### P.T.A. SPECIAL MEETING

A special meeting of the Chugiak P.T.A. was held Wednesday night, February 4th in the multi purpose room. About 70 persons were present. The purpose of the meeting was to urge the P.T.A. to adopt the resolutions as outlined by the Legislative committee. These resolutions urged the creation of a state board of education with the chief administrative officer appointed by the board subject to approval of the governor, and that a study be made of boroughs and cities and the school systems of Alaska, before legislation be enacted.

The Chugiak P.T.A. also went on record as commending the past record of Don Dafoe as Commissioner of Education and urged that every effort be made to retain him as the chief executive officer of the State Department of Education. There was some debate on the proposals but all passed.




