## woman killed in Highway wreck

A woman was killed when the car in which she and nine others were riding overturned and was wrecked at mile 33 Glenn H'way on Sept. 30th.

Dead is Mrs. Sophia Prokopeuff, aged 38. Other members of the group were her husband, Steve Prokopeuff who suffered a broken foot, Simon Chilligan and five members of his family, the driver Max Yaka assoff and one other.

Word of the wreck was called in by an ACS lineman who happened along shortly after the accident took place. He climbed a pole and tapped into the wires and called both the Chugiak and the Palmer Ambulances.

Injured persons were transported to the Valley Hospital in Palmer by both ambulances. A small boy, son of Chilligan was transferred to the ANS Hospital in Anchorage by a military helicopter.

The car, a '49 or '50 Plymouth Station wagon had apparently been traveling too fast and had been unable to negotiate the turn. The vehicle was a total wreck.

## Vernon Haik-Appointed to state Board

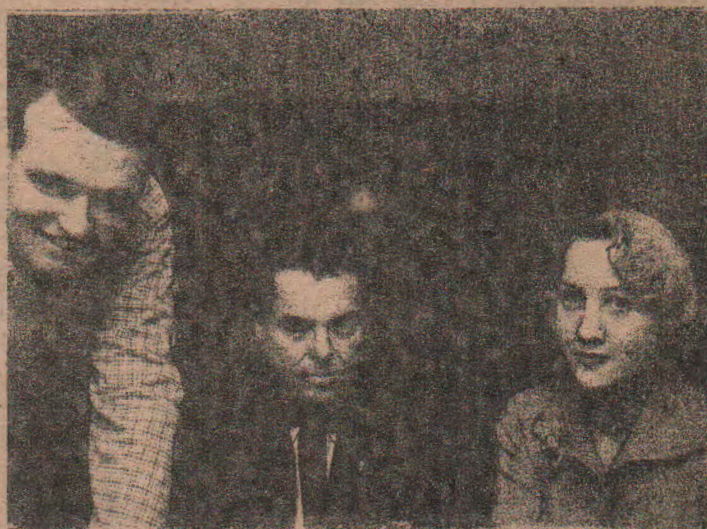
Vernon Haik, resident of Chugiak and owner of Spring Creek Lodge, a mile 20½ has been appointed by Governor Egan to serve on the newly created Real Estate Examining Board.

Haik, along with Ray R. Regan of Ketchikan and John Pasley of Fairbanks have been named by Egan, the appointments to run for four years subject to confirmation by the State Legislature.

Members serve without pay, but receive per diem allowances and transportation expenses when functioning as board members.

The board takes the place of the former commission which was abolished by the Legislature in its organization of State government. It is responsible for the examination and licensing of real estate brokers, associate brokers and real estate salesmen in the State.

at these places.

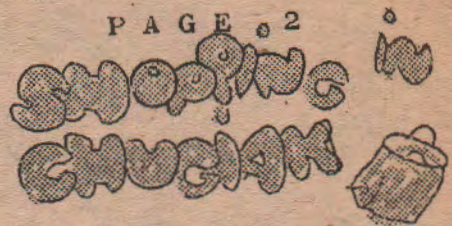
We hope that we can serve

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK PROCLAIMED

Governor Wm. A. Egan has proclaimed the week of Oct. 4-10 as Fire Prevention Week in Alaska.

The proclamation calls on all Alaskans to "take cognizance of the need for maintaining a constant state of alertness to the causes and dangers of fire, and to cooperate with State and local fire officials and their representatives in programs aimed at fire prevention."

BIOLOGIST ADDRESSES SPORTSMEN

Mr. Al Erickson, game biologist for the Alaska Dept. of Fish and Game, addressed the monthly meeting of the Matanuska Valley Sportsmen last Thursday.

He told of a proposed plan whereby there would be a special season on moose in the Palmer and South Kenai areas. This would be drawing of permits to shoot moose of any age and any sex.

