
The Cook of The Month

Some of the best cooking and the finest baking in our community originates in the beautiful home at 15 Mile. Our cook for January, Alice Schroeder is well known for her fabulous cakes which have graced the birthday table of many a party in Gugiak, as well as for her kindness and goodness and cheerful disposition.

Alice began her career in a field quite removed from culinary art. Before coming to Alaska she worked in an aircraft factory in Burbank, California.

It was there that she met her very close friend Louise Marcus, who with Alice, drove to Alaska in 1947 pulling a house trailer. The two adventuresome ladies parked their trailer in the first, and at that time only, trailer park in Anchorage. Shortly after that they bought the lovely log home of the Hillary's which used to stand at 15 Mile, and moved to Gugiak. They both went to work at Elmendorf, Alice in the parachute shop where she met her husband Bob, who is still in charge of the shop. The log home burned to the ground in a disastrous fire in 1953, but Alice, Lou and Bob, undaunted, rebuilt the lovely modern house which stands there today.



Alice really shines, and we are very fortunate that she has offered to share some of her favorite recipes with us.

Here is a quite rich and elegant pastry that is very simple to make but is an especial tea party confection.

SCOTCH SHORTBREAD

- 1 Cup Butter
- 1/2 Cup Sugar

Cream butter, add sugar and cream until light and fluffy.

Add 2 1/2 Cups Sifted Flour. CHILL Dough.

Roll on lightly floured board 1/4 to 1/2 inch thick. Cut with 2" round cutter or in 2 x 1 inch strips. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in slow oven (300) until very lightly browned. Remove from pan to cool.


