Therefore we find it almost impossible to believe when a piece of mail goes astray or is delivered incorrectly. Well the mail service is as infallable as it's only

too human mail carrier.

We have talked about this subject in the past, but we feel that it is still of enough importance to mention it again.

In order to expect prompt accurate delivery of mail, it is necessary to follow the few simple rules as to correct addressing.

committed by adressers of mail is to mark a piece of mail Star Route, Chugiak. THERE IS NO SUCH ADDRESS! All mail marked Chugiak will stay right in the Chugiak post office for those who have rented P.O. boxes or who use the General Delivery Service.

All Star Route boxes in the Chugiak Area are Star Route Anchorage. To mark a piece of mail as "Star Route Chugiak, Anchage Alaska" is really cor fusing the issue.


For new residents of the area, it will help the mail carrier if you mlace the place mile post location on your address. But for heavens sake, be sure that you have the right mile post. There is about a two mile stretch of road in the Eagle River Area along which every researed ident claims is "mile 14".

Another thing is the use of accepted types of mailboxes. With the coming of winter and snowy roads, boxes that are placed to low or too far from the road make it difficult for the carrier to place the mail and slow him along his route.

Our local carrier serves three post offices, Anchorage, Chugiak and Palmer; as well as two Star Routes (Anchorage and Palmer); so you see it would be next to impossible for him to remember all the names and correct addresses of the patrons who he serves.

So the next time that you feel inclined to complain because you are having trouble with your mail, stop and think. Have you been using the correct address?
