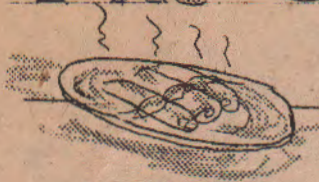

# The Cook of The Month



COOK FOR MAY  
PAULINE LATIMER

For her final recipe Pauline has given us a tasty Mexican dish, which is not as well known as some of her others, but is none the less delicious.

## BURROITOS

Make tortillas, following previous recipe, but a little heavier.

Cook and mash Pinto or Pink Beans, after first draining off the liquid.

Butter tortillas on one side. Place a spoonful of beans on buttered side. Add chopped onion and a little chili powder; salt and pepper to taste. Fold side in and roll. Serve hot.

For those who prefer meat; this may be added to the beans. Brown meat thoroughly and prepare as for beans and tortillas.

When they finally homesteaded on Bear lake, near Paris, Idaho (not far from Yellowstone National Park) Kathy planted her slips, which grew into large bushes. As Kathy's children grew up and left for homesteads of their own, they took slips of these bushes with them to plant.

Now, years later, the yellow rose and the purple lilac are making their farthest journey. Ellie Mae decided that she would like slips of these bushes to plant on her homestead down on the Anchor River.

Since her letter home was answered with not one but a number of these slips, Ellie Mae has decided to share them with her friends in Chugiak. As she could not possibly have enough to give to all of them, she hit upon a plan whereby all could enjoy their beauty.

Paul Swanson, our postmaster has made the grounds of the postoffice one of the garden spots of the community with his beautiful flower beds and reflecting pools.

Ellie Mae decided that it was here that everyone in Chugiak comes at one time or another, and it is here where these bushes would be displayed for all to see. So she is giving these slips to Paul, to be planted near the Post Office

So, in the future, when you stop to mail a letter and see these bushes in full bloom, remember young Kathy O'Rielly, who when she carried them across the plains many years ago, never dreamed that someday they would be blooming in Chugiak, Alaska.

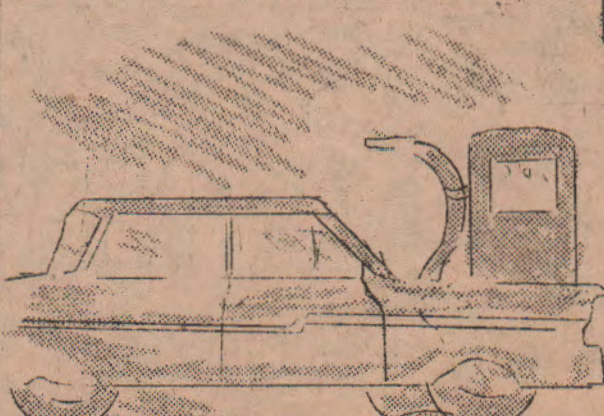

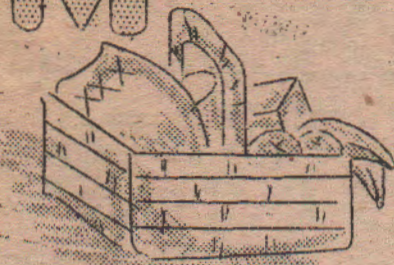

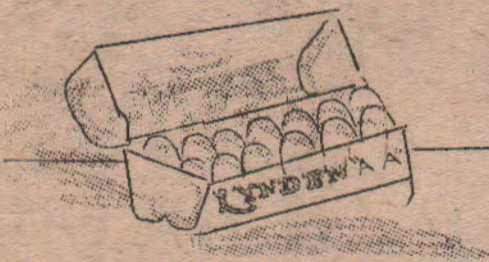
