ALICE SHROEDER

In recent years, it has become quite popular to serve bowls of tangy sauce in which to dip potato chips or thin crackers. These have been known to range from simple mixtures to exotic combinations of rare cheeses and herbs. The two which Alice offers this week are quite simple, and more likely to appeal to the more concertive taste. The first is a chip dip with an onion base; the second a tangy mustard dip for small cocktail shrimp.

CHEESE DIP

- 1/2 lb, pkg, Philadelphia cream cheese
- 1 pint cottage cheese
- 1/2 pkg. LIPTONS dry onion soup.
- Juice from 1/2 bottle cocktail onions.

CREAM together in mixing bowl until smooth. Add enough cream to make consistency desired.

SHRIMP DIP

(Hot mustard sauce for shrimp)

- 1 cup brown sugar
 - 1 tbs. flour
 - 1 bouillon cube
 - 1/2 cup vinegar
 - 1/4 cup dry mustard

- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 2 beaten eggs

Dissolve bouillon cube in hot water; add vinegar. Mix in dry ingredients, add eggs. Place in top of double boiler and cook to soft custard stage. Cool before serving.

Here's a tip for an after school snack: Spread slices of warm toast with peanut butter, then sprinkle with brown sugar and cinnamon. If you should happen to have raisin bread, it makes this treat even tastier.
