INVENTOR VISITS HERE

John L. Joslin, formerly of Whitefish Montana has been a recent visitor in Chugiak.

Joslin, a construction engineer by profession lists among his other accomplishments the invention of an altimeter which he says will automatically adjust itself for the different

barometric pressure of the atmosphere through which an airplane might be flying. Conventional barometers require constant re-setting to compensate for the changing barometric pressures which could cause them to give inaccurate readings. Joslin's altimeter does this automatically, thus insuring a reading that is always correct.

CONFUSION ON THE
MAIL ROUTE !

Most of us have become so
accustomed to mail service
without a hitch that we have
come to look upon the postal
department as infallible.

Therefore we find it almost
impossible to believe when
a piece of mail goes astray
or is delivered incorrectly.

Well the mail service is
as infallible as it's only
too human mail carrier.

We have talked about this
subject in the past, but we
feel that it is still of
enough importance to men-
tion it again.

In order to expect prompt
accurate delivery of
mail, it is necessary to
follow the few simple
rules as to correct ad-
dressing.

The most common "crime"
committed by addressers
of mail is to mark a piece
of mail Star Route, Chu-
giak. THERE IS NO SUCH
ADDRESS! All mail marked
Chugiak will stay right
in the Chugiak post office
for those who have rented
P.O. boxes or who use the
General Delivery Service.

All Star Route boxes in
the Chugiak Area are Star
Route Anchorage. To
mark a piece of mail as
"Star Route Chugiak, Anch-
age Alaska" is really con-
fusing the issue.

For new residents of the
area, it will help the
mail carrier if you
place the place mile
post location on your
address. But for heav-
ens sake, be sure that
you have the right mile
post. There is about a
two mile stretch of road
in the Eagle River Area
along which every resi-
dent claims is "mile 14".

Another thing is the
use of accepted types of
mailboxes. With the com-
ing of winter and snowy
roads, boxes that are
placed to low or too far
from the road make it
difficult for the car-
rier to place the mail
and slow him along his
route.

Our local carrier serves
three post offices,
Anchorage, Chugiak and
Palmer; as well as two
Star Routes (Anchorage
and Palmer); so you see
it would be next to im-
possible for him to re-
member all the names
and correct addresses of
the patrons who he serves.

So the next time that
you feel inclined to
complain because you are
having trouble with your
mail, stop and think.
Have you been using
the correct address?

Any questions on this
subject will be happily
answered by your post-
master Paul Swanson.

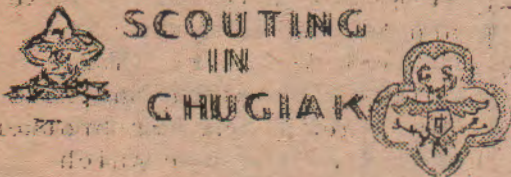

COOK FOR OCTOBER

BARBARA BRAUNER

Barbara places a good deal of importance on the appearance of food and particularly to salads, which she loves to make. She also feels that the dressing is just as important as the the fruit or vegetables that go to make up a salad and for her last appearance as cook of the month, she gives us three different dressings, each of which will do much to liven up even the plainest of salads.

GARLIC DRESSING:

- 1 cup salad or olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, grated
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 tsp Tabasco
- 1/4 tsp dry mustard
- 1/2 tsp celery salt
- 1 tsp salt

COMBINE: ingredients in jar (next col.)

(Cook of the month) SHAKE. Makes good dressing for tossed salads served with Italian Foods, meat-Ball dishes etc.

FRUIT SALAD DRESSING:

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp cornstarch
- 1 egg yolk
- 3 tbs lemon juice
- 1/2 cup pineapple juice
- 1 cup whipped cream

COMBINE all ingredients except whipped cream.

COOK over low heat until thick.

COOL and fold in whipped cream. Serve over mixed fruit salad on lettuce leaves.

ROQUEFORT CHEESE DRESSING

- 1 small package roquefort
- 1/2 carton cottage cheese
- 1 tsp dry mustard
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1/2 pint whipping cream (whipped)

Sieve roquefort and cottage cheese.

MIX thoroughly.

ADD seasonings

FOLD mixture into whipped cream.

(For economy, 1 cup thick butter milk may be substituted for whipped cream

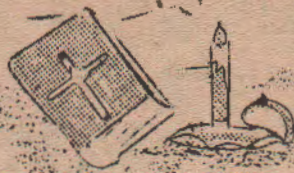

Rev. Frank Miller of the Birchwood Baptist Church (no longer a mission) has offered to conduct a question and answer column on the Bible for the benefit of our readers.

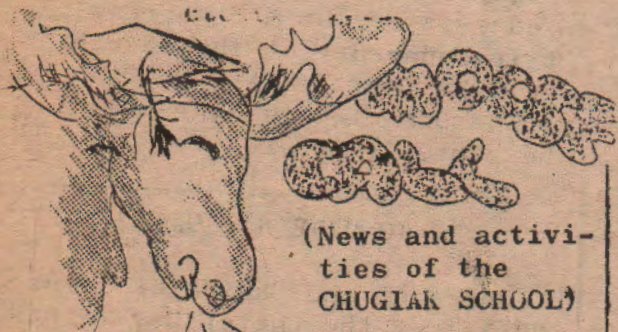
