## BOROUGH COMMITTEE BEGINS WORK

ADVISORY COMMITTEE GATHERS INFORMATION

The advisory committee on the establishment of a borough for the Chugiak area met at Moose Horn last Friday evening.

Those present were Mrs. John Vanover, Aden Cates, Reese Tatro, Tom Slanker and Don Merrill. Mrs. Carl Steeby and Jim Polyefko were not present. Tom Slanker acted as chairman and Don Merrill as secretary. Mr. Tatro read a letter from the Matanuska Valley Chamber of Commerce inviting representatives from the Chugiak area to participate in a borough meeting to be held in Palmer on or before March 20th. Mr. Tatro and Mr. Cates will represent the committee at this meeting.

It was decided that more information was needed before any recommendations could be made regarding the forming of a borough. Mrs. Vanover will contact Mr. Emmert on school finances with emphasis on the following points: Cost of operation of school, cost of bus operation for both high school and grade school transportation, cost per student for High school, percentage of possible annual student increase and information on present existing quonset hut use. Mr. Tatro will gather data on the Palmer tax structure and how it would affect the Chugiak area if the Palmer borough were joined. Mrs. Vanover will gather data on the Anchorage tax structure in regard to joining that borough area.

## SCHOOL MAY CLOSE AT REQUEST OF P.T.A.

MEMBERSHIP AROUSED OVER HAZZARDS AT CHUGIAK SCHOOL

At the regular monthly meeting of the Chugiak Parent Teacher Association held Tuesday evening a very disturbing report of safety conditions at the newer building at the Chugiak School was made by a committee who had been appointed at a previous meeting to inspect the school. The inspection and subsequent report was made Tuesday morning by Ed Willis, Charles Harriman and Mr. Berger, a Fire Commissioner, after repeated attempts by Fire

Chief Jim McDowell and Superintendent Lee Emmert have failed to get the Board of Education to make the needed safety corrections and in the fear that similar hazzards would be built into the new addition which is soon to be constructed.

Three serious deficiencies are: 1. Fire exits blocked by ice and snow 2. Combustible materials in storage 3. Heating plant not properly cut off by partitions and fire doors.

The following suggestions were made after the inspection:

1. Keep exits free at all times of any and all obstructions.
2. Doors should swing in direction of exits.

" OIL ON THE TROUBLED WATERS"

We keep asking for it, this week we got it.

Letter to the Editor:  
 We, of the Petroleum and Vaseline Committee, have noted with interest your cooperation with other worthwhile committees of the area in trying to solve our power requirements. We feel that we should step forward at this time to make our presence known and to enlighten your readers with the great potential that petroleum may have in the field of electric generation. The Petroleum and Vaseline Committee was conceived to promote the new industry within our area, educate the public with many uses of petroleum products, to inhabit the region with a higher class of society, and to relieve the eye strain of the Watt Watchers. (\*1.) The Vaseline is for a more smooth operation of committee projects -- an aspect greatly neglected by other organizations. Since a survey is being conducted within the service area of MEA for possible coal fired steam generation, we feel that this survey should be extended to include the Combustion Gas Turbine. Let us not be too hasty to hitch our cart to the first "borough" that comes by. (\*\*2.)  
 Gas turbine generation has many features that should merit its consideration.

1. Simplicity: Gas turbines directly convert energy in the form of fuel into electrical power. Large quantities of water for heat transfer or cooling purposes are not required.

2. Easy Installation: The single-cycle, single-shaft unit may be easily handled for assembly and installation. A simple and inexpensive building and foundation can be used.

3. Low Operating Cost: The simplicity and automatic operation mean a minimum of operating and supervisory expense.

4. Efficiency: When properly applied, both steam and gas turbines operate with high cycle efficiencies ( the gas turbine when ratio of electric energy to heat energy is high - the steam turbine when this ratio is low). The gas turbine is more efficient than the non-condensing steam turbine when it is credited with the recovered heat in its exhaust gases for industrial use.

5. Rapid Startings: The total starting time is about 15 minutes from stand still to full load and it may be shut down with no attendant start-up losses -- an impossibility with steam.

6. Fuel: The combustion gas turbine is designed to operate on either natural gas or oil as fuel -- resources that may be in abundance in this area.

We would be very happy to offer further information on the gas turbine if interest in the subject is desired.

3. Inspection of Heating plants at least once per season.
4. Enclose Stairways
5. Where seats are not fixed special attention must be given to maintaining proper aisles free of all obstruction
6. Automatic fire dampers should be installed.
7. A Committee is needed to investigate the overloading of school busses. Special drills must be part of the safety training to reduce panic in case of accident.
8. An automatic sprinkler system is highly recommended.

At the close of this report a motion was made by Dorothy Steeby that the Chugiak P.T.A. write a letter to the Department of Education, with a copy to Fire Marshall Dearing, that these hazards listed on the Fire Safety report be rectified and nothing be included in the new building that does not pass the fire and safety standards. And if this is not done we request that the Fire Marshall close our schools. Concrete steps are specifically requested.

This motion was seconded and passed unanimously. The situation is one of extreme importance and individuals are urged to also write. Letters should be addressed to :

A report on the cost of fencing and lighting the school grounds was given but no action was taken.

