Stroke claims Life of local mechanic

George Blackwell, of Mile 18, was dead, 20 minutes after arrival at the 5040th Air Force Hospital where he was rushed following his suffering a stroke.

Blackwell was employed as a mechanic at Hilltop Service at mile 18. He was on a wrecker call, attempting to pull a State Police Car from the ditch in front of Tips Bar when the stroke occurred.

The Chugiak ambulance was called, but the victims condition appeared so serious that the police commandeered the first private car, driven by Walter Day of Moosehorn, to carry the victim to the Hospital. He died shortly there after.

Blackwell, aged 59, was a

Phillips, the guest speakers.

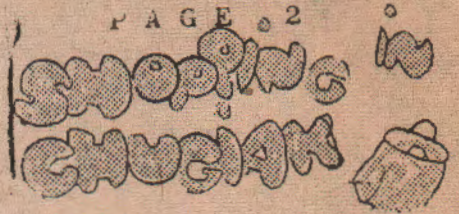
It was decided to appoint

Of the 60 persons present
at the meeting approximately
80% voted to join Anchorage.

Among his new equipment was an electronic wheel balancer, which working on the principal of a strobe light makes it possible to obtain perfect (next col)

wheel balance. Also he explained the principal of his electronic spark plug analyzer, which makes it possible to diagnose the exact condition of each spark plug without removing them from the engine.

Lines on a screen similar to a radar scope enable a trained operator to observe visually the condition of every plug.

Also, for other ignition problems, the electronic Sun Test stand can test all the ignition components and set the timing etc. to exact factory specifications, eliminating all need for guess work.

Slanker said that he was very happy to see so many people at the drawing, and he was pleased to have the opportunity to show off his shop, which he proudly proclaims as the most modern equipped in the entire Anchorage (next col)

area and the neatest.

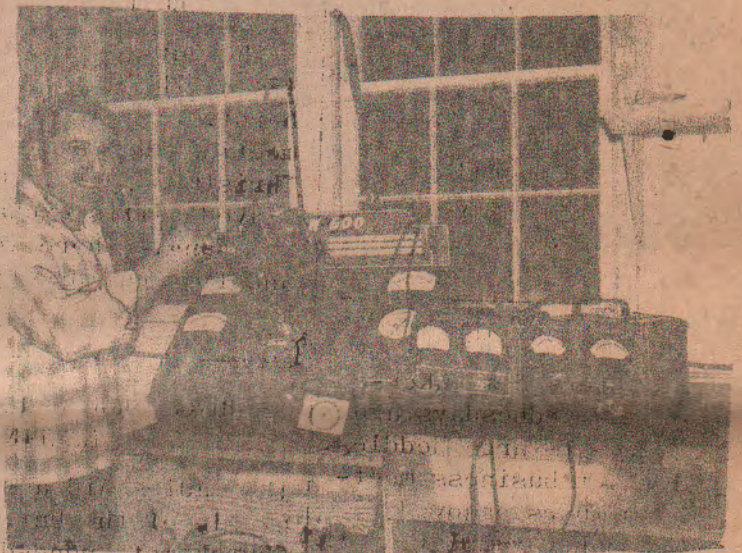
He said that he hoped that those who had come down to the drawing had enjoyed their tour of the shop and he looked forward to serving them all in the future.

