Dr. Marshall Simpson, who has been maintaining office hours three days a week at the Eagle River Shopping Center, has announced that beginning with the first of January, he will move his entire practice to this community.

Dr. Simpson has also moved his residence to Chugiak, having purchased the first house on the right on the Eagle River Homestead road.

Dr. Simpson will be at his Eagle River Office every day from 2pm until 6 pm. He also will be available for emergency calls on a 24 hour basis.

He has said that where necessary he will make house calls, however, he prefers to see his patients at his office, as that is where his equipment is located. Dr. Simpson maintains a fully equipped physicians office with x-ray and electro cardiograph machines.

"CAPITAL MOVE" QUESTION MAY BE ISSUE AT NEXT GENERAL ELECTION

Secretary of State Hugh J. Wade has certified as in prop- er form an application for an initiative petition seeking to relocate the Alaska capital.

In a letter to State Repres- entative Earl D. Millstrand of Anchorage, Wade said he now is preparing a summary of the sub- ject matter for circulation by Millstrand and other sponsors for the signatures required to place the initiative on the next general election ballot.

STATE TO TAKE OVER HIGHWAY FUNCTIONS

The Division of Highways has announced its intention to assume on July 1st, 1960 and in accordance with State law, all functions normally assigned to a State highway department, which are now performed by the Bureau of Public Roads. Thereafter, the Bureau's responsibili- ties will be in approving surveys, design and providing general supervision on all Alaska Division of Highways activity where Federal Aid to Highways Funds are concern- ed. The Bureau of Public Roads will also retain the responsibility of planning and constructing Forest Highway and National Park Roads. Maintenance of Forest Highways will be done by the State when they are on the State Highway System.

Personnel of the Bureau of Public Roads have been ad- vised of the job opportuni- ties in the Alaska Divi- sion of Highways and it is hoped that they will trans- fer and remain in Alaska.

phrases.

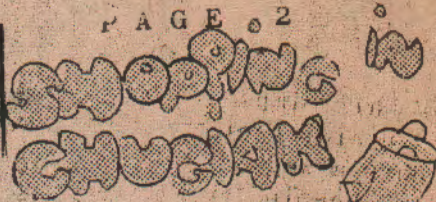
Let us hope that this simple

STATE TO RECEIVE
ADDITIONAL INTEREST-

Alaska's banks will start
paying an additional three-
quarters of one percent in-

TEACHERS BIOGRAPHY #5:

This week's biography is in the nature of a farewell, for Mr. Andy Kirk is leaving Chugiak where he has been teaching the 6th grade, to teach at the school at Moose Pass.

Mr. Kirk has been a teacher here for the past year and a half, prior to which he had taught 4th and 8th grades in Florida. His home is in Clearwater Florida and he attended the University of Florida for his M.A. degree, after receiving his B.A. at The University of Pennsylvania.

Andy is a veteran of the Army Engineers and has spent a good deal of his adult life traveling. While in Europe for three years, he avoided the guided tours with their "fat jeweled women" and saw the country with members of the Youth Hostel.

He loves to ride bicycles and has covered over 3,500 miles that way. However, he has found that in Alaska, the snow discourages this hobby.

Andy looks upon TV viewing and sport cars as a waste of time, and prefers athletics as an outlet. While in college, he went in for track and basketball.

Last year he married a fellow school teacher, Virginia Search and they are the parents of a month old baby boy.

Mr. Kirk will be missed by the 23 students in his class.

last general election, Wade said, initiative sponsors will be required to obtain the signatures of 5,034 qualified voters--10 per cent of the total vote. Signers must include representation from at least two-thirds of the States 24 election districts.

The proposed initiative would require that the capital of Alaska be located within the Cook Inlet-Rail belt area on and after January 1, 1965.

To accomplish this, the Governor would be directed to appoint within 60 days after approval of the initiative, a Capital Committee of five members to proceed with the selection of an appropriate site "giving due consideration to accessibility, economy and feasibility of construction."

Wade said the petition forms now being prepared would require each signer to state his name, legal residence, mailing address and a "yes" or "no" answer to two questions: (1) Are you 19 years old or over? (2) Have you resided in the State of Alaska for the last 12 months immediately preceding the signing of the petition?

Members of the Alaska Committee on Children and Youth have received strong praise from the office of the parent White House Conference on Children and Youth.

In a letter to Governor Wm. A. Egan, associate director I Isabella J. Jones of the National Committee said the report recently submitted by the Alaska Committee "should be a source of pride to you and your fellow citizens."

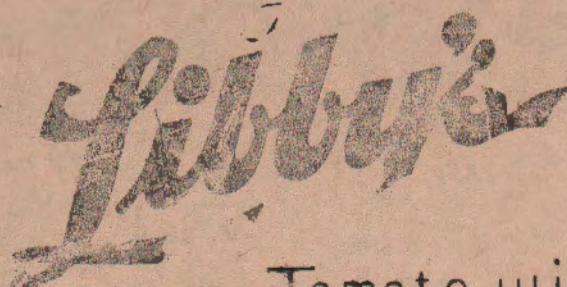

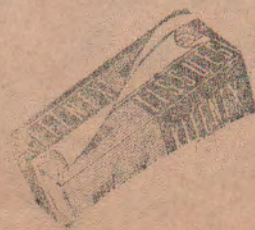
