The Chugiak Little League was honored at a banquet Wednesday evening at Spring Creek Lodge given by the sponsors of the team, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Slanker. Banquet should be written in capital letters.

The head table for the players was decorated with bat and ball place markers and a beautiful cake, and decorated by Mr. Clovis Majors, with a baseball and bat and the slogan "Twice as Strong in 1959" on the top tier.

Trophies were presented to Manager Paul Fillmore and to coaches Roger Jahnrow and Stanley Nickerson, and to sponsor Tom Slanker, by the Anchorage Sand & Gravel Co. Mr. Ian Marshall-Pryde made the presentation speech for the Sportsmanship Trophy, the recipient of which was a surprise to the entire group. The boy who rated this particular honor was Henry Tofson, who was more surprised than anyone. Manager Fillmore said that never once did Henry complain when he was pulled out of a game or not allowed in.

Mr. Aden Gates, as a parent of one of the players (the Star pitcher), expressed his gratitude to the manager, the sponsors and the coaches for the great deal of time spent with the boys and for the fine record they chalked up under these men's leadership. Rodeo AT VALLEY FAIR

Thrills aplenty will be available at the rodeo to be staged during the Matanuska Valley Fair, August 30 and September 1. The program offers a wide variety of events including saddle bronc, bareback riding, steer decorating, bull riding, calf roping, pole bending and racing. Livestock is being secured through D.M. Rock and J. Deaty, Kodiak ranchers. There are ten bucking horses coming from Big Delta. All animals will be in top shape to give all the excitement necessary to thrill the Fair audience.

As an added attraction to this year's rodeo the Interior Alaska Rodeo Association is sponsoring a drawing to be held at the close of the rodeo on September 1st. Everyone attending the rodeo will have a chance to win one of the following prizes: One two-year subscription to the magazine "Horse Lover"; one one-year subscription to "Western Horseman"; one one-year subscription to "Rodeo News"; one one-half gallon Matanuska Maid ice cream; two Matanuska Valley Vegetable salad bowls from the Palmer Cafe.

Entry to the rodeo will be purchased at a special gate just west of the log cabin. Admission prices are as follows: Adults \$1.50; Children from 12 to 18 \$.50; all children under 12 accompanied by their parents will be admitted free.

GATHY STEVENS RETURNS

COOK FOR AUGUST - MARYLEE LAUKAT

For her final recipe Marylee Laukat offers this variation of an old favorite. This recipe for Cinnamon Rolls uses a 'Quick bread' dough rather than the more common yeast dough which takes so much longer to prepare.

CINNAMON ROLLS

In a 9" square pan in which the rolls are to be baked, combine the following ingredients, bring them to a boil over medium heat and boil for 1 minute:

- 3/4 Cup Karo syrup
- 1/4 Cup Butter
- 1/4 Cup Brown Sugar

Combine and sift the following dry ingredients; blend in shortening, add milk for a soft dough.

- 3 cups sifted flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup milk

Place on a floured board. Roll into rectangle 1/4 inch thick. Spread with raisin nut filling and roll as for jelly roll. Cut into 1 inch slices and place in syrup. Bake in moderate oven (375) for 45 minutes. Let stand in the pan for about two minutes. Invert pan to remove rolls. Makes 16.

RAISIN NUT FILLING

- 1/4 cup Karo Syrup
 - 2 tbs. melted butter
- Mix and spread over surface of rolled out dough. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup brown sugar, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 cup raisins and 1/2 cup chopped nuts.

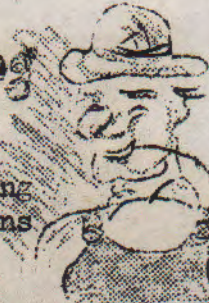

Plain DIRT Gardening



Green Onions do very well here in Alaska, and many of you have probably been enjoying them from your gardens. However, dry onions never seem to develop. While too much success with these can not be planned on, the experiment station in Palmer offers this suggestion for growing dry onions: Keep the dirt scraped away from the bulbs, leaving just barely enough to cover the roots. This will allow the bulbs to develop, and while they will probably never achieve any great size, they should grow to be large enough for table use. Of course, it is understood that these onions must be started from sets, not seed.

ANNOUNCEMENT

The Garden Club wishes to announce that this week is last call of ordering bulbs for fall planting. These bulbs, when ordered through the Garden Club, can be purchased at a 25% discount. The members of the Garden Club wish to share this saving with the community. The catalogue is at the Post Office and Paul Swanson will be there to take your order. It is hoped that these bulbs will arrive before the ground freezes, however they may be planted in frozen ground if the holes for them are dug prior to the freezing. Just pop the bulbs into the holes and cover with some dirt that has been reserved for this purpose.

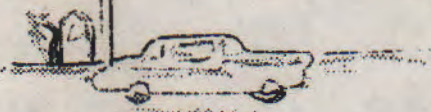

Not all flowers need to be treated for many keep well in fresh water. The formulas give below are for those you wish to keep for more than a few days or for those that have to be revived before they can be shown. All treatment should be given BEFORE the long period of keeping in deep water. The flowers should be kept out of draft and in a dark place for the soaking or treatment period.
Anaryllis, Marguerites, Gladioli, and Marigolds: Place in a solution of $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of peppermint extract in one qt. water for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour.

Asters: Let stand in a solution of one quart water with one teaspoon of sugar for one to two hours.
Dahlias, Rosess, Shasta Daisies and Poppies: Sear stems and place them in deep water.
Stock and other Woody Stemmed Flowers: Crush stems with a hammer and put in deep water and let stand for two hours before arranging.
Mums: One teaspoon clorox in one quart of water in the vase will keep the flowers for from ten days to two weeks.
