some other states.

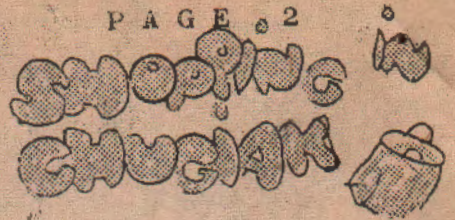
