JIM LAKE MAROONED WITH PNEUMONIA

During the high winds last week, school bus driver, Jim Lake, became ill. His temperature rose to 104 degrees. The wind had drifted their road to the Lake home with some drifts as high as 8 feet. Neighbors with pickups and tractors were thwarted by the huge drifts in their efforts to take him to the hospital. Rev. W.P. Craig and Rev. and Mrs. Nelson Moyer made their way to the Lake home on foot where Mrs. Moyer, who is a registered nurse, attended him until he was safely at 5040th hospital. Firemen with an aukio traveled over the snow and hauled Lake to the ambulance where neighbors had gathered with hot water bottles to receive him and help to keep him warmed. It was reported that he is now improved and expects to be released tomorrow from the hospital.

Mr. Francis Lee, who was seriously injured in an automobile accident last fall, has improved rapidly since being released from the hospital. On January 5th he reported to the Power Plant where he has been employed and was promptly put at a desk job until he is completely recovered.

ORDNANCE MAN SPEAKS TO CHUGIAK P.T.A.

Capt. Williams of the Post Ordnance Department was guest speaker at the meeting of Parents and Teachers at the Chugiak School last Tuesday evening. Capt. Williams gave an interesting demonstration on dangerous ordnance items and showed the group many samples of shells and grenades, that might be found by children, in the hope that they might be recognized by parents in time to avert tragedies. With the proximity of the military to our community and the frequent practice maneuvers that are conducted, the possibility of children finding unexploded and very dangerous items is a factor to be reckoned with. Capt. Williams also offered to give a similar demonstration to the children themselves.

A question and answer period followed.

A report of progress of the play "Harver", was made and all members were urged to cooperate in any way possible.

Mr. Blake McKinley, 8th grade teacher, reported on the legislative workshop which has been held in Anchorage recently. He and other teachers have been gravely concerned over a number of proposals which have been made by the Public Administration Service with regard to the man-

FIRE DESTROYS TRAILER HOME.

Fire completely destroyed the trailer home of Air Force Sergeant Jacob Hoopingarner and his family Sunday morning at about 11:00 o'clock. The Hoopingarners had recently purchased the trailer at the Eagle River Trailer Court and had occupied it for only about one month. They had no insurance. The family has three small children, a boy 1 year, and two girls, aged two and four. Mrs. Hoopingarner is expecting a fourth child this spring.

A neighbor lady whose name was not learned first discovered the fire and heroically rescued the children. The mother was awakened and by the time she left the burning structure her hair had been singed.

The fire apparently started in the lean-to though the cause is still being investigated. At this time it appears that the cause was faulty wiring aggravated by the recent high wind and the snow blowing into an outlet box.

Firemen answered the call but no equipment was available. They were prepared, however, to move all adjacent trailers, which proved unnecessary as there was no wind and fortunately extra space had been left between trailers.

SCHOOL SYSTEM

The State of Alaska First Legislature convenes in just two weeks. The teachers in our State are gravely concerned about the turn of events in proposals for setting up the new school system, and well they may be. It behoves all of us to be concerned also. Last year the Statehood Committee (mostly Democrats, misguided, we think) hired a research outfit, The Public Administration Service, to figure out some new ways to set up the educational system under the ratified Constitution. This P.A.S. had this report prepared last October but the voters were not allowed to see it at that time for that would have given them a chance to study it and find the flaws. It was just this last week made public and the elected Legislators are endorsing it without even considering it. Mr. Fisher for one, took a quick look at his copy and promptly lost it, according to his own telling, but he

then went on to say that he wholeheartedly endorses the P.A.S. proposals. Three proposals which the P.A.S. made regarding school system are:

1. Library and Museum Divisions be included under school department. (To say the least, this would be cumbersome)
 2. The Commissioner of education would be appointed by the governor rather than by the board of education. (What a political football that poor guy would be.)
 3. The present Board of Education would be abolished, or at best, be retained as an advisory agency. (Relegate those hard-working, unselfish people who give much thought to the best for our children, to the garbage can.)
- That is the kind of research that the P.A.S. did with Statehood Committee Dollars. They are from Chicago. Are we going to let gangsters tell us how to start our new school system? We'd better be writing letters! We'd better be telling Mrs. Ryan and Mrs. Fisher and Mr. Fisher and Mr. Hillstrand and Mr. Moody and others how it MUST be!

We had a letter for the editor today but it was unsigned so we hesitate to print it but we will tell you the gist of it. It seems that some of our teen-agers are hurt that



The Cook of The Month



COOK FOR JANUARY
ALICE SHROEDER

For her third recipe, Alice would like to offer a refrigerator roll with a "twist". These unusual, attractively shaped, rolls are a trifle sweeter than the more commonly known variety, and are quite suitable for that special dinner party.

GERMAN SOUR CREAM TWISTS

3½ Cups sifted flour
1 tsp. salt
1 cup shortening ($\frac{1}{2}$ butter)
1 pkg. dry yeast
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup warm water
3/4 Cup THICK sour cream
1 egg white & 2 egg yolks
well beaten
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup sugar

Dissolve yeast in water. Sift flour and salt into a mixing bowl. Stir dissolved yeast into flour mixture, adding sour cream, eggs, vanilla. Mix well with hands, cover with a damp cloth and refrigerate for two hours (or longer).

To shape rolls, place ball of dough on sugared board and roll into an oblong 8" x 16". Fold ends toward (next column)

center, ends overlapping. Roll about 1/4 inch thick. Cut into strips 1" x 4". Twist ends in opposite direction, stretching dough slightly. Put into shape of horseshoe on ungreased baking sheet. Press ends to keep shape. Repeat with rest of dough.

Let rise until double in bulk, bake at 375° for 15 minutes.

If you happen to have an oven lamp; place bread dough in oven and turn the lamp on. Dough will rise quicker and more evenly.




