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Little League Begins Practice

The Katmai Little League of Chugiak officially opened practice sessions this past Sunday. They will practice every week-day evening and Sat & Sun. afternoon from now until June 1st, which is the date of the Season opener. They will play their first game on the local diamond, & there will be a game on this diamond every game date this season.

The Katmai League this year is sponsored by the Mt. View Lions Club, and every game will be umpired by official umpires from Elmendorf and official scorekeepers will be furnished by the League.

Roger Jonrowe is the only coach at this time. More are needed to fix the diamond, build the dugouts, finish the fence, rake the rocks, repair the backstop. Fathers of boys turn out could help a great deal on these projects and are asked to contact the manager or coaches at the practices.

ROOT MAGGOT CONTROL

The experiment station has announced that this is going to be a bad year for root maggots, (or a good year depending on whether one is a gardener or a maggot). Since the best time to treat these pests is before they have had a chance to do their dirty work, we will offer some of the preventitives that the extension service suggests.

A convenient method for the home gardner to treat radish seed, is at the time of planting. Apply 1 per cent of aldrin, chlordan or heptachlor dust at the rate of 2 oz. per foot row with the seed before the seed is covered.

Treatments of the soil prior to planting by use of emulsion sprays, dusts or granular formulations is wath trying on a small scale. It has not given as high a degree of control as post-emergence treatment. This soil should be harrowed and disked to mix the insecticide thoroughly into the top 4 to 6 inches prior to planting. As in the case of fertilizer, the germinating seedling should not come in contact with a relatively high concentration of insecticide or germination and stand may be reduced.

In the case of cabbage or cauliflower and broccoli, a first application may be applied in the transplant water, and following treatments applied at 10 day intervals, as long as egg laying period persists. Last treatment should be at least 20 days prior to harvest.

The following table is the recommended dosage and timing of application for the crops most vulnerable.

The club has ordered 10 gallons of the insects. Some of this order has not yet been spoken for, so anyone with an aphid problem who is interested in obtaining some lady-bugs may get further information from Paul Swanson at the Post office. Aphids may be recognized as a small flat green flake resembling green dandruff. They are about the size of a pin-head. They are harmful to many crops and are wreaking havoc with the birch trees in the area.

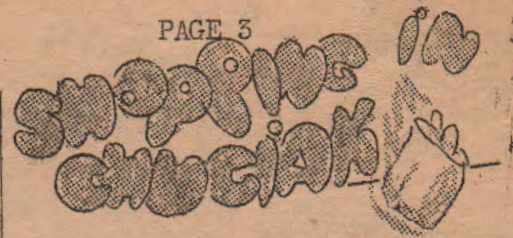

The Cook of the Month

COOK FOR MAY PAULINE LATIMER

This weeks recipe is another familiar dish to lovers of Mexican foods, but this has a slightly different variation, being made with chicken.

CHICKEN ENCHILADAS

- 2 cups diced cooked chicken
- 3/4 cups cut-up ripe olives
- 2 tsp. chopped onion
- 1/4 cup grated sharp cheese

Make tortillas as in original recipe. Brush both sides of tortilla with melted butter. Cover with chicken, olives, onion and cheese. Roll up and place close together in a shallow 9" baking dish. Pour sauce over rolls, then cover rolls with 2 tbs. chopped onion and 1/2 cup grated cheese. Bake at 15 minutes at 350° (will serve 4).

SAUCE: Saute 1 clove garlic minced in 1 tbs. olive oil. Add two 8 oz cans tomato sauce, 1 cup water 1 1/2 tsp. chili powder. (or use Chili straight from the can for Chili enchiladas instead of the chicken mixture.)

the Country Music field.

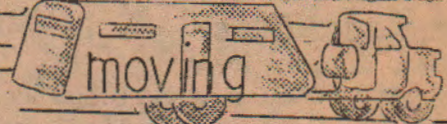
Local talent both profess-
