Each year the showing of these movies brings the same problems. For the most part, children are brought to the school by their parents who then leave and return to pick them up after the show is over.

Frequently these children are quite young and not inclined to sit quietly in their seats creating a lot of work for the PTA monitors present.

The most serious problem however, is the children who's parents are not wait ing for them when the movie is over; leaving the child to either wait alone at the deserted school, or






