Our cook for August is a comparative new comer to our community. They have been in the Territory for eight years, the first six being spent in Fairbanks where Frank, who is a Master Sergeant in the Army, was stationed. After a short stay at Fort Lewis, Washington, the Laukats were homesick for Alaska so requested reassignment and were sent to Fort Richardson. After living on the Post for two years they decided to make Alaska their permanent home so purchased the property in Chugiak. Marylee, who was born and brought up in Portland Oregon, finds our community much to her liking. Although she has lived here only a few short months she has already shown her desire and willingness to serve the community. She volunteered to be assistant Girl Scout leader, a much needed post, and has expressed a wish to organize a Cub Scout den in her neighborhood. Marylee was Don Mother at Ft. is a member of the Eagle River Catholic Ladies Altar Society and is also active in the Ft. Richardson Catholic Church. A woman of varied talents, Marylee divides her spare time between gardening and needlework, at which she excels. She regrets that traveling as an Army wife has made it necessary for her to neglect her piano playing to which she had devoted many years of training. We are happy to introduce to you Marylee Laukat. The following recipes will show that she is also a talented cook.

Here is a favorite of the Laukat family- tangy barbecued spareribs, oven cooked and not at all greasy; the objection so many find to this cut of pork.

BARBECUED SPARERIBS
3 lbs. neaty spareribs
Broil until all fat has been rendered out and

they are crispy all over (takes about 20 to 30 min.)

SAUCE:

- 4 tbs. minced onion
- 1 cup tomato puree
- 3/4 cup water
- 3 tbs. vinogar
- 2 tbs. Worcestershire Sauce
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. cinnanon
- Dash ground cloves

Combine all ingredients and bring to a boil. Pour over broiled ribs and put in a 350 degree oven for 2 hours. Keep ribs covered with foil or in a covered roaster all during baking. Add 6 medium potatoes (boiled and quartered) during last 30 minutes. Serves 6.

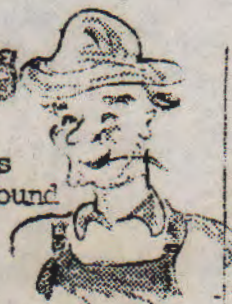

Plain DIRT Gardening



SPRING BULBS

Fresh snow on the mountain peaks reminds us that the time to plant bulbs before the ground is frozen is swiftly approaching. Daffodils and narcissus do very well here. If possible plant them on the south side of a house and four or five inches deep (to prevent heaving by the frost.). Use manure (rotted) or bonemeal or both and divide when the bulbs become too crowded, about every three years. Tulips are hardy if planted four to six inches deep to avoid heaving by frost. Use bonemeal, rotted manure or both when planting and around plants each year. Grape hyacinth, (Muscaris), scilla and snowdrops are some of the first flowers in the spring and need no special care except planting deep enough to avoid heave. Crocus are only partially satisfactory, although they are hardy, for they don't always bloom. Hyacinth are not hardy here. When ordering bulbs, be sure to request they be shipped as early as possible. They seem to grow as long as they are planted before the ground freezes. The Garden Club is at present attempting to secure bulbs at a reduced rate through quantity buying. Anyone interested in ordering bulbs should contact Paul Swanson at the Chugiak Post Office, Ho. 5590.

Mr. Ward is one of Anchorage's most prominent gardeners and has many slides of his lovely garden so this promises to be a most interesting meeting.

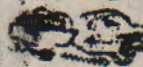

THE CONSTITUTION of The State of Alaska

Continued from July 31st.

Section 9. No person shall be put in jeopardy twice for the same offense. No person shall be compelled in any criminal proceeding to be a witness against himself.

Section 10. Treason against the State consists only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

Section 11. In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall have the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of twelve, except that the legislature may provide for a jury of not more than twelve nor less than six in courts not of record. The accused is entitled to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be released on bail, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident or the presumption great; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.
