Fire!

150 ACRES DESTROYED !!

A careless camper left a fire at Beech Lake in the Birchwood area yesterday which was fanned by a stiff breeze and travelled by leaps and bounds. It was estimated by the Bureau of Land Management that 150 acres of

land would be destroyed by the fire and there was at least that much before the fire was controlled. The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company worked on it all afternoon and kept a crew on it through the night. A new Fire Company crew has been gathered today and they are still working on the remains with the aid of Forestry men. The fire is still smouldering and must be confined to the burned area. At one time during its height on Wednesday it threatened to get out of hand and if it had would have been a serious threat to residents of Birchwood.

When the news of the signing of the Statehood for Alaska Bill by the Senate of the United States came over the radio, a huge pile of tires and scrap lumber began to grow on an open piece of ground at Moose Horn. By 8:00 p.m. 150 people had gathered and added more fuel so that when the pile was lit a huge column of black smoke rose to the sky and could be seen for miles. At intervals the smoke was a brilliant red color then finally plumes of golden smoke surrounded the fire, which were symbolic of this "land of gold". Youngsters lit firecrackers and parents talked of the solemnity of the occasion.

PASTRY: Sift
2 Cups flour
1 tsp. Salt
Cut in
2/3 Cup Shortening
1/4 Cup Sharp Cheese

I don't know the history of how or when the Forget-me-not was chosen the official flower of Alaska but it was most certainly an appropriate choice.

The Forget-me-not is a symbol of friendship. Where can one find more friendship than in Alaska? Our Alaskan Forget-me-not is a true perennial. It thrives in cool damp places and is one of the easiest of our wild flowers to transplant into a cultivated garden. The Forget-me-not is easily identified by its clusters of small fine-petaled blue flowers. The plant is low and looks

scrubby but sturdy with small dull green leaves. The poem which we had hoped to find about this beloved Alaskan flower escapes us but we hope that all the gardeners and non-gardeners who have a little border to plant will be able to buy, beg or borrow a bit of Forget-me-not to have there and to delight them each year anew.


