## GEORGE ALLEN ELECTED TO HIGH PARTY POST

The past few weeks activity of the Democrats in Chugiak wound up at the South Central District Convention last Saturday, at which George M. Allen of Mile 23 was unanimously elected to the post of Vice-Chairman. In this capacity he will serve under Steve McCutcheon, Chariman and along with Delores Roguska, district Secretary and Sol Urie of Seward, district treasurer.

Allen was also chosen as a delegate to the State Convention in Ketchikan next month. However, since the number of delegates to be chosen is limited, he felt that Palmer which had no representative should have at least one delegate and he withdrew in favor of Jalmer Kestulla, of Palmer.

## HEROS OF FALK'S LAKE AWARDED SOLDIERS MEDAL

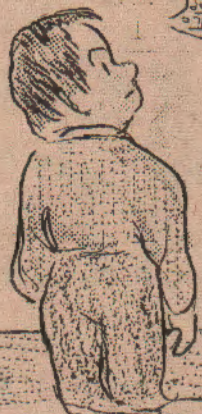

The report will be submitted to a White House Conference to be held in January 1961.\*\*\*

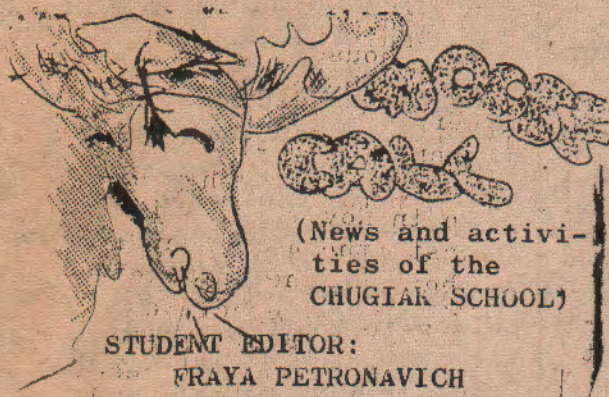

TEACHER'S BIOGRAPHY # 2  
As interviewed by Fraya Petronavich and Cathy Stevens:

When the army sent Bucky Morse to Alaska he decided that this country that was still comparatively sparsely settled was the place that he wanted to make his home.

Born in Dacoma Oklahoma, Mr. Morse took his schooling at Oklahoma A & M, now known as Oklahoma State College.

He taught for one year in Kansas, before coming to Alaska where he has been for the past 3 1/2 years. For 2 1/2 years he has been teaching in Chugiak, where he lives on a Birchwood homesite with his wife Louise and his three boys, Lyn, Kevin and Leslie Scott. Like so many residents of Chugiak, the Morse's live in a basement apartment which will some day be topped with a beautiful home.

Mr. Morse became a teacher because he ... "likes people and particularly working with young people."

He teaches science, reading and is the boys physical education (next col.)

teacher. He prefers teaching students that are of junior high school age.

He is an outdoor man at heart and his hobbies reflect this. He is happiest when hunting, fishing and skiing. Winter sports are his favorite.

Last summer he worked for the Alaska Department of Fish and game.

In addition to his other duties, he also drives one of the school buses.

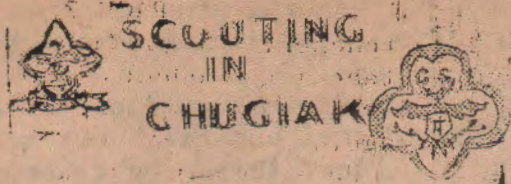

Starting this Saturday, December 5th at 9 pm, the Dances will feature live music and cater to all tastes.

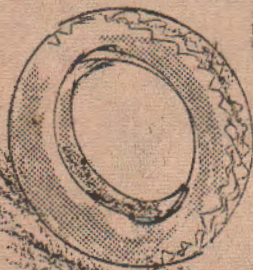

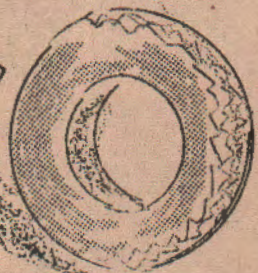

## GAMING DEVICES TO INCREASE STATE REVENUE

A definition of a coin-op-  
 earted gaming device, exp  
 ected to increase State  
 revenues by approximately  
 \$75,000-\$100,000 was filed  
 by Revenue Commissioner  
 Peter Gatz with Secretary  
 of State Hugh J. Wade.

Devices covered by the  
 regulation will be subject  
 to a tax of \$200 a year,  
 as compared with the \$50 a  
 year tax required of coin-  
 operated amusement devices.

Gatz said enforcement of  
 the regulation by the de-  
 partment would begin Jan-  
 uary 1st.

Previous regulations have  
 not defined gaming devices,  
 Gatz said, and it was left  
 --in effect--to the oper-  
 ators descfetion whether to  
 pay the \$50 or \$200 tax.

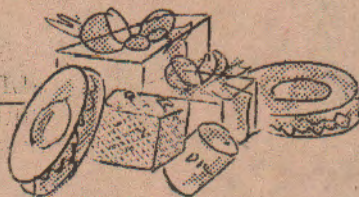

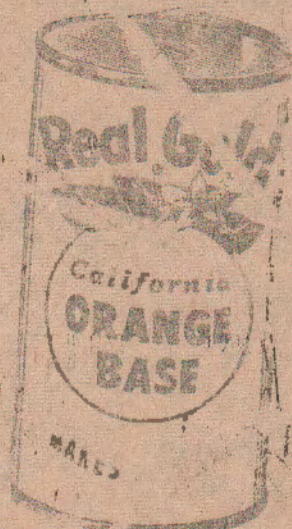
