

FORMER POSTMASTER FOUND DEAD

The frozen body of Dick Evans, 47 of Eklutna Village was found lying in the road approximately 200 yards from his home.

The body was discovered at 10:30 am on November 20th (last Friday), by one of his neighbors.

Word of the death was sent to Allens Grocery at mile 23, from which place the State Police were called and also the Chugiak Fire Co. who stood by until the police could arrive.

The exact cause of Evans death has not yet been determined, although the police have stated that they could find no marks or bruises on the body that might indicate foul play.

Mike Alex of Eklutna stated that he had last seen Evans the previous evening when he and several others had dropped in to watch TV. He said that Evans had watched TV for a while consumed not more than two beers and left around 7:30pm. That was the last that he was seen alive. The police have ruled out the possibility that Evans may have been intoxicated and believe that his death was caused by a heart attack or other natural causes.

Evans, an Alaskan native was born in Knik and has lived at Eklutna for a number of years. He was at one time the postmaster at Eklutna and also taught at the vocational school there.

He had been working as a carpenter lately and was a member of the carpenters union. He had no immediate family and his only living relative was a third cousin, Ruth Esi of Eklutna.

We refer to the deadline for news items, which we have been listing as 6 pm on Tuesdays. When this time was established, it was meant to apply only to late news items that could be squeezed in to spaces that were reserved for such.

However, bit by bit, it has been interpreted to mean the deadline for all news items, and so club reporters have been waiting until the last minute to submit routine reports that could be sent in earlier, and consequently making it more and more difficult to complete the paper in time.

Therefore, it will be necessary in the future to change the deadline to 24 hours earlier, 6 pm on Mondays.

Of course we still plan whenever possible to print the last minute news that we learn about, and in the case of meetings which take place after the deadline whose business is of immediate importance, such as the Tuesday PTA meetings.

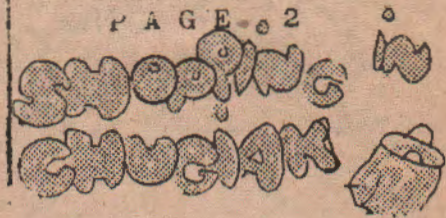
But in the case of church and school news, and other club reports, they will have to be turned in by 6 PM on Monday in order to be considered for that week's issue of the Courier.

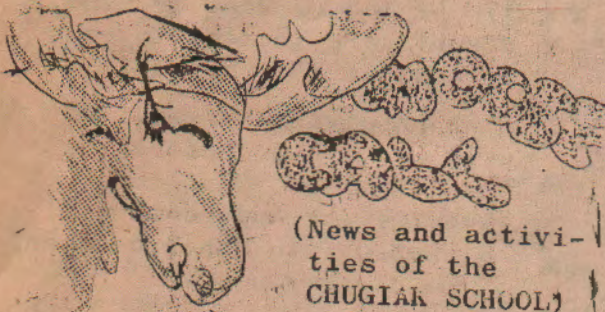

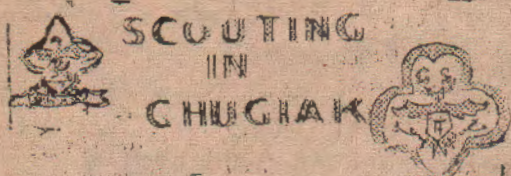

PHYLLIS STEWART

For her final recipe, Phyllis offers an unusual pie which is very rich and an ideal dessert to be served at a ladies luncheon or tea.

CHOCOLATE-CHIP WALNUT PIE

- 1 unbaked 9" pie shell
- 3 eggs
- 1/8 tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 1/4 cups white corn syrup
- 2/3 cups walnut halves
- 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
- Walnut halves

MAKE 9" pie shell, set aside

BEAT eggs with fork in medium sized bowl

ADD salt, vanilla, sugar corn syrup, beating until just well blended

STIR in 2/3 cups walnut halves and semisweet chocolate pieces.

POUR mixture into unbaked pie shell

BAKE at 375° for 45 minutes OR until top is evenly puffed up and starts

SERVE warm slices topped with whipped cream and walnut halve

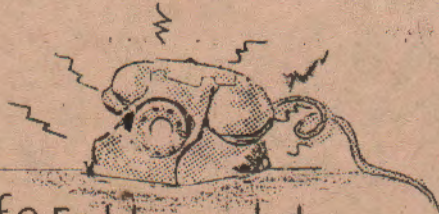

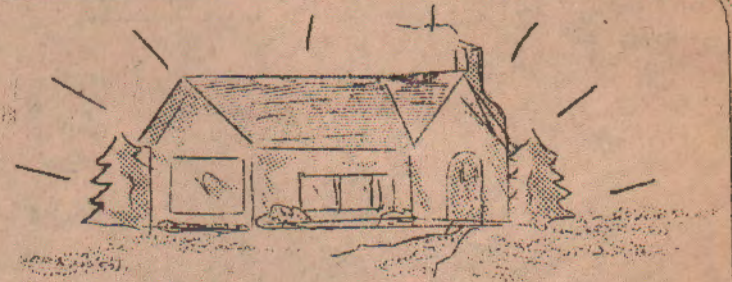

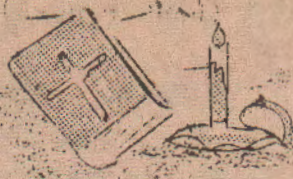
