5 year old Dies

Five year old Jan Crabtree, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Crabtree of Birchwood died at Providence Hospital on Tuesday, October 27th.

The boy had been taken to the hospital a week prior to his death with strange symptoms that included vomiting of blood.

He appeared to be recovering when he took a sudden turn for the worse and died shortly afterward.

He is survived by his parents and two brothers Frank and Larry and Tina a sister.

Funeral services were held Saturday at the St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Anchorage.

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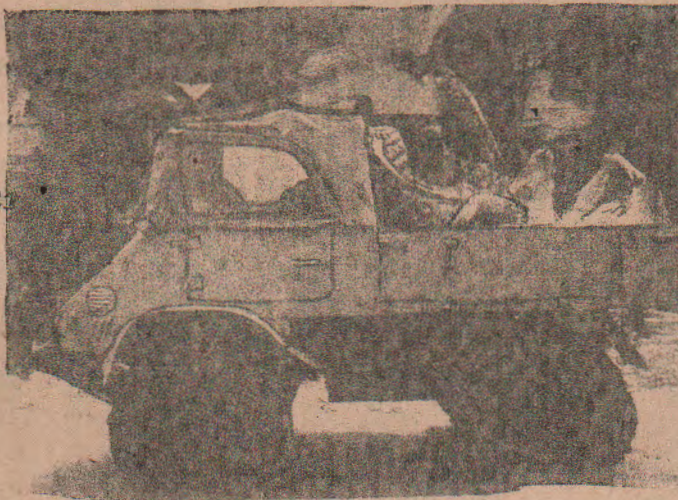
MAILBOXES DAMAGED BY HIT and RUN DRIVER

FACTORY PRODUCED SWAMP BUGGY AVAILABLE HERE

A vehicle, which was primarily designed as a farm tractor, but whose chief appeal to Alaskans will be its adaptability as a "swamp buggy" for hunting, is now available in Anchorage.

The Unimog, as it is called, is manufactured by the Mercedes-Benz company in West Germany and distributed in the United States by the Curtis Wright Corp. The local dealer is Nu-Car Sales of Anchorage.

This remarkable vehicle, which has the appearance of a high wheeled pick-up truck, was intended to be a universal farm machine. It has power take-off at both the front and back to which an amazing number of accessories can be attached. To name a few, a winch, plow, blade, sweeper, mower, back-hoe and many more. Being diesel powered, it is a very economical vehicle to operate and has an advantage over most other four wheel drive outfits in that it can be engaged in four wheel drive while in motion, nor is

