Christmas at the Chugiak Post Office this year is a little more orderly than in the past.

Postmaster Paul Swanson says that although the volume is as great as ever, it has been more of a steady stream, rather than spasmodic rushes.

However he has voiced several requests to the people of Chugiak. For one, anyone receiving notice of a package at the post office is requested to call for it as soon as possible. Space is limited and it does not take long for the stacks of packages to pile up.

Also, to those mailing Christmas Cards, it would be a great help to your post master if you would bundle them according to the state to which they are addressed.

This sorting must be done locally and consumes a great deal of time.

The post office will not be open in the late evening this year. The public did not take any great advantage of this service last year, and it was not felt that any purpose would be served by remaining open late.

PLANS FOR NEW SCHOOL RECEIVED

Mr. Lee Emmert, superintendent of the Chugiak School has received from the state dept of education the preliminary plans for an eight room school building to be located in the Eagle River.

In addition to the eight classrooms the plans call for a multi-purpose room 50 by 90 feet, larger than that at the present school.

Mr. Emmert said that there was no information accompanying these plans, so he is therefore unable to say when this new school will be built, or where.

community meeting called to discuss borough formation

With the question of local borough boundaries soon to be taken up by a state appointed commission, a group of local citizens have called a community wide meeting to discuss the place of the community of Chugiak in the local "borough picture."

This meeting, to take place at the Carnival Hall on Thursday, December 17th at 7:30 PM, will be an open meeting of the "town meeting" variety at which the residents of Chugiak can air their views as to whether they wish to be included in the same borough as Anchorage or Palmer, or whether they desire to become an unorganized borough attached to neither.

It is hoped that there will be a large enough turnout to determine what the majority of the people in Chugiak want and to be able to select representatives from this community to attend the meeting of the Borough Boundary Commission in Anchorage and make the desires of the people of Chugiak known.

Mr. Brad Phillips and Mr. Benny Leonard, Anchorage City Councilmen have been invited to attend the local meeting and it is hoped that they can help answer some of the questions that have been puzzling us.

WHAT IS A BOROUGH?

Ever since Alaska attained Statehood the question of what constitutes a borough has been asked.

Most of us hailing from states where the county form of local government was in force were a little doubtful of the advantages of the borough, particularly when an understandable explanation of this was difficult to find.

Now with the actual formation of the boroughs about to take place, it seems more important than ever for the average citizen to understand what it is all about and how this seemingly unfamiliar form of local government will affect him personally.

On what is almost the eve of the community wide meeting at which the citizens of Chugiak will gather to determine where most of them stand on the borough issue, there has appeared what is to our opinion a simple, concise explanation of the borough form of government.

This article appears in a publication that is mailed free to almost all members of our community, the "VALLEY COOPERATOR", the monthly publication of the Electric, telephone and farmers Cooperatives of the Matanuska Valley.

In an article entitled "BOROUGH BRIEFS", Mr. Jim Hurley of Palmer has succeeded in answering all the questions pertaining to

the borough form of government so simply and concisely that one wonders why it ever seemed any mystery in the first place.

Along with Henderson was John Amick, also of Birchwood and Robert Rasmussen (next col.)

of 1327 Juneau, Anchorage. The plane crashed when it was attempting to take off with a load of moose meat.

Rasmussen, the only one uninjured in the crash was able to extricate himself from the burning wreckage and to drag both the pilot (Henderson) and Amick to safety.

Rasmussen cared for the two injured men as best he could, but Henderson, died shortly after the crash.

The two survivors remained in their crude camp for two days before a plane piloted by Mason Lazell of Palmer sighted them.

The pair were brought out by Air Force Helicopter on Saturday. Amick was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital with a fractured hip. Rasmussen suffered only from bruises and mild frostbite and was not hospitalized.

Henderson is survived by a wife and a three year old daughter.

MORE PETITIONS FOR CAPITAL CHANGE

Additional petitions carrying 212 signatures have been filed with Secretary of State Hugh J. Jade in support of an application for an initiative petition seeking relocation of the Alaska State Capital.

