water supplies such as lakes, streams and undeveloped springs should not be considered safe for drinking purposes without treatment. Such water can be treated by boiling or adding one drop of household bleach per quart of water. If household bleach is used, the water should stand at least 30 minutes. When water is boiled it may have a flat taste. This can be eliminated by pouring from one container to another to add air.

Help and informational materials may be obtained from the Section of Sanitation & Engineering at 327 Eagle Street in Anchorage. The engineer and the sanitarians will be glad to help in any way possible to make your water supply safe.

RHUBARB

One of the most valuable crops and also one of the most easily grown in the home garden is rhubarb. It is ready to use just a few weeks after the frost is out of the ground, long before berries are ripe and offers a tasty "fruit" for sauce, jams jellies etc.

Rhubarb is hardy, even beyond the artic circle. It does best in rich, well watered soil. It may be grown from seed, but it is preferable to obtain sections of root and crown.

The best variety is one that has deep red stalks, such as lacDonald, Ruby, Wine..these are all the best type to freeze as well as can.

The crown and roots should be divided into sections with one or two eyes to each piece. Set the pieces in holes 4 to 5 feet apart, that have been spaded deep and the soil mixed with barnyard manure. Cover the roots with 4 inches of soil, firm well and keep watered. It is best not to use any of the stalks until the second year. When flower stalks appear, they should be cut off.

Do not harvest all the stalks or they will come up spindly the next year. Each year fertilize well with manure or commercial fertilizer 4-12-4, a handful around each plant several times during the summer. In the fall cover the plots lightly with straw or manure.

Reset or divide the crowns when the plants "run out" and stalks get spindly.

Rhubarb is rich in ascorbic acid and has many valuable uses.

In addition to the well known pies, Jellies and sauces, undiluted rhubarb juice is strongly acid and may take the place of lemon juice or vinegar in many recipes. This is especially true of jelly juices such as highbush cranberries, and fully ripened raspberries and strawberries which lack tartness.

When harvesting Rhubarb, water the plant well the night before, or pick after a rain. Pull the stalks gently from the sockets, do not cut them. Cut off the leaves and place them around the plant or in the compost pile.

There are a large number of recipies for rhubarb including some for relishes. These are printed in Extension bulletin #F-22 and may be obtained at the extension service office.


