The Cook of The Month

For her final recipe, Liz Harriman offers this favorite donut, which is made with a sweet dough that requires no icing or sugar coating.

DELECTABLE DONUTS

Makes 3 dozen.

$\frac{1}{2}$ cup Fluffo
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
4 cups flour
4 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla

CREAM: shortening, sugar
and eggs

COMBINE: dry ingredients and
add alternately with

milk and vanilla stirring
after each addition until
well blended. Dough should
be soft and a little sticky.
Divide dough into 3 parts
and chill for 1 hour.

ROLL $\frac{1}{3}$ dough at a time
to $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thickness on a
lightly floured board and
cut with donut cutter. Fry
in salad oil heated to 365°.
As soon as donuts rise to
top of oil, turn, then turn
again when light brown.
Continue turning until they
are the desired shade of
brown. Drain on paper tow-
els.

This dough will keep in the
refrigerator up to 2 weeks.

Plain DIRT Gardening

Fall seems to be the proper time to fertilize strawberries, since application in the spring may give beautiful large leaves but few strawberries, as this gardener has painfully discovered. Manure is excellent applied alongside the rows. Superphosphate is also recommended, while other gardeners advise using bone-meal since it is slow acting. Another novel mulching suggestion is to use wet newspapers with peat on top. Grass clippings are excellent to use as a mulch around strawberries.

When dahlia bulbs are dug in the fall is a good time to divide them since the eyes can be seen more readily now than in the spring when they are dried out. Begonia bulbs may also be cut at this time into three sections. Dry off dahlia bulbs after digging, shake off loose dirt and store upside down in a box lined with newspaper and place in a cool, dark place. In late fall some gardeners cut back delphinium close to the ground. All bushes may be safely moved now.

Hardy annual and perennial seed may be sown in late fall just before the ground has frozen for the winter. Do not sow too early or they will begin to germinate. Prepare the beds in the usual manner, and cover in the same depth of soil as in spring planting. You may get only 30% germination in the spring, but the plants will be sturdier and 6 to 8 weeks ahead of those started indoors or in a greenhouse.

Gardener DICK HANNEN says that the tips for keeping flowers as printed in the Courier of August 28th, are very good tips; they really do preserve the flowers.
