizers may be just fine for your neighbors garden, it may be all wrong for yours. The one sure way to find out is by soil analysis. The experiment Station in Palmer offers this service free, and by sending a small sample of soil from your garden you will receive an accurate analysis of the soil content plus a prescription for the proper fertilizer to use for different crops. This service is there for your use. The employees at the Experiment Station are only too happy to supply you with this information so do not hesitate to call on them.



have been appointed to contact and notify parents of any Chugiak juveniles who may have been picked up by the Territorial Police. The Territorial Police will notify these two persons and they in turn must notify the parents of the child. This authority was granted to Mrs. Layland Jahr and Mrs. Bruce Robinson to carry out, in case the Territorial Police are not able to quickly locate the parents, by the U.S. Attorney.

The need for a youth center and planned activity for teen agers was discussed and plans are underway for organizing a project of this sort. The use of land and buildings belonging to community clubs is being investigated by a committee. A meeting of the teen agers of Chugiak has been scheduled for Monday July 28th at 8:30 p.m. at the Carnival hall, at which time the youngsters will be invited to discuss their own problems and needs. Counselors were chosen from the group of adults to meet with the young people, to hear their views and acquaint them with the various suggestions that have been made. The adult group arranged to meet again on Monday August 4th to evaluate results of this meeting.

Many homes along the Knik were inundated by the silt laden waters and suffered severe damage. The Homestead of one Chugiak family which happens to be on the bank of the river, was flooded, the water coming nearly to the windows.
