

New Enterprise Formed Here

A group of Alaskans from Chugiak, Anchorage and Fairbanks have recently entered into a joint venture which they are incorporating under the name of the Alaska Mining Syndicate with temporary business headquarters at Moose Horn Trading Post.

It is reported that a prominent Alaskan, a resident of Anchorage, is to head the new company and that Jim McDowell long-time business man of Chugick, is one of the Directors. Mr. Fred Pettyjohn, prospector and miner from Fairbanks and the Upper Susitna River country is included in the management. The Alaska Mining Syndicate is primarily interested in the development of mining properties and in prospecting for other mineral deposits with commercial possibilities. The headquarters and supply point which the Syndicate is . constructing on the Susitna River at Denali, is located where the new Denali Highway to Mt. McKinley crosses the Susitna River, and will serve the public as well as its mining activities.

The mining industry of Alaska requires only the development of some of the vast mineral resources to make the new state into one of the principal metal producers in the Union and the need for companies such as the new Mining Syndicate is very important.

"Slippery Tom"is Chugiaks new "Mayor"

CHUGIAK.. APR.22 '59 Chugiak voters who "hankered for Slanker", were jubilant today as returns indicated that Tom "Slippery" Slanker had been swept into office in a landslide victory.

Although returns were still incomplete at presstime, 10 of the thirteen precincts in Chugiak were overwhelming for Slanker with a total of 10,982 wetes. The closest opponent teen-aged Linda Henrich was lagging with a total of 5,441 when the other candidates conceded to victory to the "Far North Fuel". Even Slankers sharpest critic, Dorothy Steeby begrudgingly offered her congradulations.

Only the former Mayor Vern Haik refused to admit defeat and demanded a recount. However, since Haik had only polled a total of 162 votes his protests went unheeded.

It is suspected in some circles that Haik was behind the effort to discredit Slanker when it became obvious that he was the peoples choice for that high office. Who else would have spread the rumor that the unexpected cold spell of the past weekend, coupled with threats of delayed delivery of fuel oil caused an unusually large number of votes to be cast for Slanker during those two days.

However, despite, plots, namecalling and general mud-slinging; the voters apressed their confidence in the Far North House-warmer, and entrusted to him the job of administiring Chugiaks ffairs of state for the next year.

The new mayor is to be found at his mile 14 service station shaking hands and passing out cigars to all the loyal supporters who with unswerving devotion elected him Chugiaks first citizen.

MORE GARDENING TIPS

The way that winter refuses to release its grip, makes it necessary to continue to confine our gardening to indoors. Those who started seedlings in small containers several weeks ago, may find that they may grow too large before it is safe to set them Be sure to check outdoors. to see if they may be getting root-bound, and move to a larg er container if necessary.

Also, as the plants become larger, it may become nec-essary to add a little fertil-izer. His is rather tricky izer. when theplant is confined to a small pot or can. It is best to use a "pill" such as a Plantab, as it is possible to apply too much of the reguular garden variety when the plant is still potted, this can burn the plant and perhaps kill it. The Plantabs are designed to fertilize. plants that are growing in a small amount of soil, and are bsorb. ed by the plant as they are needed.

Starting of seedlings in the house has been simplified in recent years by the development of pre-planted trays in a specially prepared media.

These "PUNCH & GRON!" gardens come sealed in plastic and need only the addition of water to start germination. This is a very handy way for one who is short on space to start a variety of flower and vegetable plants indoors ization of their choice; CBA

The media used in these trays is not soil, but is food to get the seedlings off for the coming year, along with to a good start and to susto transplant.

Any seedlings that are growing inside need to be watered frequently, as they tend to dry out rapidly inside. A water soluble fertilizer, such as the fish fertilizer may be applied occasionally with the daily watering. If this is used plants.



These books cost .08¢ apiece, and the money was raised by membership sub-The first semblence of a lightrom P.T.A. members. From time to time new



"MYSTERY" CAMPAIGN MANAGER REVEALED




