The job of arranging and printing the Souvenir Programs for the Stage Show has been awarded to Frank Milliman and Mrs. & Mrs. Charles Harriman.

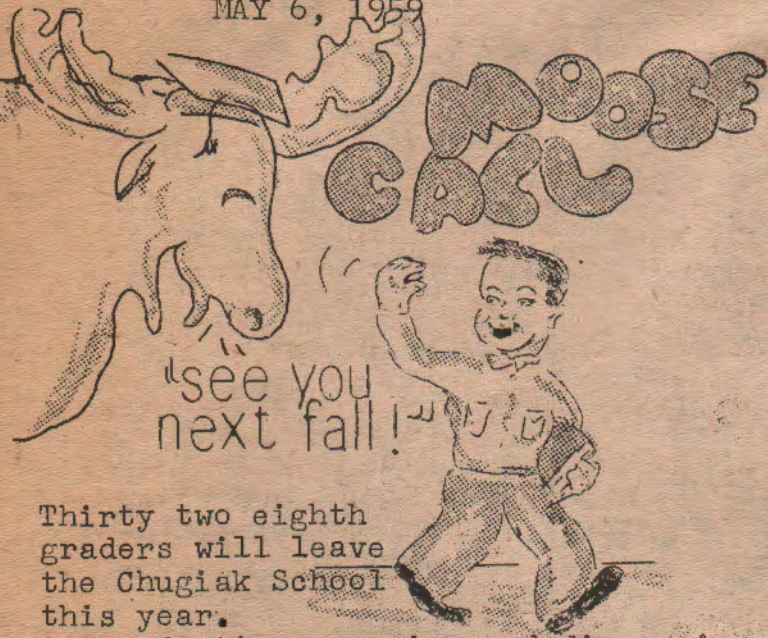

We are always happy to get a cook who, can because of her ancestry add some foreign recipes to our collection.

This is the case with our cook for May. PAULINE LATIMER boasts a very international background, being of Scotch, Swedish, French and Spanish extraction. However it is from her father who originally came from Mexico that Pauline got her "South of the Border" recipes that she will share with us.

Pauline lives on her Birchwood homesite with her husband Max and 16 month old daughter Kluane. As those of you who have driven the Alaska highway will guess, Kluane was named for that beautiful lake in Canada.

Max, had driven the highway many times when he operated his own truck service in 1949, and he always loved the name of the lake. It was only natural that he name his first daughter after it.

The Latimers have made Alaska their home for the past two years, and have lived for one year in Chugiak. Pauline's original home was Denver Colorado. At the present time Max is employed by Alaska Freight Lines.

Pauline learned to cook the Mexican recipes from her father and she has adapted them to our American style of food preparation, while still managing to maintain the original flavor and appearance.

Having a small daughter, and a husband whose hours of work are irregular, keeps Pauline quite close to home. However she keeps busy with her many hobbies of gardening, crocheting, drawing and of course cooking.

Both Pauline and Max have a hobby that would alarm the average person, for they are avid motorcyclists. Both of them love to ride, and miss the cycle clubs that are so pop-

Pauline feels nothing but contempt for the "smart kids" who think the only use for a motorcycle is to see how fast they can go racing down the highway, and thereby give all cycle fans a bad name. She waxed very enthusiastic when she told of the wonderful outings the club members would enjoy; of the pleasure of just cruising leisurely along the highways, enjoying the sights as it is impossible to enjoy them when driving in a car.

The Latimers brought their cycle to Alaska with them. In fact Max attempted to drive it up the highway and did get from Montana to BC before a mechanical breakdown made it necessary for him to ship it the remainder of the way by truck.

Both Pauline and Max love Alaska and love their home in Chugiak. So once again we bring you a cook who in addition to being a very capable homemaker, is also a talented and interesting person.

The first recipe that Pauline offers us is the basic part of almost all

Mexican foods. It is the familiar "Tortilla" which will be used in all the following recipes that Pauline has contributed.

