# The Cook of the Month

## COOK FOR JUNE MARG. RLT SWANSON

A favorite at the Swansons is this hearty dish with an exotic name, but which is quite simple to make and can make use of leftover meat or fish.

### JAMBOLAYA with MEAT or FISH

8 servings:

SAUTE: 2 sliced bacon, chopped in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup chopped onion.

STIR IN: 1 Tbs. flour

ADD: 1 cup tomato pulp

$\frac{1}{3}$  cup water

$\frac{1}{4}$  tsp paprika

$\frac{1}{4}$  tsp salt

Bring these ingredients to a boil and stir in:

3 cups cooked rice

2 cups coarsely diced meat or fish (any kind will do)

Season with worcestershire sauce.

$\frac{1}{4}$  tsp thyme

salt to taste!

Stir the Jambolaya over low heat for 10 minutes or cook over boiling water for  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour. SERVE sprinkled with chopped parsley.

# The GREEN THUMB Corner



## Dandelions

This week, we will again digress from our custom of printing information on gardening.

We wish to discuss a way to turn one of the most bitter enemies of most gardeners to a very pleasant use.

The dandelion, looked at objectively, is not an ugly plant. In fact, with its bright golden color and fluffy blossoms, it is a good deal prettier than some blooms that gardeners spend their good money on seed and fertilizer for.

The thing that makes the dandelion one of the most despised weeds to ever plague a gardener, is its complete disrespect for lawns or flower beds and the stubbornness with which resists all attempts to eradicate it.

In recent years, selective weed killers, have made it possible to kill the dandelion plants in the lawn without harming the grass, but this is a continuous battle, and over a period of time can be quite expensive.

We are not going to attempt to tell you a sure-fire, perm-

manent method of getting rid of dandelions. What we are going to offer you is a way to put to use this pesky weed, and at least make it earn its keep. In fact if the end product is made and used in sufficient quantity, you probably won't care if you have a lawn, or dandelions or anything else for that matter.

We are talking about dandelion wine, which neither tastes or smells like dandelions, but is a delightful light colored beverage, neither sweet nor dry and definitely alcoholic.

In fact it is even possible that some of our readers may start planting dandelions, or even pick those growing on their neighbors property.

### DANDELION WINE

#### FOR EACH GALLON:

- 2 qts. blossoms (leave about  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch of stem)
- 2 oranges
- 1 lemon ) grated
- $2\frac{1}{2}$ " sugar.

Pour one gallon of BOILING water over this mess.  
STIR while pouring to dissolve sugar.

SET for one day

(24 hours)

Strain through a bag (squeeze) into a crock or bottles in dark.

Allow to "work" in dark until all the sugar is converted.  
Store in Dark at 70°.\*\*\*\*\*

If it turns out that all the gardens in Chugiak go to weed while the gardeners sit around in the dark brewing dandelion wine, we will probably regret having printed this information. However, if that should happen, then all the dandelions would be stripped of their blossoms, producing no seed for next years crop. So we will have accomplished the impossible, feat that we mentioned at the beginning of this article.



## SHOOTING STARS IN BLOOM


