ERNEST GRUENING IN CHUGIAK

On Sunday, August 10th at 1:00 p.m. Chugiak was honored with a visit from former Governor Ernest Gruening. With a Fire Company escort Mr. Gruening traveled to Allen's Grocery where he addressed residents who had gathered to greet him. The ex-governor dwelt very briefly on his own candidacy for the United States Senate, but stressed very strongly the importance of voting in favor of Statehood. He not only pointed out the many advantages of statehood but also emphasized the tragic setback the territory would suffer if Statehood were defeated. In answer to one of the objections which has been voiced concerning the property tax that a state would impose, he informed the gathering that territorial status is no guarantee against property taxes. A territorial legislature has as much authority to levy taxes as a state legislature, and the fact that to date there has been no property tax is no guarantee that in the future under territorial status that such immunity would continue. In fact, he pointed out, that should statehood be defeated the slump the territory would suffer as a result and the consequent loss of revenues from other sources would undoubtedly force a territorial legislature to levy even higher taxes to compensate. Mr. Gruening also answered questions concerning the borough system of local government which would come into effect under the state constitution. He urged everyone present to show their confidence in him, in the other Tennessee plan Congressmen, and in all others who had helped push the Statehood Bill through Congress by voting Statehood in by an overwhelming majority.



Seek out any mother of a batch of hungry youngsters and you are sure to find a favorite cookie recipe. The following recipe produces a large batch of sugar coated spicy cookies that are very popular with the four Laukat children and a favorite with their mother, Mayluc, as they are so easy to make.

SUGAR 'N SPICE COOKIES

3/4 cup shortening	Mix
1 cup sugar	
1 egg	

1/4 cup molasses)
 thoroughly

SIFT TOGETHER AND STIR INTO FIRST MIXTURE

2 cups flour
2 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
3/4 tsp. cloves
3/4 tsp. ginger

Mix thoroughly and form into balls the size of walnuts. Place about 2" apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake approximately 10 to 12 minutes at 375 degrees. Roll in powdered sugar while still warm. Makes 4 to 5 dozen 2" diameter.

The dining area of Fire Lake Lodge was the scene last Wednesday evening, August 6 of the fourth annual Anniversary Dinner of the Friendly Neighbor Club. This traditional affair is held once a year on the anniversary of the founding of the club in 1954. Here, the members and their guests gather to dine, reminisce and exchange gifts with their Secret Pals. It is at this dinner too, that Secret Pal Pals are revealed and names exchanged for another year of anonymous gifts and greetings. This ladies club, formed four years ago, is one of the most popular and active woman's organizations in this community. Though their by-laws limit them to being purely a social club, whenever the community is in need of workers to do the hard job of raising money or helping some youth project or other worthy cause, the Friendly Neighbors are called upon and they always manage to produce good results. 

PRESSED OR DRIED FLOWERS

Now is the time to start planning on flowers for winter bouquets. Many people are not aware that in addition to the well-known straw flowers and everlasting, most any flower, if treated properly, can be dried and preserved in all their summer beauty for winter enjoyment. To begin, the flowers must be picked when they are at their prime bloom. The best time to pick them is at mid-day on a sunny day when the blossoms will be fully open. The bunches of flowers to be dried should be hung by the stems with the blossoms down in a dark dry place, preferably an attic or dark garage. There is no limit to the varieties that can be treated in this manner, and it is interest-

ing to experiment and try different combinations for winter bouquets.

These dry blooms along with dried grasses and ferns can make many beautiful arrangements which will keep the memory of summer alive during the long winter months.

TIP FOR BERRY PICKERS

It is now berry time in Alaska and many are busy gathering the variety of berries that abound here for winter jams and jellies. Here is a handy hint to the housewife who owns a food-blender: this appliance reduces berries to the consistency required for jams in a matter of seconds, and for jellies the complete liquification of the entire fruit except the seed produces a greater amount of juice for the equal quantities of berries than any other method.

AIRSTRIP

A young, air-minded citizen of our community has added an airport to the facilities which make Chugiak one of the most up-to-date and forward looking areas in the new state. What originally was just a convenience to a couple of airplane owning friends of Walter Pippel has grown into a full scale, well maintained airfield under the capable direction of his son, David. David, himself a student pilot and member of the Civil Air Patrol, has cleared a turf runway, installed tie-down cables and arranged with a nearby Service Station to have aviation gas and oil available to transients and permanent patrons. The presence of this facility is good news to all aircraft owners in this community. It is the first time that there has been a place to tie-down aircraft that is under surveillance and safe from "plane strippers" and gas thieves whose acts can easily result in serious accidents and even death to a pilot who may take off unaware that some vital part of his plane is missing or damaged or part of his gas supply stolen. Another service that David offers patrons who tie-down is foul weather protection for their aircraft. Tie-downs are checked constantly

during wind storms, and in winter snow and frost accumulation are kept removed from wing and tail surfaces leaving the aircraft always ready for owners to warm-up and take off.

All plane owners in the community are urged to look into this convenience and to encourage this addition to the prosperity of the community.

CONSTITUTION of The State of Alaska

Continued from August 7

Section 12. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted. Penal administration shall be based on the principle of reformation and upon the need for protecting the public.

Section 13. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in cases of rebellion or actual or imminent invasion, the public safety requires it.

Section 14. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses and other property, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Section 15. No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed. No law impairing the obligation of contracts, and no law making any irrevocable grant of special privileges or immunities shall be passed. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Section 16. In civil cases where the amount in controversy exceeds two hundred fifty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve is preserved to the same extent as it existed at common law. The legislature may make provision for a verdict by not less than three-fourths of the jury and, in courts not of record, may provide for a jury of not less than six or more than twelve.
