The Race is ON!

One of the fiercest political battles of the century is now underway in Chugiak. The campaign to elect a new Mayor to represent the Chugiak Spring Carnival began last Friday with the nomination of six candidates.

The first name on the list is Vern Haik, the incumbent mayor who is seeking re-election. Vern, who has obtained the services of Bruce Robinson as his campaign manager, says that he stands on his record. He favors the annexation of Fairview and Spenard (to Chugiak that is) and promises running water in every home, if only in the basement.

The rights of the "Homesitters" are being defended by Dorothy Steeby, who calls herself the "Homeaid" Candidate. Her platform is "No muddy driveways & no mud slinging." She also favors a mental hospital for harried homesitters. Eulie Davis is her campaign manager.

The teenagers choice is Miss Linda Henrich, who has enlisted Mrs. Leslie Todd to manage her campaign for a Detention Home for Delinquent parents.

We have all heard the song that goes "...I'd love to bake a Sunshine Cake..." Well for those who want the recipe, here it is. Jeanette also loves to bake this high light golden cousin to both an angle food and sponge cake; in fact she took a prize with it at last bake contest of the Chugiak Spring Carnival.

SUNSHINE CAKE

- 9 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 cups Cake Flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp cream of tartar
- 1 tsp orange extract
- 1 tsp lemon extract

Separate Eggs:
 Beat whites until stiff adding salt & cream of tartar.
 ADD sugar gradually.
 Beat yolks with flavorings.
 ADD yolks to whites.
 FOLD in flour.
 POUR in ungreased tube pan.
 Place in COLD oven.
 SET oven at 325° and bake one hour and 20 minutes. Remove from oven.
 INVERT for one hour.
 Delicious with any ice cream.

TARTAR SAUCE

- 3/4 cups mayonaise
- 1 tbs. each:
 - Chopped pickle
 - capers
 - olives
 - onion

CHUGIAK BELLES MEET

It seems that there are several misconceptions regarding joining this group, and this paper has been requested to clarify the issue.

The Belles are open to any lady residing in Chugiak who would like to join. It is not, and has not ever been open only by invitation. No previous dancing experience of any kind is necessary all members are amateurs. CBA pays for material necessary to make costumes, the costume becoming the property of CBA, but is in the custody to the individual Belle as long as she remains active in the group. The 4th. candidate is no stranger to local politics. Slippery favors the annexation of Anchorage, and thinks that the area from Portage to Alpine should be known as greater Chugiak. He also states that he believes that all the bars in the community should be closed during the election (the election is to last three weeks.) Slippery refuses to divulge who his campaign manager will be, but it is rumored that he plans to import some political genius who will show our local folks no mercy.

Glamor was added to the race with the nomination of Liz Harriman, the "CAN-CAN CANDIDATE." 

PLANTING TIPS & ODDS AND ENDS

This week, instead of quoting verbatim from an extension service bulletin, we will attempt to pass on some tips and short cuts that have been suggested to us by a number of local gardeners.

The time will soon arrive when the seedlings of tomatoes which were started in paper cups or similar containers will soon need to be moved to a larger pot. It is a good idea to start saving the large cans that shortening comes in, or any other large tins that you may have. These make good planters, and when you are ready to remove the plants from them, cut the bottom out with a can opener, and push the plant out, dirt and all, from the bottom without disturbing the roots at all.

When starting gladiola bulbs in cans in the house (coffee cans are good for this) use some method to mark the color or the flower on the can. In that way, you can make a more planned color arrangement in the final bed. Also gladioli make a better showing in they are planted in a circle or a mass rather than a straight row. Frequently some bulbs fail to bloom, and this is

less obvious if they are not planted in a row like soldiers.

Last year we printed a suggestion for starting of sweet-pea and nasturtium seeds which we shall reprint. Spread the seeds between two sheets of wet paper toweling. Place this on a sheet of aluminum foil, and cover with a second sheet, fold up all four edges to seal. This should be placed in a warm place where the seeds will germinate in just a very few days. When the roots are about two inches long, they may be planted; this should insure blooms several weeks earlier than those planted directly in the ground.

After many years with no appreciable change in flower seeds, there are now on the market many novel and handy methods of packaging seeds. One company coats seeds in a protective and nutritive material that not only makes many of the very small and hard to handle seeds a more practical size, but this coating is also colored to match the flower that it will produce, making planning of flower beds more interesting. Also you can now buy gardens by the "yard". Seeds preplanted in strips of material that may be cut and arranged in the ground to provide edgings, beds or beauty spots. These seeds are spaced correctly and thinning is usually not necessary.

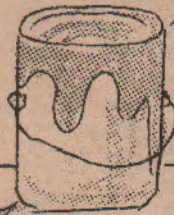
LIBRARY IN NEW LOCATION

The eighth Grade has a farewell party for their teacher Mr. McKinley, last Wednesday.

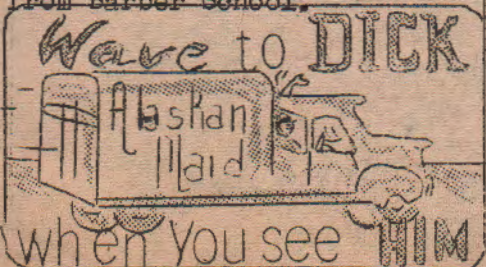

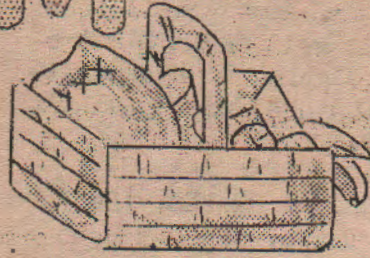

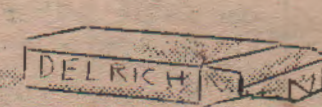

30 Rescue runs with ambulance (oxygen and resuscitator equipment)
Several Lives were undoubtedly saved

28 Fire Runs made. Some were answered with hand extinguishers because of the lack of funds to keep the trucks going.

895 man hours put in on actual fires and rescue calls which does not include the vast number of hours spent on training, maintenance of fire equipment and public service.

CHUGIAK FIRE PREVENTION ASSOCIATION HIGHLIGHTS

The objects of the Chugiak Fire Prevention Association are to develop and provide at the lowest cost consistent with sound economy and good judgement for the citizens of the Chugiak area a fire safety plan incorporating the following:

1. Fire and Accident Prevention.
2. Fire Protection.
3. Fire Safety Education
4. Contracts for fire protection (mutual aid)
5. Changes in Insurance Grading.

All rules and regulations set up by the present temporary board will be voted on by the paid up members at an annual meeting which will be held as soon as all the details for setting up the organization have been worked out.

Members will have the right to elect new members to the board at the annual meeting.

Each area will have two representatives on the board.

All board members will serve without remuneration.

\$6,000.00 Estimated absolute minimum costs for next year's operation. This will provide heat for the ambulance and two fire trucks. There are two other trucks available for use if there are funds.

The Board hopes to raise the needed funds with the following rate per family:

\$25.00 per Year - this may be paid \$3.00 for the first month and \$2.00 per month thereafter until the end of the year. Business rates have not yet been established.

All monies collected by the Board will be Accounted for and the books of the organization will be open for Public Inspection. The Treasurer is Bonded.

If the Chugiak area has a working Fire Company they have the full support of Anchorage, Army, and Air Force Fire Departments through present mutual aid agreements.

We need the aid of EVERY FAMILY in the area to put our Emergency Equipment back in motion.
