Dear Editor:
I wonder if your readers realize the infringement on voting rights embodied in House Bill # 8?

For hundreds of years our forefathers fought to acquire or retain a right to vote. But the right to vote is not enough to maintain a government that is sensitive to our wishes unless we are also guaranteed that we will have a large selection of candidates to choose from. When that number falls below two our voting rights are useless. I believe any bill which tends to restrict our voting rights should be opposed vigorously. House Bill # 8 may also be in violation of Alaska State Constitution, Article I,

Section 1, in part [That all persons are equal and entitled to equal rights, opportunities, and protection under the law;]

House Bill # 8 clearly violates the equal rights of the citizens, to either vote a straight ticket or choose individual candidates as his conscience may dictate.

This Bill has passed the House, so direct your opposition to the President of the Senate, William E. Beltz.

COOK FOR FEBRUARY
"DOTTIE" FETROW

The salad which Dottie offers as her final recipe, is as the title suggests particularly appropriate for the Christmas season because of its color. However, it is also very good at any time of the year, so don't wait until next Christmas to try this colorful and tasty salad.

YULE SALAD

- 1 pkg lime gelatin
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
- 2 cups cottage cheese
- 1 small bottle maraschino cherries (cut up)
- 1 small can crushed pineapple (drained)
- 1/2 pint whipping cream

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. When cool add salad dressing. Mix in cottage cheese, pineapple and cherries. Whip cream and fold in. Return to refrigerator until ready to serve.

Dottie also wishes to share with us this novel way of preparing moose steaks, pork chops or meat that may have a tendency to be a little tough.

Pour 1/2 bottle of French Dressing in skillet. Brown meat on both sides,

then simmer for about three hours. Serve.

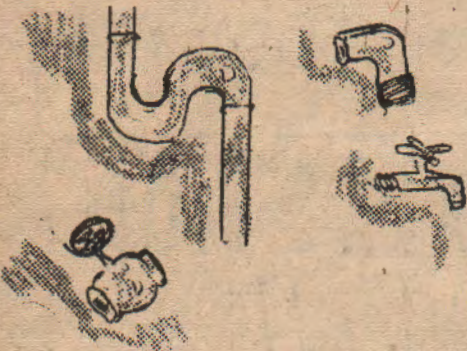



CHUGIAK DOG RACES — WHY NOT ?

With the keen competitive spirit of racing that was shown during the 3 day events of the Anchorage Fur Rendezvous, interest is still so great that it is possible to continue racing locally to give the boys more competitive training which will help them when they become senior mushers. Besides more training the idea is to help the young mushers raise enough money to feed their dogs. Some of the local junior mushers and their parents have planned this competition and it has no connection with the Alaska Racing Association in Anchorage or any other group.

Mr. Walter Pippel has graciously agreed to allow the junior mushers to use his field across from the shopping center as a place to carry on competitive dog races. This allows a good ten mile course that can be run. Sled rides could be given before and between races to hold the interest of spectators. Any junior mushers in Chugiak or in the Anchorage area would be eligible. Teams would be limited to a 7-dog hook-up, giving the mushers a chance to develop the ability to handle larger teams. Very

few people who watch the dog races realize the weeks and months, the time, effort and money expended to train these dogs and prepare them for the racing events.

For the competition to be a success it would be necessary for the entire community to get behind the mushers so that enough prizes in the form of dog food could be provided to reward their efforts.

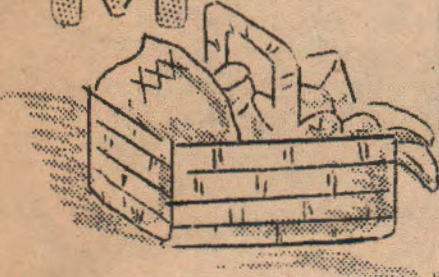

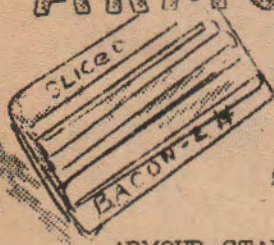