He explained that killing of a large percentage of mature bulls each year has so disturbed the natural balance of the herds, that there is now insufficient forage in these areas to support the animals and consequently a great number are expected to die of starvation this winter.

He stated that the Dept. wanted the public to understand how the taking of cows and immature bulls would actually improve the herd and allow more animals to survive the winter.

He cited the case of caribou, where both cows and bulls may be taken. These herds increase at the rate of 20% annually as opposed to the estimated 10% that are taken by hunters.

Although some may find it difficult to accept the fact that the killing of female animals will

actually cause the herds to increase; never the less, this has been proved in states where the shooting of does was allowed on a limited permit basis, as is being planned here. This can be compared to eating your cake and having it too.

He also mentioned that in some states in addition to the permits issued in drawings, landowners were issued permits to shoot does on their own property.

This has not been planned in the proposed program; however if public sentiment indicates that they would be in favor of the latter, it may be considered.

Mostly, he concluded, the Dept. is very anxious to know what the public reaction will be to such a program and invites any comment or questions on the subject.

Following his talk, the Sportsmen took a vote and went on record as being in favor of such a program as outlined.

Any questions or comment on the subject may be addressed to the Alaska Dept. of Fish and Game.

Before this program will be instituted, a survey of public opinion will be sought.

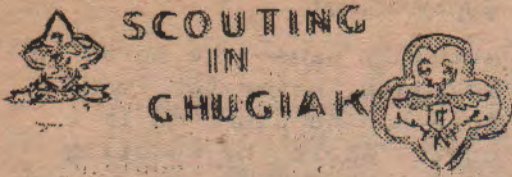

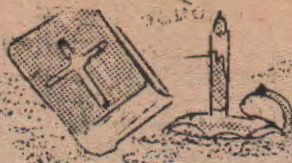

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

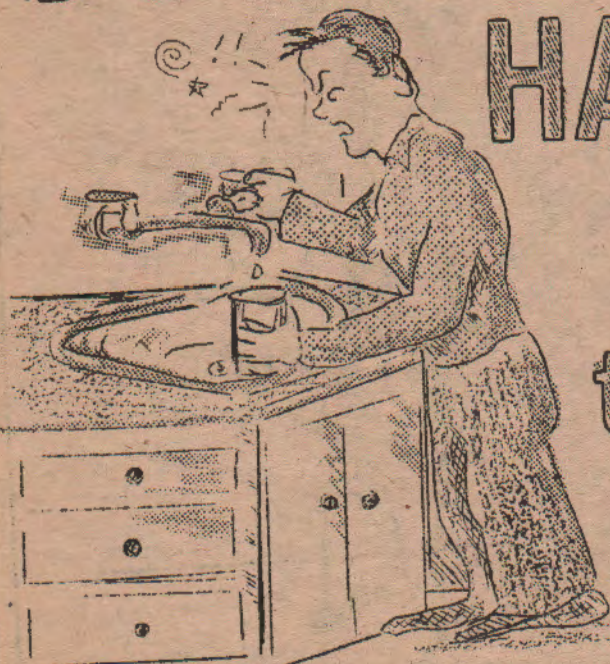
Here is the first comment from our readers on the suggestion that the Capitol of Alaska should be moved to this area.

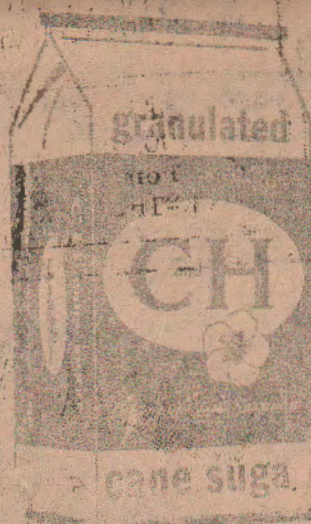
