It has been some time since we printed portions of our Alaska State Constitution. This is a good time to do so and it is an especially appropriate time to print Article 10 for the first sentence of Article 10 is the key to the Borough proposition, in fact, it is the key to the freedom and independence that has been placed in our hands. Read it and realize what power we people have ; what foresight the Constitutional Convention had ; and how their wish to let the people govern themselves in these times of dictatorships, was provided for.

ARTICLE X

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Section 1. The purpose of this article is to provide for maximum local self-government with a minimum of local government units, and to prevent duplication of tax-levying jurisdictions. A liberal construction shall be given to the powers of local government units.

Section 2. All local government powers shall be vested in boroughs and cities. The State may delegate taxing powers to organized boroughs and cities only.

COOK FOR JANUARY - ALICE SCHROEDER OHUGIAK BELLES MEET

For her last recipe, Alice offers us this sweet dough Coffee Cake, which can also be adapted to many other popular rolls and holiday breads.

CINNAMON LEAF COFFEE RING

- 2 Cups Scalded Milk
- 2 pkgs. active dry yeast
- 3/4 Cup shortening
- 1/2 Cup butter (or margarine)
- 1/2 Cup Sugar
- 2 tsp. salt
- 4 Egg yolks or 2 eggs beaten
- 1 Cup sifted flour (approx)

Heat Milk lukewarm. Sprinkle yeast over top. Let stand to soften.

Cream shortening and butter. Add sugar and salt. Cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, yeast milk and enough flour to make a soft dough.

Knead until smooth and elastic on lightly floured board. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled - about one hour. Roll dough thin - about 1/8 inch - and cut into rounds with 2" biscuit cutter. Dip each in melted butter or margarine (about one cup) then in cinnamon sugar mixture (2 tbs. cinnamon to 2 cups sugar) Stand up in two well buttered ring molds 8 1/2" round

and 2 1/2" deep until rings are filled. Let rise until light (1 1/2 hrs.). Bake in moderate oven (350) about 25 minutes. Cool slightly before turning out. Makes 20 - 25 servings. Make plain rolls from any left-over dough.

VARIATIONS:

KOLACHES - Make half the recipe of basic dough. Shape into balls (about 1 1/2") and place on greased baking sheets. Let rise. Brush with melted butter or margarine. Make deep hole in center of each with thumb, then press out with fore finger to make

large. Fill with fruit. Bake in moderate oven (375) about 15 minutes. Makes 4 dozen buns.

FRUIT FILLING:

Cook together slowly stirring constantly until thickened -

- 2 cups dried apricots cut fine
- or 2 cups mashed cooked prunes
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 tbs. lemon juice

COOL before filling buns.



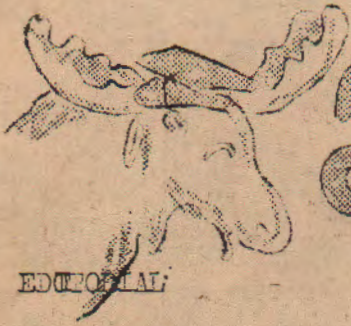

ALASKA'S CONSTITUTION

Continued from page 2.

Section 3. The entire State shall be divided into boroughs, organized or unorganized. They shall be established in a manner and according to standards provided by law. The standards shall include population, geography, economy, transportation, and other factors. Each borough shall embrace an area with and population with common interests to the maximum degree possible. The legislature shall classify boroughs and prescribe their powers and functions. Methods by which boroughs may be organized, incorporated, merged, consolidated, reclassified, or dissolved shall be prescribed by law.

Section 4. The governing body of the organized borough shall be the assembly, and its composition shall be established by law or charter. Each city of the first class, and each city of any other class designated by law, shall be represented on the assembly by one or more members of its council. The other members of the assembly shall be elected from and by the qualified voters resident outside such cities.

Section 5. Service areas to provide special services within an organized borough may be established, altered or abolished by the assembly, subject to the provisions of law or charter.

A new service area shall not be established if, consistent with the purposes of this article, the new service can be provided by an existing service area, by incorporation, as a city, or by annexation to a city. The assembly may authorize the levying of taxes, charges, or assessments within a service area to finance the special services.

Section 6. The legislature shall provide for the performance of services it deems necessary or advisable in unorganized boroughs, allowing for maximum local participation and responsibility. It may exercise any power or function in an organized borough which the assembly may exercise in an organized borough.

Section 7. Cities shall be incorporated in a manner prescribed by law, and shall be a part of the borough in which they are located.

Cities shall have the powers and functions conferred by law or charter. They may be merged, consolidated, classified, reclassified, or dissolved in the manner provided by law.

Section 8.

The governing body of a city shall be the council. More next week. Please read the foregoing sections with care.

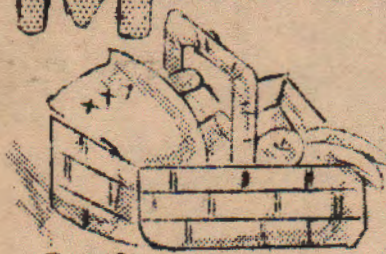
