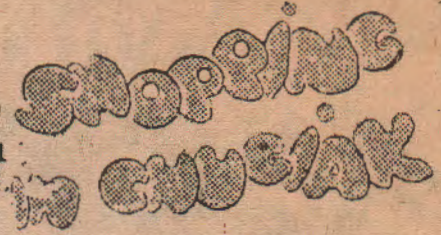

MIRROR LAKE IMPORTANT RECREATION SITE

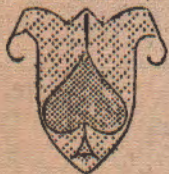
The department of Fish and Game regards Mirror Lake at mile 23 as one of the most important recreation sites in the area.

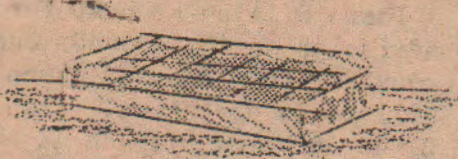

For her final visit to our column, Ethel offers a luscious candy, a tasty main dish and a very favorite dessert.

VAN DYNES \$100 FUDGE

- 1/2 cup margerine
- 1/2 cup mineature marshmallows
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 2 pkgs chocolate chips
- one Cup chopped walnuts

MIX: 4 1/2 cups sugar
1 tall can evaporated milk
BOIL exgetly 7 minutes stirring constantly

ADD immediately the marshmallows
POUR when dissolved into your largest mixing bowl into which you have placed the chocolate chips and oleo, nuts and vanilla.

STIR until dossolved.
POUR into buttered pans and cool.

STUFFED CABBAGE

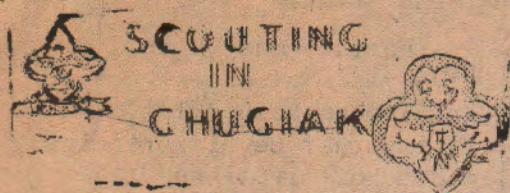

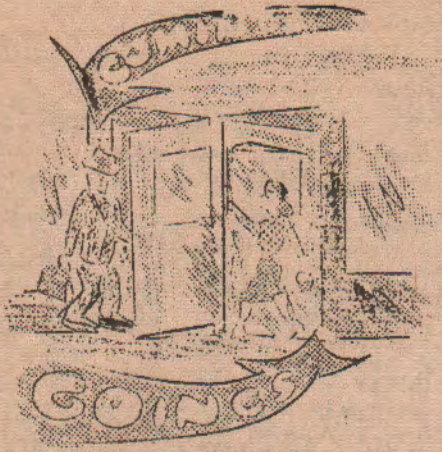

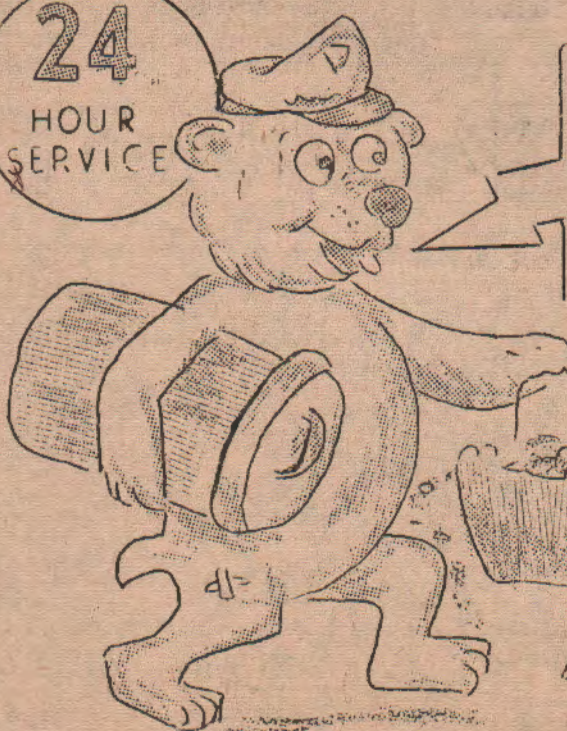
1. Nominee must have had five years of experience as an Alaskan bush pilot, and flying must be his principal source of livelihood.

5. Outstanding example or examples of service to people through the use of his airplane will be considered in the nominee's favor.
6. Testimony of neighbors, friends and customers as to nominee's character, service, citizenship and personal characteristics will be considered by the judges.

The award will be made on the evening of June 26th at a Bush pilot banquet to be held in Palmer in conjunction with the State Aviation Fair.

The winner will be presented with a trophy and will also receive gifts from various manufactures.

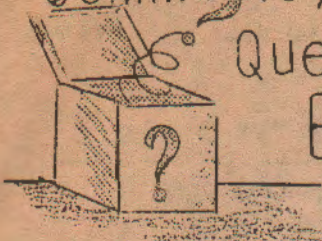

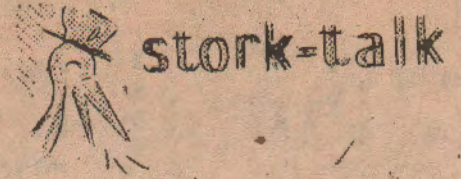

fires started by carelessness on the part of persons engaged in Spring clean-up programs.

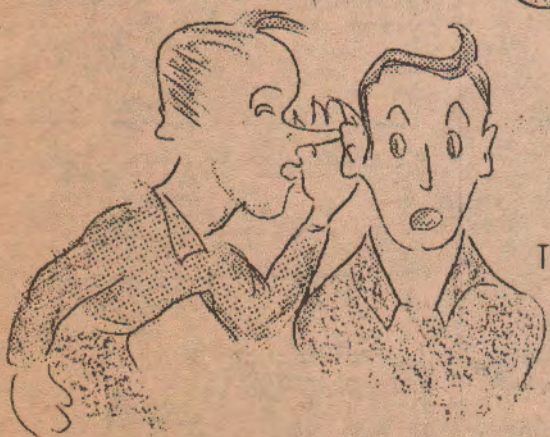
Within municipalities, Crouse reminded, persons must obtain fire permits from local fire departments for bonfires or rubbish fires. Those living outside municipalities also are subject to State regulations which forbid kindling or maintaining any bonfire or rubbish fire on or in any street, road or other public ground without proper authorization.

The regulations also prohibit such fires "on any private land unless the location is not less than 50 feet from any structure and adequate provision is made to prevent fire from spreading to within 50 feet of any structure."

Persons violating the regulation, Crouse warned, are subject to arrest and penalty.

According to a creel census conducted by military game conservation agents in cooperation with the Alaska Dept. of Fish and Game, the following figures were obtained.

Between the period of Dec. 23rd, 1959 and March 28 1960 323 fishermen fished the lake or an average of 6.87 fishermen per day, or .76 fish per hour.

Of the fish caught and counted during that period, 984 were silver salmon and 252 were rainbow trout.

It is anticipated that during the coming fishing season this lake will be more heavily fished than ever.



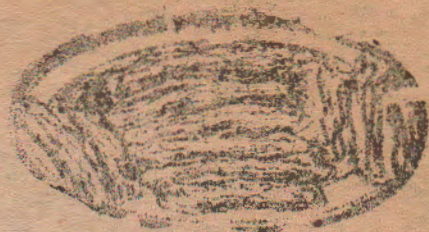