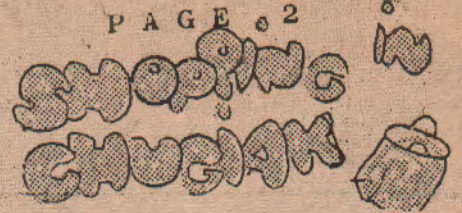

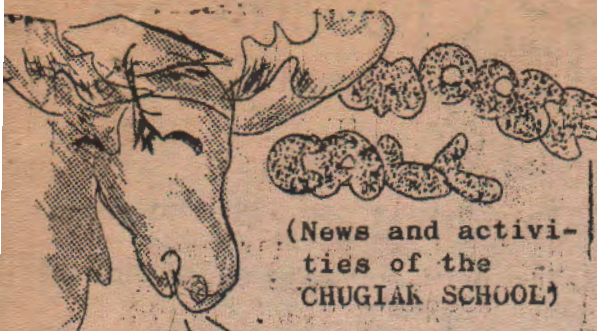

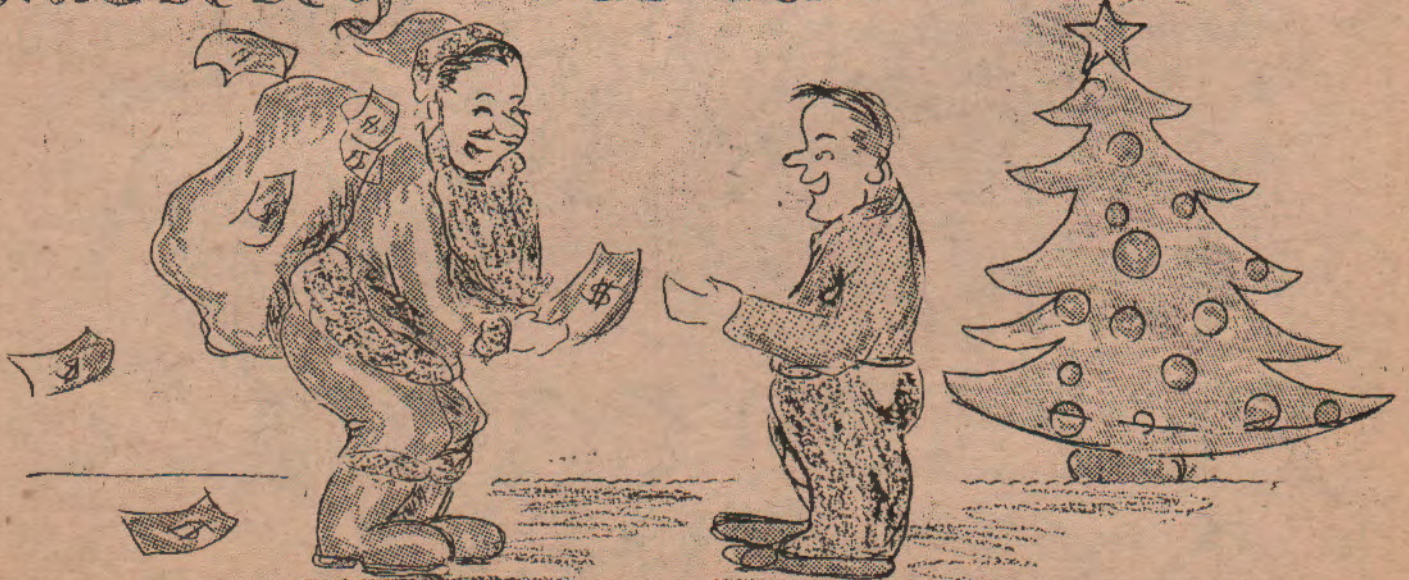

The Cook of the Month

Phyllis discovered that she was on her own almost as soon as she came to Alaska, as Jack was drafted into the army six days after they arrived. Since she knew that they would have very little time to work on their house after Jack got out of basic training, Phyllis went ahead and arranged to have the land cleared and ordered the materials so that they could begin work as soon as possible. Their first home was a 9 x 12 tent in which they lived while building. This all may seem hard to believe as one looks around the lovely modern log home (which Phyllis herself designed).

When she first came to Alaska from the Dalles Oregon, Phyllis had not begun her family, and went to work at the Ordnance Supply at Ft. Richardson. However, now she prefers to stay at home and take care of Debbie who is 5, Mike 4, and little Scott who just turned 1.

CRANBERRY APPLE PIE

PREPARE pastry for Lattice pie.
LINE 9 inch pie pan with half of pastry.
COOK 4 cups pared sliced apples and 1/2 cup water in saucepan until apples are partially tender.
COMBINE 1 1/4 cups flour
2 tbs cornstarch
1/4 tsp. salt.
BLEND with apples
ADD 2 1/2 cups cranberries
1 tbs. grated orange rind
COOK until apples are tender and cranberries start to pop.
BLEND in 2 tbs. butter
COOL:
Turn into pastry lined pan. Place lattice strips over pie. Seal and flute
BAKE: in hot 425° oven
25 to 30 min.

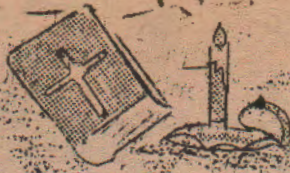

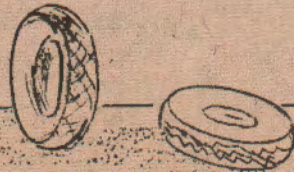

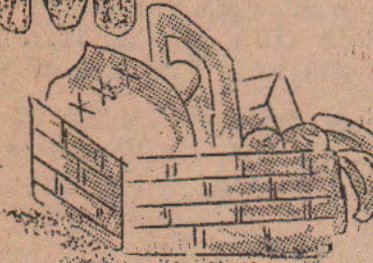
