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

GALING DEVICES TO INCREASE STATE REVENUE

A definition of a coin-opearted gaming device, exp pected to increase State revenues by approximately \$75,000-\$100,000 was filed by Revenue Commissioner Peter Gatz with Secretary of State Hugh J. Wade.

Devices covered by the regulation will be subject to a tax of \$200 a year, as compared with the \$50 a year tax required of coinoperated amusement devices.

Gatz said enforcement of the regulation by the department would begin January 1st.

Previous regulations have not defined gaming devices, Gatz said, and it was left --in effect--to the operators descretion whether to pay the \$50 or \$200 tax.
