

Birchwood man Hero of Daring Rescue

If it were not for the courage and persistance of Carl Steely of Birchwood, Bob Ruthorford would probably be lying dead of injuries and exposure in the snows of Campbell Pass.

On November 23rd, Ruthorfor, resident engineer of the Cooper Lake Hydro-electric project set out on snowshoes to check the transmission line in the area between Campbeel creek and Indian Creek. At the top of Campbell Pass he became caught in a snow-slide, although he tried to ride the slide out, his snow shoe caught on a projecting rock and he fell breaking a leg.

When he failed to show up the next day, a search party in helicoptors and on foot set out to find him. A blinding blizzard prevented the coptors from being able to enter the pass

The party on foot consisted of Steeby, assistant resident engineer on the project and two others fought gale winds and blowing snow in an attempt to find the missing man. The others of the party finally decided to turn back because of darkness, but Steeby kept on and finally found the injured man.

Ruthorford had managed to wrap himself inea two man nountain tent, and although he was suffering from exposire as well as from his injiries, he was still alive.

Steeby was able to locate the remainder of the searchers, and although Ruthorford was still located in the unstable snow of the slide area, they were able (cont page 6 col 2)

THE DOG PROBLEM

The story in last week's issue of the COURIER about the unfortunate indicent at Eagle River when a stray dog attacked and seriously injured a small boy has brought numerous other reports to the attention of the editor.

The chief complaint is of dogs of the type loosely cal-

led "huskyys" which have been running loose singly and in parks and causing great concern to certain members of the community.

"" Most of the reports have been centered in the Peters Creek Area, where a number of dogs have been running in packs and have have been attacking and killing cats and smaller dogs. The recent incident at Eagle River has given these people cause to fear for the safety of their children.

This problem is not a new one. All to frequently one reads of dogs runnigg wild and attacking and even killing small children. Always this brings a public clamor as to why "they" don't do something about it. Since in our area, there is considerable doubt as to who "they" may be, it is hard to know where to stgrt.

A good beginning is in the case where one might recognize the dog or dogs, to inform the owner that his pets are straying and (next col) creating a nuisance.

This is only fair, as all too often the owner is unaware of the Jekyll and Hyde personality of his affectionate pet, or that he may have fallen into bad company.

Then it becomes the responsiblity of the owner to keep his dog or dogs chained up, if for no other sea. reason that to protect him from those who are threaten ing to hunt stray dogs down like wild and dangerous animals. There have been sev eral who have threatened to do hust that and in light of the recent attack they feel that they are justified in taking preventatige measures and not allow the dog even his traditional Vone bite".

There are many faces to this problem, and no one solution can cure them all, but one thing is obvious, something must be done, or we may be writing reports of more tragedys. It would not take much to cause a pack of dogs intent on destroying a kitten or a puppy to turn on a small master or mistress attempting to rescue their pet.





FRED VIGUE

A favorite recipe of Fred Vigue, our male cook of the month, is one he brought from Hawaii, and is similiar to the popular side dish often found in chinese menus.

> PINEAPPLE SPARERIBS (sweet and sour)

1 small side spare ribs l large green pepper 3 large stalks celery 3 slices pineapple 1 ths butter 1/2 cup pineapple juice 1/2 cup vinegar 1/2 cup chicken bullion 1/3 cup brown sugar 2 tsp soy sauce 2 tbs. corn starch CUT ribs into 1 inch cubes BAKE in mod. (350°) oven until brown (1 hour) MELT butter, add vegetables cut in large pieces, pineapple juice, pineapple COVER-and simmer for 15 min. MIX together, vinegar, chicken bullion (1 cube + 1 cup water) sugar soy sauce, and corn starch. ADD and stir carefully until

DRAIN ribs, pour mixture over ribs and return to oven for 10 minutes.







The new school directory for this year has just been issued. It lists enrollments and teachers for every mschool, districk, state and on-base in Alaska. A few comparisons of intérest, especially since school groups in the com--munity have been gathering data to justify the buildingfof more classrooms in the area served by the Chugiak School.

Among the schobls operated by the state, Chugiak, with 450 pupils is the 2nd largest. Kenai has a total of 534 pupils of which 125 are high school and 418 are grades 1 through 8. The Chugiak enrollment makes with the largest elementary de school among those operated (next col)



The 164 pupils who are attending school in substandard quarters constitute a greater enrollment than the total enrollment in any one of 89 other state operated schools. This means that over 36% of our pupils are housed in buildings as poor as the poorest school buildings with few exceptions among state operated schools .:

The timing on our latest box of books from Juneau was excellent. It conintained 9 books for the juv or enils and young adult group; which helps a little to fill our needs. However


we would like to repeat our appeal for children's books or books suitable for young adults.(nextcol) (book report)


and some parents are coming as late as ten thirty to call for their children. This is imposing a hard-
