ADVISORY COMMITTEE GATHERS INFORMATION

The advisory committee on the establishment of a borough for the Chugiak area met at Moose Horn last Friday evening Those present were Mrs. John Vanover, Aden Cates, Reese Tatro, Tom Slanker and Don Merrill. Mrs. Carl Steeby and Jim Polyefko were not present. Tom Slanker acted as chairman and Don Merrill as secretary. Mr. Tatro raad a letter from the Matanuska Valley Chamber of Commerce inviting representatives from the Chugiak area to participate in a borough meeting to be held in Palmer on or before March 20th. Mr. Tatro and Mr. Cates will represent the committee at this meeting.

It was decided that more information was needed before any recommendations could be made regarding the forming of a borough. Mrs. Vanover will contact Mr. Emmert on school finances with emphasis on the following points: Cost of operation of school, cost of bus operation for both high school and grade school transporation cost per student for High school, percentage of possible annual student increase and information on present existing quonset hut use. Mr. Tatro will gather data on the Palmer tax structure and how it would affect the Chugiak area if the Palmer borough were joined. Mrs. Vanover will gather data on the Anchorage tax structure in regard to joining that Sunday, March 15th at 1:00 p.m. borough area.

MEMBERSHIP ARROUSED OVER HAZZARDS AT CHUGIAK SCHOOL

At the regular monthly meeting of the Chugiak Parent Teacher Association held Tuesday evening a very disturbing report of safety conditions at the newer building at the Chugiak School was made by a committee who had been appointed at a previous meeting to inspect the school. The inspection and subsequent report was made Tuesday morning by Ed Willis, Charles Harriman and Mr. Berger a Fire Commissioner, after repeated attempts by Fire Chief Jim McDowell and Super-

intendant Lee Emmert have failed to get the Board of Education to make the needed safety corrections and in the fear that similar hazzards would be built into the new addition which is soon to be

constructed.

Three serious deficiencies 1. Fire exits blocked are:

by ice and snow

2. Combustible materials

in storage

3. Heating plant not properly cut off by partitions and fire doors.

The following suggestions were made after the inspection: 1. Keep exits free at all

times of any and all obstructions.

2. Doors should swing in direction of exits. Cont. Page 3, Col. 1

Letter to the Editor: We, of the Petroleum and Vasel-ine Committee, have noted with interest your cooperation with other worthwhile committees of the area in trying to solve our power requirements. We feel that we should step forward at this time to make our presence known and to enlighten your readers with the great potential that petroleum may have in the field of electric generation.

Gas turbine generation has many

features that should merit its consideration.

1 cup butter

2 eggs (slightly beaten)

1 cup shopped nuts

2 cups sifted flour

2 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. soda

ts. salt

I cup sour milk ( 1 tsp. vin egar added to sweet milk i if sour milk is unavailable)

Cream sugar and butter. Add fruit peel and eggs. Sift dry ingredients and mix alternately with milk. Pour into greased ring mold (anglefood pan) pan. Bake at 350° for 50 to 60 minutes. Pour cooled sauce over hot cake. Let cool in pan.



## The GREEN THUMACorner

Despite the snow and continued cold weather we still insist that gardening time is here; and will continues to talk about soods and planting. The past few weeks have been devoted to vegetables and edib ile plants, however, a number of our readers are more interested in the more decorative phase of gardening and have asked if the Extension Service does not also recommend varieties of flower seeds for Alaskan planting.

The Extensions Service does list's number of flowering plants in the pamphlet titled "Flowers for Alaska", however it lists the flowers by name, rather than including the best varieties as they do with vegetables. So while this will serve as a guide to the gardmer, it is up to the individual produce larger blooms than do to find which varieties of some particulary plant do best, through experiment or the advice of more experiencod gardners.

One thing is noted in read-ing this bullitin, and that is the planting time recommended for almost all flower seeds; and that is late March or April. This immediately indicates that most flowers must be started indoors or

in a greenhouse. Although you will find that a number of these plants will produce flowers if planted outdoors after the danger of frost is past; our growing season is so short that in order to enjoy the flowers before fall, it is wise to if possible start the plants in-

To those of us who do not have a grounhouse and are limited to space for indoor planting, it may prove more practical to purchase soodlings from a mursery. This, of course, is more expen-sive, but it also insures one of having good healthy plants that are well started and will produce lovely blooms early in the summer.

The flowers which do well in Alaska, like most other plants grow to a greater height and their counterparts in other climates and so while, we may be limited to a comparatively few varieties, the brilliant colors and profuse blossoms more than make up for this.

Also, many people prefer to transplant clusters of wild flowers to their yards. Most of these transplant well and will come up year after year. \*\*\*\*\*


