Minister's car is stolen

Late Saturday night, or early Sunday morning a 1954 Ford sedan belonging to Rev. Frank Miller of the Birchwood Baptist Church, was stolen from the foot of Eagle River hill where he had been forced to leave it after a break down.

When Rev. Miller went to recover his car, and found it missing, he at first assumed the State Police had impounded it. However, a phone call soon proved this not to be the case.

Realizing that the thief would attempt to get the car out of sight as soon as possible, Rev. Miller turned detective and found the car abandoned a mile beyond the first turn off, on the road leading to the Eagle River campground.

The windshield and the battery had been stolen, but strangely, the spare tire and a battery charger on the back seat had not been touched. All doors of the car had been left open, and the lid to the trunk forced.

Rev. Miller reported the theft of his car, and it's subsequent recovery to the State Police, but they are not investigating the matter.

Fire Prev. Assoc. Directors Resign

Three directors of the Chugiak Fire Prevention Association, Mrs. Charles (Alice) Ranger, Walter Pipple and Tom Towne resigned from the board of Directors at the regular monthly meeting last Wednesday. The resignations were in protest to the boards failure to take any action to eliminate the "Two company concept" for providing the community adequate fire protection.

The resigning members stated they were not against any individual member of the Association or the Fire Company, but were emphatic in stating that they would not continue to serve on the Board "when the Association can exercise no control, and is nothing more than a fund provider for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co." Attempts to purchase a new "crash wagon" and build a fire hall, since the resigning members were elected in July, (cont page 5 col 2)

PTA MOVIES

This Friday marks the be-
ginning of the "Theatre
Season" for Chugiak.

Each year the PTA shows
a series of full length
movies on Alternate Fri-
days.

The purpose of these show-
ings is merely to provide
movies for the children
of the community, who
otherwise might not get
any opportunity to at-
tend. The admission fee
is merely to cover the
rental of the film, and
any profits that may be
realized are used for
the maintenance of the
equipment.

Each year the showing
of these movies brings
the same problems. For
the most part, children
are brought to the sch-
ool by their parents who
then leave and return
to pick them up after the
show is over.

Frequently these child-
ren are quite young and
not inclined to sit quiet-
ly in their seats creating
a lot of work for the PTA
monitors present.

The most serious problem
however, is the children
who's parents are not wait-
ing for them when the
movie is over; leaving the
child to either wait alone
at the deserted school, or

(PTA movies)

Making it necessary for the
monitor to remain with the
youngsters until the par-
ents arrive.

This is an unfair impos-
ition on these people who
have already given of their
time to bring entertainment
to our children.

As we mentioned, this prob-
lem and others crop up every
year, and there have been
some lively discussions of
them in the past at PTA meet-
ings.

The members of the movie
committee have informed us
that the shows are over at
9:30 and request that paren-
ts be waiting for the young-
sters at that time.

However, it is preferred,
particularly in the case of
the first and second graders
and even the pre-schoolers
that that the parents plan to
attend with them and relieve
the monitors of having to
"police" small patrons who's
attention frequently wanders.

The movies selected are
those which are primarily in-
tended to appeal to children,
but like most such movies
they have a universal appeal
and the parents should find
them equally enjoyable.

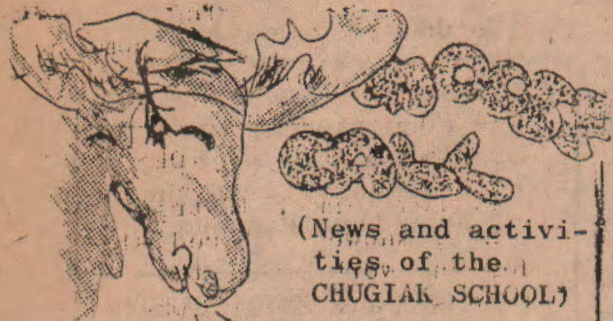

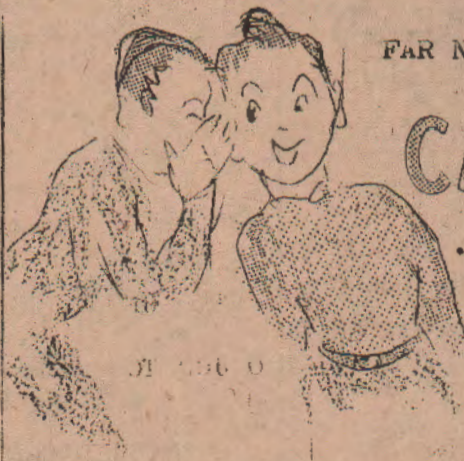

"Either of the suggested methods would insure that the people of the community would have a vested interest in fire and safety protection and would not be limited to financing a poorly organized and closed corporation.

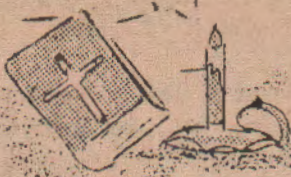

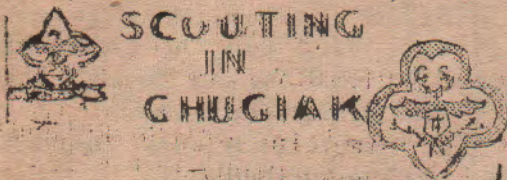

The Cook of the Month



COOK FOR NOVEMBER,

PHYLLIS STEWART

Every once in a while we all find an occasion when a fancy cake is called for, and it for this occasion that Phyllis saves her recipe for:

BONBON CAKE

(Makes 2 8 inch layers)

SIFT together:

- 1 3/4 cups sifted flour
- 2 1/2 tsp. double-acting baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt.

COMBINE:

- 2 squares chocolate (finely cut and
- 5 tbs. boiling water

STIR until smooth and of custard consistency.

CREAM 1/2 cup butter (half shortening may be used)

ADD gradually 1 1/2 cups sugar creaming well.

ADD cooled chocolate & 1 tsp vanilla.

BLEND IN 4 egg yolks one at (next col)

(cook)

at time. Beat 1 minute. MEASURE 1/2 cup milk Add alternately with dry ingredients. Blend thoroughly after each addition. (Low speed on electric mixer.)

BEAT 4 egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Fold gently but thoroughly into batter.

POUR into 2 well greased & floured 8 inch layer pans

BAKE in mod. oven 350° 30 to 35 minutes. Cool layers fill with bonbon filling and frost.

BONBON FILLING

- COMBINE 1 cup sugar
- 6 tbs water
- 1 1/2 tsp corn sugar
- 1/8 tsp salt in a saucepan

COOK over low heat until sugar dissolves.

COVER saucepan and cook 2 to 3 minutes. Uncover, continue cooking until syrup reaches soft ball stage (236°). Remove from heat.

BEAT 1 egg white until stiff. Add hot syrup slowly, beating constantly.

BLEND IN 1/2 tsp vanilla.