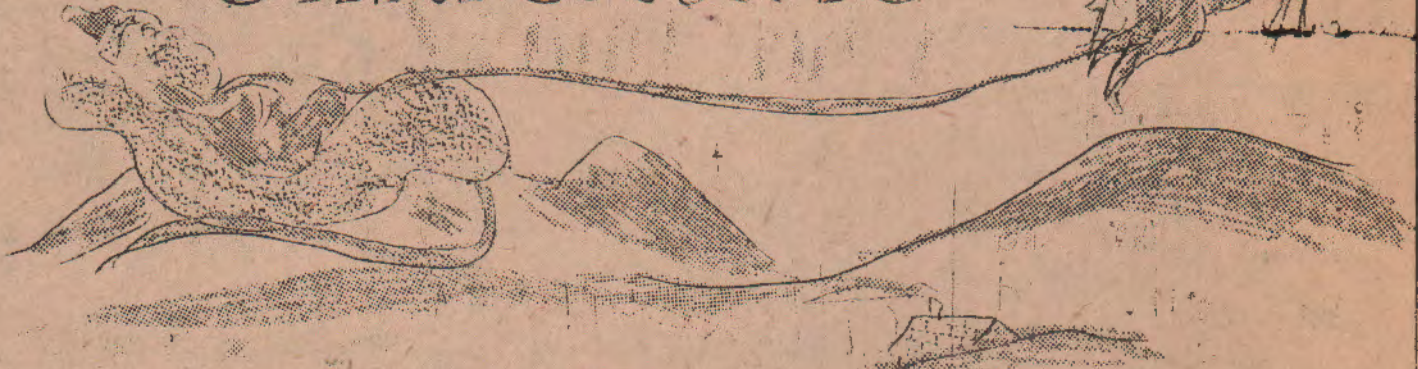

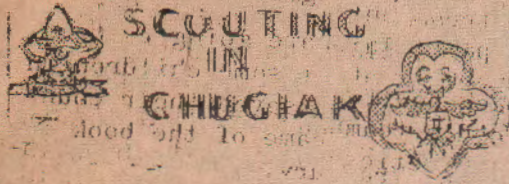


TOM SLANKER DEMONSTRATES THE "SUN" TEST STAND. PART OF HIS NEW ELECTRONIC EQUIPMENT

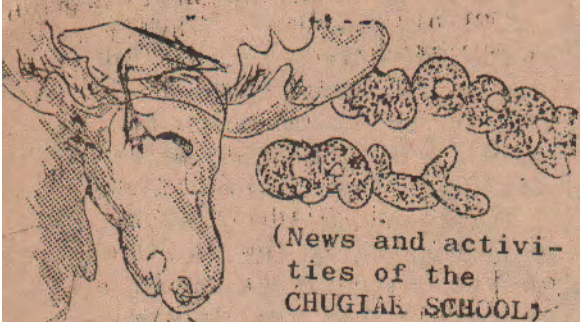

A Nash passenger car stalled on the hill at mile 19 was the cause of two cars colliding and a fourth car having to take to the ditch to avoid the collision.

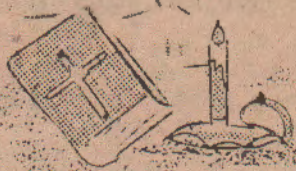

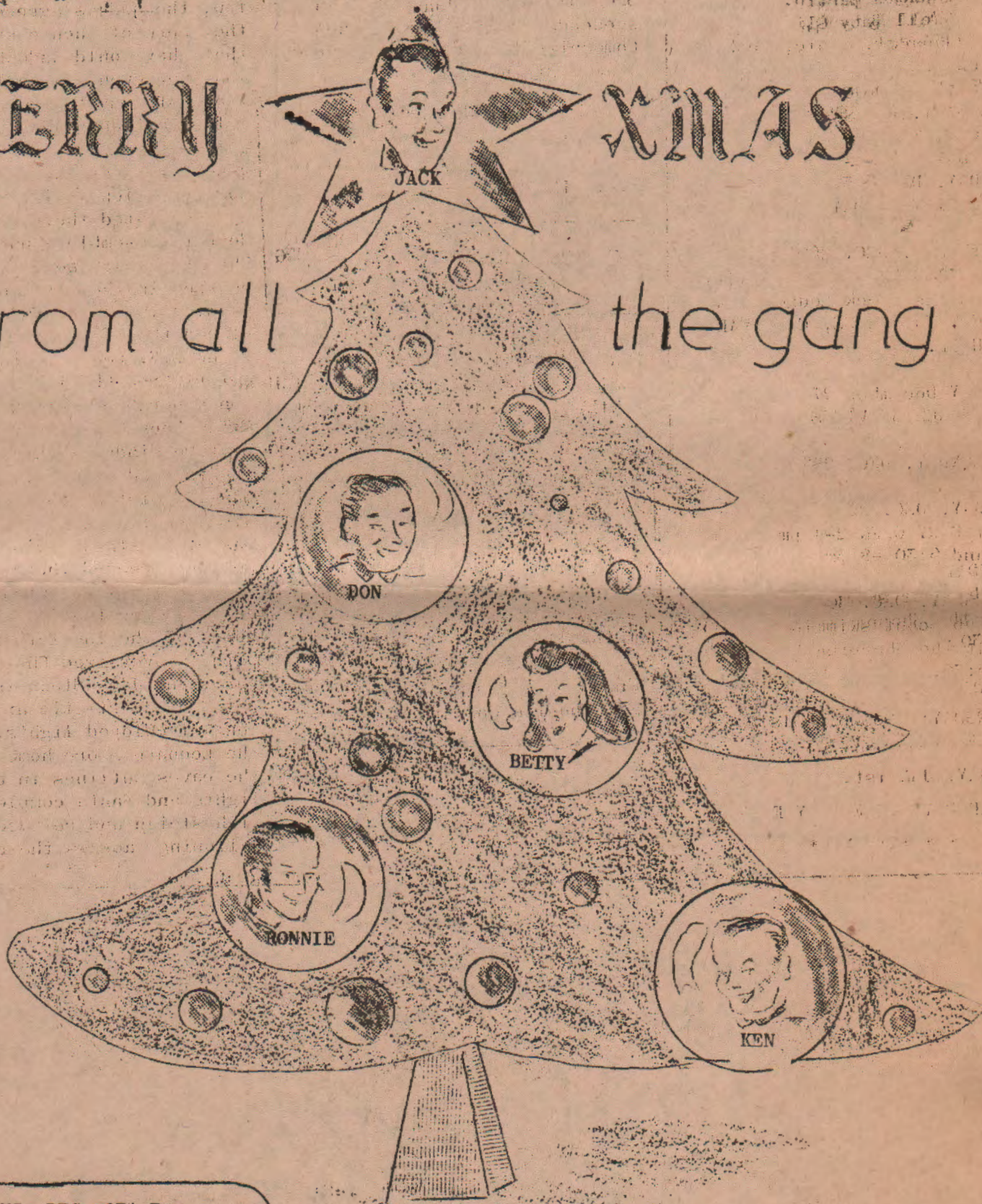