Mrs. Tofson presented a list of items needed in the lunch room and the subject of free lunches for needy children was again brought up. Paul Fretwell volunteered to serve on a committee to review the situation and prepare a plan for the regular handling of such cases. One other person will be named to work with Mr. Fretwell.

The legislative committee is concerned over the current bill on schools but it is not yet known what final form this legislation may take. In view of this and in that action may be needed before another P.T.A. meeting can be called, the legislative committee was given permission to act in the name of P.T.A. and a sun was - continued page 7

# The Cook of The Month



COOK FOR MARCH  
CLEDA STEPHENS

Last year, when Cleda was a Room Mother, she brought as her contribution to the PTA refreshments a cake that was so delicious that most of the ladies there immediately had to know who had brought it and wished for the recipe. It was for this reason that we specifically asked Cleda for this moist, fruity cake; and we know that those who were present at that particular meeting and remember that cake will be happy to have this recipe.

### ORANGE CAKE

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 Tbs. orange peel (grated)
- 2 Tbs. lemon peel "
- 2 eggs (slightly beaten)
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 2½ cups sifted flour
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. soda
- ½ ts. salt
- 1 cup sour milk (1 tsp. vinegar added to sweet milk if sour milk is unavailable)

Cream sugar and butter.  
Add fruit peel and eggs.  
Sift dry ingredients and mix alternately with milk.  
Pour into greased ring mold (anglefood pan) pan.  
Bake at 350° for 50 to 60 minutes. Pour cooled sauce over hot cake. Let cool in pan.

### (SAUCE FOR ORANGE CAKE)

- 1 cup orange juice
- 2 Tbs. lemon juice
- 1 cup sugar

COMBINE and bring to a boil. Cool

# The GREEN THUMB Corner

Despite the snow and continued cold weather we still insist that gardening time is here; and will continue to talk about seeds and planting. The past few weeks have been devoted to vegetables and edible plants, however, a number of our readers are more interested in the more decorative phase of gardening and have asked if the Extension Service does not also recommend varieties of flower seeds for Alaskan planting.

The Extension Service does list a number of flowering plants in the pamphlet titled "Flowers for Alaska", however it lists the flowers by name, rather than including the best varieties as they do with vegetables. So while this will serve as a guide to the gardener, it is up to the individual to find which varieties of some particular plant do best, through experiment or the advice of more experienced gardeners.

One thing is noted in reading this bulletin, and that is the planting time recommended for almost all flower seeds; and that is late March or April. This immediately indicates that most flowers must be started indoors or

in a greenhouse. Although you will find that a number of these plants will produce flowers if planted outdoors after the danger of frost is past; our growing season is so short that in order to enjoy the flowers before fall, it is wise to if possible start the plants indoors.

To those of us who do not have a greenhouse and are limited to space for indoor planting, it may prove more practical to purchase seedlings from a nursery. This, of course, is more expensive, but it also insures one of having good healthy plants that are well started and will produce lovely blooms early in the summer.

The flowers which do well in Alaska, like most other plants grow to a greater height and produce larger blooms than do their counterparts in other climates and so while, we may be limited to a comparatively few varieties, the brilliant colors and profuse blossoms more than make up for this.

Also, many people prefer to transplant clusters of wild flowers to their yards. Most of these transplant well and will come up year after year.

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## CARNIVAL PLANS UNDERWAY

With the Chugiak Spring Carnival in the not-so-distant future, the Board of Directors will be meeting weekly to discuss plans and arrange work parties.

At their last meeting the board decided that this year the food concession will be let to a local person. Mrs. Ingvol Tofson who is the dietitian and chief cook at the school lunch program has been granted this concession. This should be welcome news to all as Mrs. Tofson's skill in food preparation and serving is well known in our community.

This year, the board is hoping to get as an added attraction, motorcycle races during the Carnival. Definite word of this is not available, pending a meeting with the local motorcycle club.

Everyone is reminded of the "idea" meeting which is to be held at Fire Lake Lodge this coming Saturday evening. This is an open meeting to all in the community, and anyone with ideas on making this a bigger and better carnival is urged to attend.

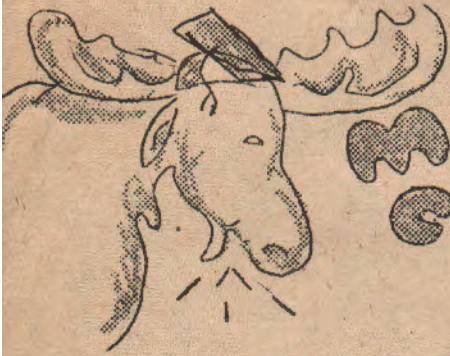

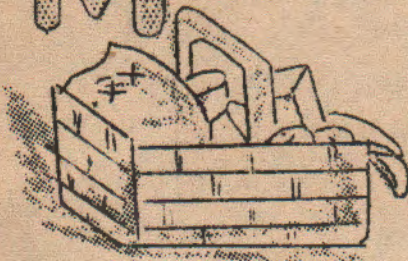

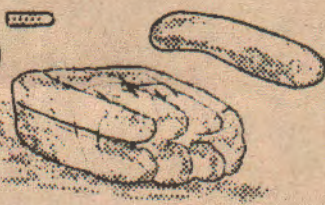
