

YULE SALAD

- 1 pkg lime golatin
- 1 cup hot water
- l cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
- 2 cups cottage cheese
- 1 small bottle maraschino chorries (cut up)
- 1 small can crushed pineapple (drained)
- 1/2 pint whipping cream

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. When cool add salad drossing. Mix in cottage cheese, pincapple and cherrics. Whip cream and fold in. Return to refrigerator until ready to serve.