Largely from the Anchorage-Spenard area, the signatures were received by mail from State Representative Earl D. Hillstrand of Anchorage (nex. col.)

backer of the proposal to place the Capital issue before the voters at the next general election.

The new filing brought to 363 the total number of signatures filed in support of the initiative proposal. Under terms of the Constitution, application for an initiative petition need be supported by only 100 Alaskan voters.

The proposed initiative would create a five-member Capital Committee to be named by the Governor to select an appropriate site for the Capital in the Cook Inlet-Rail belt area. Initiative backers have defined this area as that bounded on the south and west by Seward and Kodiak, up Cook Inlet and the railbelt to Fairbanks on the north.

Referring to Jade's recent request for assurances concerning the manner in which certain signatures were obtained, Hillstrand said the requested affidavit would be forthcoming next week. Noting the additional signatures filed today, however, he said "perhaps their receipt will obviate further technical objections."

Hillstrand added, "Although we wish to get on with the big job of circulating the petition, and without any necessary delay, we agree with you that each step in this proceedings should be taken seriously and properly so that the work, when accomplished, will have completed the intended purpose--that of expressing clearly and uncontroversially, the will of the people." * * * * *

1960 LICENSE PLATES ON SALE

On Monday, December 14th, new 1960 license plates were placed on sale.

State Revenue Commissioner Peter Gatz said the plates, featuring a combination of white and royal blue, may be placed in use immediately, but are required by all motor vehicles in the state by February 29th.

Differing from last year's blue and gold combination, the 1960 license plates for private vehicles will feature a white background with royal blue lettering. Commercial vehicle plates will be reversed, a royal blue background with white lettering.

M.M. More, the Department motor vehicle administrator said the plates will be available from all field offices and commissioned agents of the Department of

Revenue throughout the State.

The 1960 plates are priced as follows:

(a) For every motorcycle \$10.00

(b) For every private motor vehicle including $\frac{1}{2}$ or $\frac{3}{4}$ ton trucks not used or maintained primarily for the transportation of passengers or property for hire, \$20. For the purpose of this subsection, a "private motor vehicle" includes a vehicle used or maintained primarily for personal transportation and for the transportation of his personal property.

(c) For every motor vehicle for hire, operated and known as a taxi-cab, \$40.

(d) For every commercial motor vehicle, including motor vehicles pulling trailers, semi-trailers or trucks designed, used or maintained primarily for the transportation or hauling of property including without limitation, such commercial vehicles as wreckers or tow-cars, hearses, ambulances and tractors, the actual combined weight as established by the manufacturer advertised weight, or if not so determined, it shall be the responsibility of the owner to furnish the true and actual weight, subject to the approval of the commission or



Several weeks ago during a meeting in Fairbanks, the State appointed Borough Boundary Commission made a request for recommendations from interested communities on the procedures for instituting an organized borough. In response to this request, a non-partisan committee was formed in the Anchorage area to discuss and propose a set of procedures for instituting an organized borough. The following is a copy of this committee's recommended procedures current as of 14 December 1959. Borough Powers and Functions, as indicated, were discussed by the committee on Monday evening, 14 December. Copies of the recommended powers and functions are not available for publication since they will not be available until Friday, 18 December 1959.

Procedures recommended by this committee will be presented to the Boundary Commission on Saturday, 19 December 1959.

PROCEDURES FOR INSTITUTING AN ORGANIZED BOROUGH

1. A boundary for the organized borough should be established.
 - a. Hearings should be called by the Boundary Commission in the area to be affected.
 - (1) Suggestions:
 - (a) It has been suggested that the legislature create initially unorganized boroughs that correspond with the present election districts. This would allow the Boundary Commission to post a notice of hearing to be held at some designated spot or spots in the unorganized borough for people to be heard on where the boundary should be drawn for the organized borough for, or within this area.
 - (b) Hearings should be called in the population centers, letting the Boundary Commission determine the areas to be heard.
 - (c) The Boundary Commission would hold hearings within the now designated election district or districts without benefit of the Legislature creating unorganized boroughs in these areas.
 - b. Provision should be made for local initiative of these hearings so that it will not be entirely the prerogative of the Boundary Commission as to whether these hearings are to be held. It is suggested that upon request directed to the Boundary Commission from any interested group of citizens (perhaps substantiated by a petition of a designated number of signatures) the Boundary Commission must hold said hearings within a period of 60 days.
 - c. Adequate notice of said hearings shall be given so that the hearings can be held in time for the Legislature to consider the results.

