This is not true in the Palmer area. All driveways there are peeled down just like the main road and it appears that that service is given by the B.P.R. Next time you go to Palmer take a look. Why can't we have it that way?

Dear Editor:

I believe the importance of the employment angle of a coal fired steam generating plant for M.E.A. has been over stressed, perhaps even to the point of exaggeration. The mining part of it in particular.

I realize that the ordinary man in this area has had little occasion to investigate the possibilities of various types of electrical generation, so with this in mind I took it upon myself to do a little reading. I was surprised to find how little I myself knew, and I've been working in this field for the past 5 years.

For instance, I find that in the South 48 the 15 most efficient steam generating plants require less than 9,470 BTU per KW Hr. The most efficient, Kahawia River, requires 9,118 BTU per KW Hr. The figures for all 15 plants are available in the February 1959 issue of Power Magazine.

I am not informed on the size of the proposed M.E.A. plant, but I'm reasonable sure that the average Kilowatt hour demand of the Matanuska Electric Association is considerably less than 5000 Kilowatt hours per hour. Ed. note: we didn't know there was a proposed plant for M.E.A., we only know that a study is being made to consider the possibilities and the feasibility of steam generation. With this demand, the least efficient BTU per KW Hr. rate of the top 15, and with the accepted figure of 11,988 BTU per pound of bituminous coal we can calculate the amount of coal required:

One lb. coal produces  
1.27 KW Hr.

3,929 lbs. coal produce  
5000 KW. Hr.  
94,296 lbs. coal produce  
5000 KW Hr. per hour  
for 24 hours.

This amounts to less than 48 tons per day.

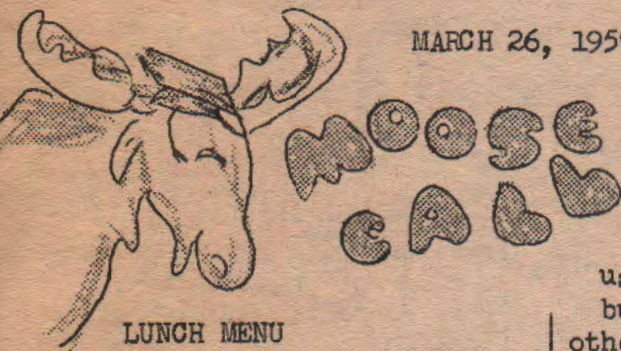

air injectors, etc., not used in hydro plants are a constant source of trouble requiring large maintainance crews and larger inventories of spare parts.

All things considered it looks a great deal cheaper to run a hydro plant to me.

Perhaps this difference can be off set by easing the unemployment problem of the miners. Truthfully, I couldn't find any information on the number of men required to boost the output of a coal mine by 48 tons a day.

Who prints Power Magazine? The REA Co-operatives or the Independent Light & Power Companies? Or Engineers? I hope it is the latter but I fear it is the former. Anyway, we stockholders of the M.E.A. are in a competitive business whether we think so or not so we had better get

off the old one spot. The whole State is growing like a weed and the power now provided is soon not going to handle the need. We will be having brown-outs like we used to have. True, CEA is now building Cooper Lake and planning other similar projects. They will have power to use and to sell but they too will have to struggle to keep up with the growing demand. We are in the business of supplying power - to ourselves for now, yes - but there is no reason we shouldn't produce our supply, or an extra supply for sale. Industry, factories are never going to use our power if we haven't any to supply. We'll be left behind while fooling around waiting for hydro when we have a rezdy potential in coal. It is not even a gamble to build a power supply now. (Hydro takes several years to build.) If we don't do it we are holding the Valley and the whole area back. There is room and need for a smelter, a steel mill, a garment factory, food processing plants, any number of industries, and the day is upon us when there will be a population to use the products from such enterprise. Sure -

it will take invested capital, but it takes looking too, not just 2000 meters today but 200,000 meters soon. We should be a real business ( that was what CAPA wanted to do - not for the MEA & CEA but for CAPA) not just a puny co-op trying to figure ways out of paying taxes. But that is another subject to be pursued at a later date for that is a boiling pot about to boil over.

# The Cook of The Month



COOK FOR MARCH  
CLEDA STEPHENS

Every mother of a family of small children spends most of her baking time on cookies. These perennial favorites of children should be easy to make, yet tasty. The recipe that Clelda offers this week answers that description. These spicy little drop cookies can be whipped up in short order, and with a topping of easy to make icing, take on a party appearance.

### GINGER CREAMS

MIX WELL: 1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 cup molasses

STIR IN: 1 tsp soda dissolved in hot water

SIFT TOGETHER:  
2 cups sifter flour  
1/2 tsp salt  
1 tsp ginger  
1 tsp nutmeg  
1 tsp cloves  
1 tsp cinnamon

STIR INTO FIRST MIXTURE AND CHILL.

Drop rounded teaspoonfull on a lightly greased cookie sheet.

BAKE; 7 to 8 minutes at 400°.

FROST: with quick cream frosting

QUICK CREAM FROSTING  
BLEND: 3/4 cup sifted confectioners sugar (next col.)

1/2 tsp vanilla  
1 Tbs cream\* (or enough to spread easily).

# The GREEN THUMB Corner



## GROUND PREPARATION AND FERTILIZATION

The manner in which winter is stubbornly hanging on does not look too encouraging for gardening. However this is a good time to make plans and think about the various problems that will arise when the snow finally does disappear.

Some of us have established gardens which we have used in past years, while others will be clearing virgin land or enlarging their plots.

What kind of fertilizer to use is a question that comes up most frequently. It is common to blame past failures of the use of improper fertilizers, and usually this is quite the case.

The question of the best fertilizer for your particular garden can be only answered accurately by a scientific analysis of the soil. This service is available to all at no cost by the experiment station in Palmer.

As soon as a sample of the soil can be obtained, mail it to the experiment station, along with any pertinent information regarding your garden; such as the crop planned on growing, whether or not this is new land or has been gardened before etc. They will send you a prescription of the type fertilizer to use, along with instructions as to amount to apply and the frequency

that additional applications should be made.

In Alaska commercial fertilizers are recommended almost exclusively, partially because of the scarcity of animal fertilizer, and partially because the nature of our soil requires it.

Another problem faced by gardeners in our community is the short time between the thawing of the ground and the time in which gardens should be planted.

There are a number of residents who have purchased small garden tractors for soil preparation; but many of us have rather small plots and find it more economical to rent or hire such equipment.

The few owners of tractors who do such work, find the demand for their services will come all at the same time and are sometimes not able to fill all requests as soon as the gardeners are ready.

This paper would like to suggest that any owners of gardening equipment, who had

(green thumb) possibly not considered hiring their time or equipment might welcome an opportunity to help defray the cost of their equipment, as well as assist their neighbors in their gardening problem. This is particularly true of the smaller type of rototillers, as many plots are quite small, and difficult for the large farm type of tillers to maneuver satisfactorily. We feel sure that if owners of these will make their services known, they will have many "takers".

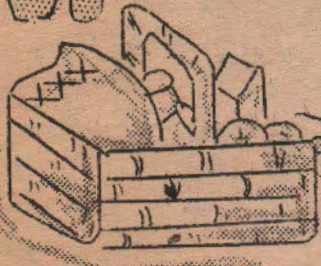

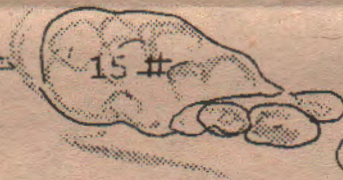