TORTILLAS (lazy mans style)

Mix 1 cup Bisquick
1/4 cup water.

KNEAD about 1 minute on flour-board (lightly)

SHAPE into 8 balls and roll out thin.

BAKE lightly on ungreased griddle.

COOL between folds of damp towel (prevents drying.)

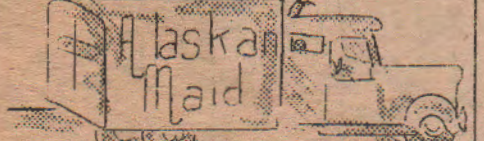

The GREEN THUMB Corner

EASY TO GROW FLOWERS

Beginners at gardening in Alaska have heard so much about plants that "you can't grow in Alaska", that they become afraid to try anything.

While it is true that many vegetables and flowers just will not mature during our short growing season; there are many that grow more beautifully and abundantly here than anywhere else.

We would like to suggest some varieties of flowers that are exceptionally easy to grow and make a good showing in most any location.

Nasturtiums are a very good Alaskan flower, they flourish in most any soil, and even the dwarf varieties grow to unusual size. They are excellent for mass plantings where lots of bold color is desired. The trailing variety will often grow to heights of eight feet or more and can be trained to cover walls or fences, or may be allowed to trail down to cover a bank that will not support any other cover. Sweet peas also grow to giant size and the vines grow to unusual length.

The delphinium is a perennial that grows very well here and has no trouble in sur-

viving the cold weather. Once again, the outstanding thing about these plants are that Alaskan varieties grow to six or eight feet in height and the blossoms are unusually large and brilliantly colored.

Pansys sometimes are two inches in diameter and produce long stems. These will come up in succeeding years if they are protected from winter-kill with straw or other material. These may be started from seed sown directly into the ground, but will produce larger blooms and earlier if plants are set out.

There are a number of seeds that will bloom even when sown directly outdoors after the frost has past. Among these are bachelor buttons, poppy's and sweet williams. These are usually found in the so called scatter garden mixtures of seeds, and make nice informal plantings.

The Shasta daisy is a very hearty plant and produces a large quantity of blooms for cut flowers.

A very delicate looking, but surprisingly hearty plant is the Schizanthus, or poor mans orchid. These tiny pink, lavender, or yellow blossoms resemble tiny butterfly's and look equally well in the garden or in the flower vase.

These are but a few of the flowers that most anyone can grow successfully, but they are some of the most fool proof, and if space is limited you can be sure of having an attractive yard with any or all of them.

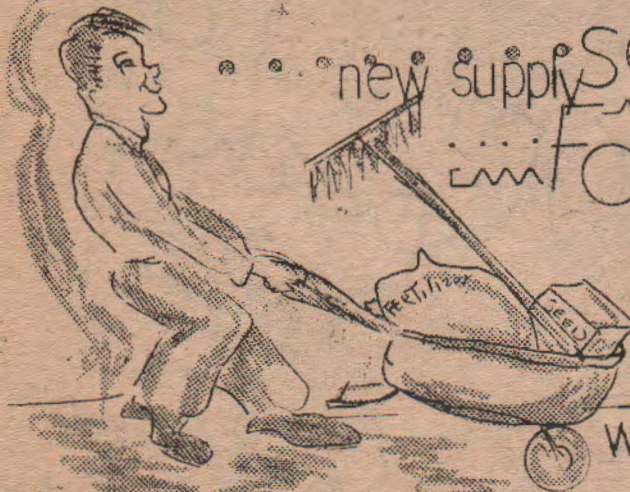

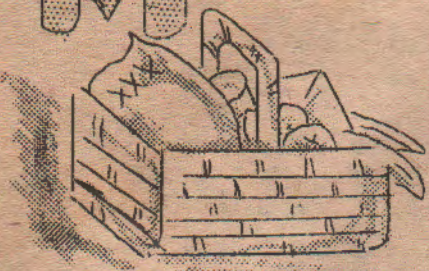
