COOK FOR APRIL
JEANETTE WOTHERSPOON

Jeanette was raised in the south, and her cooking frequently reflects this. One of her favorites, is also a favorite southern pastry; Fried Pies. These are sometimes mistakenly called turnovers, which are similar in shape and filling, but which are made of pie dough and baked in the oven. True Fried Pies, however are made of a flaky biscuit dough and fried in deep fat.

FRIED PIES

Cook any dried fruit by recipe on box. Sugar and cool.

Mix 3 cups Bisquick with enough milk to make dough stiff.

ROLL a small ball of dough into a small circle.

PLACE a spoonfull of filling at one end of circle and pull dough over fruit. Crimp edges.

When all the pies have been prepared, drop one at a time into deep fat which has been heated to 365°. Turn when brown (about 2 minutes) Drain on paper towels and sprinkle with powdered sugar. May be served warm or cold.

PLANTING A LAWN

Most of our local gardeners are becoming quite impatient to begin working outside. However, as many have learned, it does no good to be too impatient. The ground must be warm enough for seed germination, otherwise nothing is gained by too early planting, and seeds may even be harmed.

Many people are thinking of putting in a lawn this year. The advantages of a well cared for lawn are obvious. Even the most modest dwelling looks special when surrounded by an expanse of green.

Unfortunately, many people in Alaska are loath to plant lawns for a variety of reasons. Many feel that the summers are too short, and that lawns do not survive the winter. True, our summers while beautiful, are comparatively short. However a properly planted and cared for lawn will last year after year and grow increasingly more beautiful.

Failure to last the winter may be caused by using the improper seed for this climate, or by not being careful to protect the lawn during the winter. A large amount of traffic over the lawn after snow has fallen will cause ice to form. This destroys the insulating quality of the

snow, and allows the lawn to "winter-kill". Therefore it is advisable to keep children or dogs from playing or walking over the spot where the lawn is planted.

Also many seed mixtures contain varieties which make a good showing the first year, and then fail to come up or are patchy the following season. It is therefore wise to avoid the bargain seed mixtures, which are most likely to contain these types and use Kentucky bluegrass or mixture of bluegrass and creeping red fescue which is recommended by the extension service.

Proper preparation of the seed bed is also important. A level or sloping grade with no low spots is essential.

If topsoil is poor or insufficient, then more should be brought in. Also fertilizer should be applied at this time. About 15 to 20 lbs. of 10-20-10 per 1,000 sq. ft of lawn and work well into topsoil. Wet down and let settle for a week or two before seeding.

Seed should be divided into two equal parts and then sowed broadcast, first in one direction & then at right angles. Be sure to use enough seed, or the result will be a patchy lawn. Kentucky bluegrass should be about 2 to 4 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft; & creeping red fescue about 3 to 5 lbs. per sq. ft.

Seed should be raked well into the soil and the area compacted with a roller. The surface should be kept moist with daily sprinkling until grass is about one inch tall. If you do not have a supply of water for these sprinklings, it is wise to wait until the middle of July, when the summer rains begin. Lawns may be planted as late as six weeks prior to freezing weather, and still insure a good start for the next year.

Do not allow the grass to grow over three inches tall before mowing. Cutting the grass encourages thicker turf and a healthier lawn. Also, contrary to some belief, long grass does not protect a lawn during the winter. In fact, the water which may collect in the long grass will turn to ice, and damage the lawn.

Following the directions for preparation, watering and mowing should result in year after year of beautiful lawn, with only a minimum of annual repair necessary.

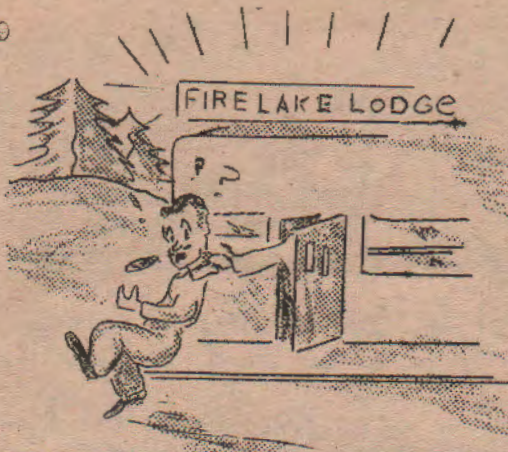
CANDIDATE FOR MAYOR VICTIM OF FOUL PLOT

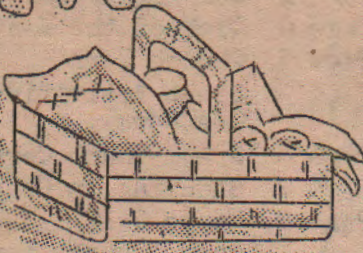