II. Borough Charter Commission should be established.

- A. Upon determination by the Legislature of the boundary of the proposed organized borough, the Legislature or the Department of Local Affairs shall call an election within the designated area for the purpose of electing Borough Charter Commission members and prescribe their powers and functions by law, the prime function of the Commission being to draft a Borough Charter for submission to the people subject to the Constitution and laws of the State of Alaska.
- B. The Legislature, at the time of acceptance of the organized borough boundaries and the calling of the election, should appropriate by loan or grant an adequate sum of money to finance the election.
- C. The Department of Local Affairs should be instructed to administer the election.
- D. The number of Charter Commission members and the method of determining representation on the Charter Commission within the proposed organized borough should be determined by the following formula:

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There should be 1 representative per 7000 population with a minimum of 1 representative for any given area. Hence:

- E. The qualifications for Charter Commission candidates should be the same as candidates for the State Senate.
- F. The qualifications of electors shall be the same as those prescribed by the State Constitution for electors in a State general election except a qualified elector must have resided within the borough boundaries for at least 30 days.
- G. The Chairman of the Commission should be chosen by its duly elected members at the initial organizational meeting. This Chairman should be one of the elected members with voting powers only in the event of a tie. The Charter Commission shall meet within 30 days after certification of election of Commission members.
- H. Charter Commission members should serve with no compensation.
- I. The Charter Commission should be charged with the responsibility of drafting a proposed "home rule" charter for the organized borough, and it is suggested that a time limit (possibly 6 months) should be set in order to expedite the wishes of the people. If this limitation is set, provision should be made for extension of the limit for just cause. The determination of whether an extension should be granted could be left in the hands of the Department of Local Affairs.
- J. It is suggested that a revolving fund should be set up by the Legislature. This fund would be available to loan money to the Charter Commissions for the purposes of hiring administrative help, technical assistance, supplies, advertising for elections, printing, and other direct costs necessary in drafting the charter. The amount to be borrowed should be determined by the Charter Commission itself, with a provision for review and approval by the Governor. Further, this money would be paid back to the State on terms to be determined from funds appropriated by the borough assembly after establishing the charter.
- K. Upon acceptance by the voters of the affected area of the "home rule" charter, the charter shall be self-executing.

III. Procedures for change of the initial boundaries should be set forth.

Realizing that most populated areas in Alaska will undergo different degrees of change affecting population, economy, transportation, etc., it is expected that it will be necessary from time to time to change the boundaries of cities and organized boroughs to more fully perform the functions for which they were created. These procedures should again include: (1) public hearings similar to those set forth in the initial establishing of the borough and (2) provision for local initiative for the change of these boundaries.

BOROUGH POWERS AND FUNCTIONS
(Discussion Agenda)

1. The borough shall have all powers not prohibited by State law,
a) and not in conflict with the powers of home rule or general
law cities.
or:
b) not conflicting with the administration of city government
as prescribed by law.
2. Boroughs and cities shall have the power by written contract to
delegate powers and functions or portions thereof to the State
government, to boroughs or city governments within the borough.
3. A non-partisan school board, elected as such, with maximum power
and control over schools shall be an adjunct of the borough,
assembly, i.e., the functions and powers of the present independent
school districts shall be retained to the maximum extent permitted
by the Constitution.
4. Exclusive powers of certain governmental activities shall be granted
borough governments as soon as feasible; other exclusive powers shall
be granted boroughs when most economical.
5. The powers of boroughs to establish service areas and the functions
of such service areas.
6. The State Legislature shall provide for the transfer of existing
assets, liabilities and tax revenues of public utility districts
to boroughs, cities, or the State.
7. Change in borough boundaries by initiative.




