Family of Five Nearly Perish

PETERS CREEK:

O.W. Lowe of mile 23 and his family narrowly escaped death when they were overcome by gases escaping from a coal range last Thursday October 15th.


The Lowes had been living in a tent when the cold weather forced them to move into the partially finished basement of the house they are building.

The second-hand coal, wood & oil combination range which they had purchased seemed to be using the fuel too rapidly, and Mr. Lowe (Bill) removed the stove lids to slow the burning. However he neglected to replace them before retiring, and the improper draft caused partial combustion and the formation of deadly coal gas.

Probably the only thing that prevented the entire family from dying in their sleep was the fact that they were all in sleeping bags, with their faces partially covered.

The first they realized that something was wrong was one of the children, 12 year old Kitty, felt ill and upon getting out of bed breathed deeply of the gas and collapsed on the floor.

Mr. Lowe attempting to assist the child also collapsed. His wife, Cindy, after attempting to help, finally managed to make her way to the home of a neighbor, Norris Tiensvoldt, who also fortunately happened to be a member of the Chug-

FIRE LAKE: Mrs. Al Smallwood of the Fire Lake Service was accidentally shot in the hip by her husband earlier this week when he mistook her for a prowler.

Mr. Smallwood stated that he was awakened at approximately 2 am Monday morning by the sounds of someone prowling around.

Since the Service Station receipts are usually quite large after a weekend, he was afraid that someone was intent on robbing him and taking his 45 revolver, he went up-stairs to investigate.

Smallwood said that he no sooner was upstairs than he realized the prowler was in the basement apartment that he had just left.

He returned downstairs, moving quietly, meanwhile, his wife who was unaware of all this had gotten out of bed and switched on the room-light just as he entered the room. Smallwood said he pulled the trigger purely as a reflex upon seeing the light.

He realized the mistake almost immediately, and called the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. ambulance who transported Mrs. Smallwood to Providence Hospital, where she is recovering from the wound.

In the excitement the prowler made his escape through the open basement door through which he had entered. However, upon investigation nothing was found to be missing.

LOCAL PILOTS AID IN
SEARCH FOR LOST AIRCRAFT

Two Pilots from Chugiak
and a number from the Pal-
mer area took part in the
search for a plane in which
George Hawley and Mr. &
Mrs. John Dryden of Pal-
mer were flying in when
they disappeared a week
ago Saturday.

Ed Bellringer and Dave
Pipple of Chugiak, along
with Jack Dodge, Jan Kos-
losky, Lee Hartley, Jim
Woods, Ralph Crowthers,
Jack Whitaker and others
from Palmer joined the
Anchorage Airmen and 71st
Rescue in an extensive se-
arch of the Lake Clark
area where the plane had
last been seen.

Major Kearney of the 71st
Rescue was based at Tanalian
Point on Lake Clark, and
from there directed a co-
ordinated search.

Gasoline for the 18 pri-
vate planes that were search-
ing from that base had been
provided by the Anchorage
Airmans Association and
had been flown into the
Lake Clark Strip by an Air
Force C-123.

The participating air-
craft were given definite
areas to search by the Ar
Force Co-ordinator and the
areas covered ranged from
the Mushigak River, south
to the south shores of
Lake Illiamna and North to
the Lime Hills. Also
the shores of Cook inlet
and all bays were scanned.

The failure of the pilot
to file a flight plan made
it necessary to search
more or less blindly over
large areas. (cont page 3



One of our good neighbors called HO-2-5555 (an easy number to remember, by the way), and Art Wallace (assistant chief) and Chief Jess Straight and Fireman Chick LaDoux were at the house almost before we realized they had been called. The three men took very good care of our children, persuading them to drink warm milk, and to put the oxygen mask over their faces, never frightening them at all. We adults were well taken care of too, but, being parents, were more concerned for our children's well-being.

They stayed with us until we were sufficiently recovered to be left in the capable hands of our neighbors, the Tienvolds. We are proud to live in a community with such fine people.

Our deep gratitude and heartfelt thanks to all of them.

The Chugiak rescue truck responded along with another vehicle belonging to Fireman Chick LaDoux. Jess Straight and Art Wallace of the Fire Co. arrived with the ambulance.

The victims were given oxygen and other first aid, but it was determined that hospitalization would not be necessary.

It was agreed that the prompt action of Tiensvoldt was largely responsible for saving the lives of the Lowes, even though he also received a small amount of the poison gas while helping the Lowe's from the room.

The family is now completely recovered.

Occupants of the car, which was driven by Curfis (Red) Olson of Post Engineers Supply, Ft. Rich, were Mary Ann Tofson 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ingvol Tofson of Birchwood and Al Collesbrusco, also of Ft. Rich.

The car rolled over at least four times before coming to rest at the bottom of the dump. Mary Ann was thrown clear, while the driver, Olson managed to extricate himself from the wreckage. Ceoosbrusco, however suffered a broken shoulder and was unable to leave the vehicle.

Olson managed to hike out to the Highway, where he flagged a car. The driver of the car assisted in helping Collesbrusco from the wreck and took all three young people to Moosehorn, where the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. ambulance took over, transporting them to the 5040th AF Hospital.

Aside from minor cuts and bruises Olson and Miss Tofson were uninjured.


expressed to these fine people.

They felt that if there was anyone surviving the crash they would have had a fire, and with the weather crystal clear as it was over the weekend, any smoke would have been seen for miles.

Another factor which made the search difficult was that the missing plane, a Stinson Voyager had been painted white, a color that is impossible to spot on a snow-covered landscape.



LEMON PIE (Texas Style)

CRUST:

$\frac{1}{3}$ cup butter
 $\frac{1}{3}$ cup margarine
(Have these heated to room temp. but not melted)
4 heaping tbs. sifted powdered sugar.
Dash salt
2 cups all purpose flour
CREAM sugar and butter
ADD flour etc.
WORK into a ball
DIVIDE into 2 parts
PAT into pans. Don't pull over sides. After patting into pans stack in refrig. w/oiled paper in between.

FILLING:

1 cup boiling water
1 cup sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cornstarch
3 eggs
 $\frac{1}{4}$ stick margerine
Juice of 1 large lemon
MIX sugar & cornstarch, thoroughly.
POUR boiling water over this & put back on stove, stirring constantly, until mixture becomes clear & thick.
MIX immediately in slightly beaten egg yolks, juice & butter.

MERANGUE:

BEAT egg whites slightly and add $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp cream of tartar. BEAT until firm, but not dry. Add 4 tbs. sugar, one at a time and beat until it stands in peaks. DO NOT BEAT UNTIL DRY. Cook in very slow oven 250° to 300° until brown.

ESTABLISHMENT OF REST CAMPS TO BE DISCUSSED

JUNEAU: Governor Egan has
made public a memorandum of
agreement calling for consulta-
tion between the Alaskan Air
Command and the State
Department of Fish and Game
in connection with future
military proposals for
establishment of rest camps
and recreational areas.

Commissioner C. L Anderson
says: "IN interest of co-
ordination and conservation
of wildlife resources, the
Alaskan Command when activ-
ating a rest camp or recrea-
tion area will seek the com-
ments of Alaska State Depart-
ment of Fish and Game in all
cases where hunting and fish-
ing will be a major activity
in the proposed area. Due
consideration will be given
these comments in determin-
ing the advisability of es-
tablishing the same or area".

By reason of the agree-
ment, Anderson said, it is
hoped the State will be able
to persuade the services to
place such recreational areas
in locations where other
hunting and fishing pres-
sures are light.






